

Persecution.

Two years ago last June I opened a preaching station at Derby about four miles from Newcastle, situate on the north-west branch of the Miramichi River. At that time there was no regular religious service held with the people of the place, no prayer and conference meeting, no Sabbath School. Since that time we have had regular preaching there and God has blessed our efforts to do good. We now have a weekly prayer meeting and a splendid Sabbath School organized, with hopeful prospects. All these services were held in a large school house, as there was no other place suitable, in the community, to hold meetings in. This School house is unfinished inside, that is, it is not desked properly nor seated, only with rude benches there was nothing to be displaced or damaged in the least by the congregation. The Trustees of this school and house, two of them with a very few others, being opposed to Baptist preaching and by the aid of the Inspector of Schools for this district, have succeeded in effectually closing the door against us, in consequence of which we are obliged to suspend Sabbath operations and to preach as best we can in the small rooms of dwelling houses till we can do better. Our congregations are large for the place, and are increasing and everything was marching on in good order and with encouraging prospects. This was too much for those who hate the truth, so a little of the old-time spirit has manifested itself in closing a door that had previously been opened to admit humble worshippers; but we take comfort out of the words of Christ our Master, who has said, "Blessed are ye when men shall persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you, falsely, for my name sake."

What we intend to do now is to build a commodious little church in the name of the Baptist denomination. The people have already commenced the work. Bro. Joseph Amos gives the land and by the aid of friends in this county who sympathize with us in our trouble, we shall erect a building fit to worship in for a few months till we can finish it. That is, we shall put up the shell, finish it as far as we can outside immediately, lay a floor and put in a large stove, which we hope will enable us to hold service in for a time. The people here are all poor and few of them but they are doing nobly; outside friends are helping also, but we shall need the aid of our brethren elsewhere. "Come over and help us." Give us your sympathy, send us all the money you can, that we may have a respectable place of worship in this community, where God is working and blessing the people. We are determined by the grace of God not to give it up till we see a Baptist meeting house in this place and a Baptist Church organized. Pray for us.
