Items of Interest.
The amusing possibility about which
we all have been talking, has become fact.
Recently, in one of the Lowell Baptist
churches, a Bell telephone apparatus was
placed in the pulpit on Sunday, and the
entire service was heard distinctly by
people having connection with it in all
parts of the city. The singing, words as
well as tune, was heard plainly at Foxboro,
fifty-five miles distant, and via Foxboro,
in Boston, also, eighty miles away. Why
