He gives one from Euebius as a sample of the belief of the Church in the time of Papias, and as if Eusebius rather endorsed it. A few paragraphs from Eusebius as rendered by Cruse will place him in a little different

"The same historian (Papias) also gives ther accounts, which he says he adds as eceived by him from unwritten tradition, fter the resurrection, and that there would be a corporeal reign of Christ on this very earth; which things e appears to have magined, as if they were authorized by Blood of Norton to be goiling waite the apostolic narrations, not understanding correctly those matters which they pro-pounded mystically in their representa-tions. For he was very limited in his comprehensions, as is evident from his discourse; yet he was the cause why most of ecclesiastical writers, arging the antiquity of the man, were carried away by a similar

Eusebius evidently did not believe in Pre-Millenial views, and he lived in the third century. "Luke" ought to give all the views held, and then we could draw our own conclusions—as correctly, doubtless, as he has.

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
