The father seeing what had happened rushed to the spot and reached over the end of the scow to grasp, if possible, his drowning son, but his efforts were in vain, as it is said that the body was drawn underneath the scow by the rapid current. After reaching over the end of the scow Mr. Hagerty says that the only trace he saw of his son, was what he supposed to be his boots, which merely came to the surface of the water, and where for some time the water bubbled. The young man was about 21 years of age, and lived with his father, James Hagerty, in Mr. Bradley's house on Smythe street. He was in the employ of Mr. Richard Nagle at the time of the unfortunate occurrence. The body was recovered on Sunday afternoon.

A Dominion Order in Council of recent date provides that a drawback of duty paid on all canvas, paints and oils, chains, spikes, iron and iron knees, actually used in the construction of any ship or vessel built and registered in Canada or built in and exported from Canada, since the 15th of March last may be granted and paid by the Minister of Customs under such regulations as to him may appear necessary, provided that such drawback shall exceed an amount equal to 40 cents per registered ton of such ship or vessel when constructed without iron knees, and 50 cent per registered ton when constructed with iron knees.

NOVA SCOTIA.

It is now reported that six persons were drowned at Advocate Harbor, instead of three as stated in a despatch in Friday's Telegraph The persons supposed to have perished are Henry Morris and his sister, John Winters, John Lovely and brother, and a man named Hunter.

A case is reported of a man arriving in his boat in the Canning river, and, as the tide was low, making his boat fast to a large schooner. It was then dark, when he started to walk ashore on the mud. Soon after the captain of the schooner Chance, heard cries for help. He sprang on deck, when he heard a man say, "Throw me a line, for I'm up to my shoulders in mud." The captain was, on account of the darkness, unable to see the man, when he again heard him say, "I'm now up to my neck, for God's sake throw me a line.2' The captain lost no time, and with the assistance of the crew Miriam, lowered a boat into the mud, where they could distinguish a small black speck. A line was thrown in the direction of the spot, and the man having his hands uplifted, caught alluding to his previous connection with the the rope and was dragged from his perilous position. A few moments more and he would have perished.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

A telegram received by Hon. D. Davies, reports that his brig—the Harry Davies—while on passage from this port to Barbadoes, W. I., was abandoned at sea. The crew were landed in New York on Thursday. The Harry Davies sailed from this port on the 16th ult., with a cargo consisting of 300 qtls. of dry fish, 900 sacks of white oats, 80 bbls. of mackerel, 75 do of herring, 70 do potatoes, 50 cases canned provisions, 50 do lobsters, 10 horses, 100 sheep, and 16 geese, shipped by Hon. D. Davies; and 1,500 sacks of white oats, shipped by R. T. Holman, Esq. of Summerside.

Ugene McMillan from Newfoundland bound to Charlottetown, struck on the Indian Rocks, off Wood Islands, on Saturday night week; was condemned on Monday, and advertized to be sold "for the benefit of all concerned" on Wednesday last. Before the sale came off, however, we learn that several of the residents of Wood Islands, observing the vessel afloat on Tuesday morning before the sale, went out to her with boats, found her abandoned and 21 Chinamen were at work on the tunnel at the stripped.
