Two years ago last June I opened or miles from Newcastle, situate on the th-west branch of the Miramichi River. that time there was no regular religious vice held with the people of the place, prayer and conference meeting, no Sab-School. Since that time we have had gular preaching there and God has blessed efforts to do good. We now have a eekly prayer meeting and splendid Sabath School organized, with hopeful prosects. All these services were held in a arge school house, as there was no other ace suitable, in the community, to hold meetings in. This School house is unfinhed inside, that is, it is not desked proerly nor seated, only with rude benches there was nothing to be displaced or amaged in the least by the congregation. The Trustees of this school and house, wo of them with a very few others, being pposed to Baptist preaching and by the id of the Inspector of Schools for this listrict, have succeeded in effectually closng the door against us, in consequence of which we are obliged to suspend Sabbath perations and o preach as best we can the small rooms of dwelling houses till re can do better. Our congregations, are arge for the place, and are increasing and werything was marching on in good order and with encouraging prospects. This was too much for those who hate the ruth, so a little of the old-time spirit has nanifested itself in closing a door that had previously been opened to admit humble vorshippers; but we take comfore out of the words of Christ our Master, who has gid, "Blessed are ye when men shall perecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you, falsely, for my name

What we intend to do now is to build a commodious little church in the name of the Baptist denomination. The people have already commenced the work. Bro. Joseph Amos gives the land and by the aid of friends in this county who sympathize with us in our trouble, we shall erect building fit to worship in for a few months till we can finish it. That is, we shall put up the shell, finish it as far as we can outside immediately, lay a floor and put in a large stove, which we hope will enable us to hold service in for a time. The people here are all poor and few of them but they are doing nobly; outside friends are helping also, but we shall need the aid of our brethren elsewhere. "Come over and help us." Give us your sympathy, send us all the money you can, that we may have a respectable place of worship in this community, where God is working and blessing the people. We are determmed by the grace of God not to give it up till we see a Baptist meeting house in this place and a Baptist Church organized. Pray for us.
