**Drink in England and America.**

Mr. William Saunders writes to a contem-  
porary that he has put to the test of actual com-  
parison the statement that the use of intoxicat-  
ing liquors is much less frequent in the United  
States than in Great Britain. According to a  
detailed statement supplied to him by Mr. Nim-  
mo, the Chief of the Bureau of Statistics at Wash-  
ington, the consumption of alcoholic liquors in  
the United States during the year 1877 represents  
quoting the prices at the average retail cost in  
the States, a sum of \$113,156,957. From the re-  
cently-issued Excise returns for the United  
Kingdom, it appears that the sum represented  
by the consumption in the United Kingdom last  
year, quoting the prices at the average retail  
cost was \$142,008,231. Reckoning, however,  
the American quantities at English prices, Mr.  
Saunders says the \$113,156,957 is reduced to \$93,  
114,278. Taking, says the writer, the popula-  
tion of the United States at 45,000,000, and the  
consumption at \$93,000,000, we see that a pro-  
rata consumption in the United Kingdom, with  
a population of 33,000,000, would amount to  
\$68,000,000 sterling, whereas the consumption  
is actually \$142,000,000, showing an excess of  
\$74,000,000, and that the consumption of al-  
coholic liquors in the United Kingdom is more  
than double that of the same population in the  
United States. Since 1870 the consumption in  
the United States has diminished, whereas dur-  
ing the same period that of the United King-  
dom has grown from \$118,000,000 to \$142,000,  
000. These facts have an important bearing  
upon the severe international competition which  
is now taking place, and may with advantage  
be considered in connection with the necessit-  
ous condition of a large proportion of our popu-  
lation.

**Household.**

**SOOT AND SALT.**--As the days approach when  
the stove must be brought from the summer  
retirement, it is well to remember that salt will  
remove soot from the carpets. Brush the soot  
off as much as possible without rubbing it into  
the threads of the carpet, then scatter the salt,  
and sweep with a stiff broom.

**EXCELLENT GINGER SNAPS.**--One pint of mor-  
lasses, one tablespoonful of ginger, one cup of  
butter. Put these together and let them boil  
up once, cool, then add two even teaspoonfuls  
of soda, and flour enough to roll out thin.

**MEAT SCALLOPS.**--Take small scallop shells  
or small tin pattypans and line them with mash-  
ed potatoes; mince any kind of cold meat, and  
mix with a little bread crumbs and minced  
boiled onion, seasoning to taste, and moistened  
with a little cold gravy; put a layer of this over  
the mashed potatoes in the shell, placing a lay-  
er of mashed potato on the top, smoothing  
nicely and pressing at the edges in scallops; lay  
a thin bit of butter in the centre, and brown in  
a hot oven. Allow one shell or pan to each per-  
son.

**A GOOD AND PLAIN MOLASSES CAKE.**--Put in  
a coffee-cup one teaspoonful of lard or butter  
and one teaspoonful of soda; put on four table-  
spoonfuls of boiling water, and fill the cup with  
molasses; stir a little, then add nearly two cup-  
fuls of flour; stir well, and bake in warm gen-  
pers in moderate oven. Good either hot or  
cold.

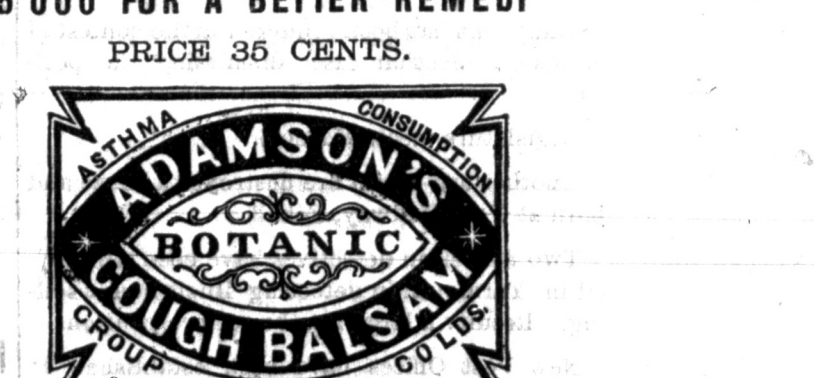
