

omination. It tends to complete, as legislation can, our denominational unity. In all this we can and must rejoice. The matter of having two Convention Boards instead of one, is of secondary importance. It is possible, that experience will teach us in the not distant future that it is best to have but one. Meanwhile the two Boards in N. S. and N. B. may stimulate us here and there to a holier rivalry and healthier activity than would otherwise be possible. At all events it but remains for us to follow, on in the line of the new departure with unwavering loyalty and increasing zeal.

**Pre-Millennialism.**

Your correspondent "Luke," in giving quotations from the Ancient Fathers to show "that the Church in the first three centuries of the Christian era was Pre-Millennialist" should be a little more careful in his quotations. He gives one from Eusebius as a sample of the belief of the Church in the time of Papias, and as if Eusebius rather endorsed it. A few paragraphs from Eusebius as rendered by Cruse will place him in a little different light. "The same historian (Papias) also gives other accounts, which he says he adds as received by him from unwritten tradition, likewise certain strange parables of our Lord, and of his doctrines, and some other matter rather too fabulous. In these, he says there would be a certain millennium after the resurrection, and that there would be a corporeal reign of Christ on this very earth; which things appear to have been imagined, as if they were authorized by the apostolic narrations, not understanding correctly those matters which they propounded mystically in their representations. For he was very limited in his comprehensions, as is evident from his discourse; yet he was the cause why most of ecclesiastical writers, imitating the antiquity of the man, were carried away by a similar opinion."

Eusebius evidently did not believe in Pre-Millennial views, and he lived in the third century. "Luke" ought to give all the views held, and then we could draw our own conclusions—as currently, doubtless, as he has.
