### NOVA SCOTIA.

The Coroner's Jury, sitting on the body of Driver McLeod, who was killed by the collision of trains near Athol, N. S., last week, returned a verdict of accidental death, and censured Mr. E. O. Stark, station agent at Springhill, and the Train Despatcher, in the following terms:

From the evidence produced we are of opinion that Mr. E. O. Stark, the station master at Springhill was guilty of neglect of duty in ordering the semaphore to be dropped and his allowing Cameron's special to leave the yard when he had not read the crossing order as received from Moncton for Cameron's train, and according to his own evidence, that had he read the order himself he would not have allowed Cameron to leave until the arrival of No. 12. Also, in view of the fact that the Conductor and Driver of Cameron's special, both after careful examination, misunderstood the crossing order and thereby caused the collision, we would strongly recommend that the train orders issued by the Train / Despatchers should be so plainly worded that there could not possibly be in future any misunderstanding or misconception of said orders.


