At the Zenana Mission breakfast the Revs. Hugh Stowell Brown, Dr. Stanford and others will be the speakers. The Revs. John Aldis and Dr. Oswald Dykes are the foreign preachers. Lord Northbrook presides at the Exeter Hall Missionary Meeting the speakers being the Revs. Dr. Punshon, Benwell Bird, J. A. Spurgeon, and W. Sampson.

SAVANNAH.—Rev. Timothy Harley, pastor of the First Baptist Church, tendered his resignation on Thursday last, and the same has been reluctantly accepted by his congregation. Mr. Harley came to Savannah in 1872, and has been pastor ever since. Some time ago he tendered his resignation, but was induced to withdraw it. His recent action was understood to be final, as he desired to return to England, where his family now are, and hence it was accepted, to take effect on the first of May.
