

News Summary.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

A new post office is to be established at Wheaton Settlement, W. Co.

The Methodist church at Moncton is enjoying a revival season.

Two engines were smashed by a collision in Moncton station yard, Wednesday. No lives lost.

The trial of Annie Parker for perjury is progressing slowly, without yet developing anything very definite.

Mr. C. J. Brydges has resigned the post of Gen. Supt. of Government Railways. Mr. C. Schriber to be Engineer in Chief of Govt. Railways in the Maritime Provinces; and Mr. James Colman to be Division Supt. from St. John to Halifax.

And now the Penitentiary is the objective point for burglars. The residence of Mr. Burke, storekeeper, etc., of the P. P., has been twice broken into recently. No clue obtained.

A fire damaged the house of H. J. Pitts, corner Britain and Sydney Sts., Friday evening.

A casting weighing about 12 tons was "poured" on Saturday at the Phoenix Foundry. It is the heaviest ever cast in the Province and probably in the Dominion.

Wm. Ruddick was severely injured by a fall from the roof of a house in Carleton.

A large wild cat was shot in St. Andrews last week.

Three of the crew of brig "Fidelia" of St. John which put into Crookhaven disabled, was lost overboard.

Excursion tickets to Ottawa for the opening of Parliament, are advertised by all the roads at reduced rates.

James Domville, M. P. for Kings was presented with an address by the people of Sussex on his departure for Ottawa.

As the Western train was reaching McAdam Junction, on Saturday last, the axle of the engine broke and the train was unable to proceed. They were detained about half an hour, when the Houlton freight train coming along gave them a friendly push up to McAdam. About the same time the train from St. Andrews got off the track. The Western train arrived on time.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Port Williams, Annapolis Co., has changed its name to "Port Lorne," to avoid getting "mixed" with Port Williams, Kings Co.

The country roads in many sections are almost impassable from snow.

Two Collectors of Inland Revenue in N. S. are under charges of defalcation. One has been suspended.

Judgment has been rendered in the contested Kings Co. election case, dismissing the petition.

Legislature meets March 6.

Another ash-barrel fire destroyed a house and barn at Port Medway, Feb. 3.

Two American detectives have been employed in Yarmouth in detecting illicit liquor selling. Result: a large number of prosecutions.

New Post Offices have been established at Argyle Sound and Rockville, Yarmouth Co., and Hemford, Lunenburg Co.

Some Halifax boys, while coasting, ran their sleds over a policeman who attempted to stop the sport, knocking him senseless.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

In the Johnson and Millner murder case, the verdict was "not guilty."

A young man named Trenholm, who attempted to cross the straits between Capes Tormentine and Travers, alone in a small boat, during the late cold weather, was found the same day by the mail boat, frozen and lying in his boat.

Communication is kept up between the Island and the Cape quite regularly.

Snow is said to be so deep in Charlottetown that teams drive over housetops.

A new case of smallpox is reported at Alberton.

Physicians say the disease reported at Squirrel Creek is not leprosy.

Somebody, evidently not posted as to the financial standing of newspapers, broke into the office of the Charlottetown Examiner on Saturday night, Feb. 1, but found nothing worth taking away.

The Island members of Parliament have gone to Ottawa.

UPPER PROVINCES.

A Lumberman's Convention is being held in Ottawa.

H. M. Jarvis, P. O. clerk at London Ont., has been sent up for trial on two charges of robbing mails.

Following the Queen's example, Princess Louise forwarded £3 to Mrs. McNulty, of Montreal, who recently gave birth to triplets.

Mr. Birch, the great snow-shoer, walked from Montreal to Quebec, in 45 1/2 hours actual walking.

The Princess Louise has intimated to the Secretary of State that this is not an appropriate time for costly entertainments. He was deploring the shabbiness of the furnishings of Rideau Hall, and proposing to carpet it anew before the meeting of the House, when the Princess said that not a dollar of public money should be spent on the Hall so long as the present hard times continue; that economy was

necessary everywhere, and that she would see that Rideau Hall set a good example in that respect. The Princess looks after her household duties with the vigilance of a New England matron, and much of her spare time is devoted to charitable work.

The Marquis of Lorne and the Princess Louise devote half an hour each morning to family devotions, a quarter of an hour at noon, and an hour in the evening.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

It is again reported that the Government intend to appoint the Duke of Connaught Viceroy of Ireland

Striking laborers at Liverpool mob those who refuse to join them, driving them from their work, and setting the police at defiance.

Col. Percy Wyndham, who fought with Garibaldi and also in the late American war, was killed at Rangoon recently, while attempting a balloon ascension.

In the Tyne shipyard a reduction of 10 per cent takes effect on the 15th.

Elizabeth City, N. J., has declared itself bankrupt.

Military cordons have been formed on the frontier to keep the plague out of European countries. Great terror prevails everywhere. The plague is spreading in Russia in spite of the exertions of Government. Whole villages die like flies—many, it is said from terror.

M. Grevy, who has been elected President of France, is perhaps the fittest man that could have been chosen. It was no longer necessary that the President should be an ultra Conservative, as the nation has proved itself moderately but firmly Liberal. With the purging of the Senate the necessity for a MacMahon has passed away. Still, to secure the nation from surprises from the Extremists and Reactionists, a moderate President was necessary. Mr. Grevy fulfils all these conditions. He is said to have been life-long Republican firm and decided, but moderate withal, and free from that bitter partisanship which characterizes too many of the statesmen of France. He is a firm opponent of the Imperialists and Monarchists, and what is of more importance in view of the anticipated legislation upon ecclesiastical affairs—of the Clericals. Being a civilian he will have no military comrades to consider in the "executions" of disaffected officials. M. Grevy has been a safe statesman of great experience; it is therefore to be expected that he will be a safe President.

M. De Lesseps urges France to extend telegraph wires from Algeria across the Desert of Sahara to Senegal, West Africa.

Shere Ali is sick at Mazar Sherrif, and has abandoned the journey to Tashkend. Yakoub Khan continues to send daily reports to the Ameer regarding the state of affairs at Cabul. The English, although distributing gold lavishly, are advancing with distrust because of the conduct of the mountaineers. The hill tribes readily take the money offered them by the invaders, but lose no opportunity of pillaging British convoys.
