with an invitation from the brethren of the twelfth century, fled into Flanders, and into the provinces of Holland and Zealand, where they lived simple and exemplary lives, professing the most pure and simple principles which they exemplified in a holy conversation. They were, therefore, in existence long before the Reformed Church of the Netherlands." Again: "We have now seen that the Baptists, who were formerly called Anabaptists, and in later times Mennonites, were the original Waldenses, and have long in the history of the Church received the honor of that origin. On this account, the Baptists may be considered as the only Christian community which has stood since the days of the Apostles, and as a Christian Society which has preserved, pure, the doctrines of the gospel through all the ages."-Cramp's History.

The Baptists of America have continu ally gained upon the population; so that to-day, the percentage of our people to the number of inhabitants is greater than at any previous period, and this, too, in spite of the great increase of our population by the coming of people not Baptists.

In piety, wealth, liberality, Christian effort, missionary zeal, education, Sunday school and Bible distribution, literature, they stand in the front rank.
