Temperance.
"Drink is the Curse of Africa!"
So writes McKay, Missionary of the
American Board, from Lake Victoria
Nyanza. "Go where you will—Usekuha,
Uergara, Ugogo, Ungamwezi, Usukuma,
Ukerewe, or Uganda—you will find every
week, and, when grain is plentiful, every
night, every man, woman, and child, even
to sucking infants, reeling with the effects
of alcohol. On this account, chiefly, I be-
came a teetotaler on leaving the coast, and
have continued so ever since. I believe,
also, that abstinence is the true secret of
continued and unimpaired health in the
tropics. who wishes to introduce civiliza-
tion into Africa? Let a *sine qua non* of the
enterprise be that its members be total ab-
stainers. The West Coast is ruined with
rum; it is killing the Kaffir in the south;
and even at the East Coast, at Zanzibar, a
vile liquor is distilled from the sugar-canes
at Kokotoni that is retailed by every
Hindu, Banyan, and Goa merchant in all
the coast town, to the destruction of the
Suaheli race. The Wanika taps the cocoa-
nut tree, and sips its juice with straws,
till every village I passed through, even in
early morning, seemed a pandemonium.
Inland, the grains are used, to produce the
ferment. Matama, or panicum, is the
general malt, put, failing that, Indian corn
and a small millet called mewe are called
into requisition, the strength being in-
creased by the addition of honey. On the
shores of Nyanza, plantains are plentiful,
and from them is made which causes king
and people to meet on the low level of in-
toxication."

Brain Work, Alcohol and Tobacco.
James Parton concludes a recent article
upon the habits and death of Bayard Tay-
lor (whom he had, as a personal friend,
warned against the dangers of wine and
beer drinking and smoking) as follows:
Mental labor is not hostile to health and
life. But I am more than ever convinced
that a man who lives by his brain is of all
men bound to avoid stimulating his brain.
In this climate, to stimulate the brain by
alcohol or tobacco is only a slow kind of
suicide. Even the most moderate use of
the mildest wine is not without danger, be-
cause the peculiar exhaustion caused by
severe mental labor is a constant and ur-
gent temptation to increase the quantity
and strength of the potation. I would say
to every young man in the United States
if I could reach him: If you mean to at-
tain to one of the prizes of your profession
live a cheerful life to the age of eighty,
throw away your dirty old pipe, put your
cigars in the stove, never buy any more, be-
come an absolute teetotaler, take your
dinner in the middle of the day, and rest
one day in the seven."

John B. Gough, is a lecture in England,
referring to the question whether alcohol
was a food or a medicine, remarked that in
his opinion it was "very much like sitting
down on a hornet's nest—stimulating but
not nourishing."
Said Dr. Guthrie: "I have four good
reasons for being an abstainer—my head is
clearer, my health is better, my heart is
lighter and my purse is heavier."

FRENCH BEEFSTEAK.—Cut steak two-
thirds of an inch thick from a fillet of beef,
dip into melted butter, lay them on a heat-
ed gridiron and broil over hot coals.
When nearly done sprinkle with pepper
and salt. Have ready some parsley, chop-
ped fine and mixed with softened butter.
Beat them together to a cream and pour
into the middle of the dish. Dip each
steak into the butter, turning them over
and lay them round on the platter.

SPONGE CAKE.—Six eggs, one and one-
third cups of sugar, one and one-half cups
of flour, juice and grated rind of one-half
a lemon. Beat the yolks of the eggs and
the sugar to a foam; the whites to a stiff
froth; add to the yolks and sugar also the
lemon; then beat all together fifteen
minutes, stir in the flour lightly, turn into
a buttered pan, and bake in a quick oven.
JELLY-CAKE FRITTERS.—Cut a stale
sponge or very plain cake into rounds with
a cake-cutter. Fry to a nice brown in
sweet lard. Dip each round in boiling
milk, to soften it and get rid of the grease.
Lay upon a hot dish and spread with sweet
jelly or jam. Pile neatly one upon another,
send around hot, sweetened cream to pour
over them.

CREAM PIE.—Sweeten and flavor one
quart of rich cream to suit the taste, have
a plate lined with nice crust as for a
custard pie, beat the whites of two or three
eggs very stiff, and stir into the cream,
pour into the crust, and bake as long as a
custard. This pie should stand in a cool
place or on ice till perfectly cold.
FRUIT CUSTARD PIE.—Make a custard
with milk, sugar, eggs and nutmeg, as you
would make a custard pie, only adding
berries of any kind you like, and a little
more sugar or apples or peaches sliced fine,
are good.

MAIL CONTRACT.
Tenders addressed to the Postmaster General, will
be received at Ottawa until noon on Friday the 25th
July, for the conveyance of Her Majesty's mails, on a
proposed contract for four years, thirty times per
week, each way, between St. John P. O. and L. C. R.,
and St. John and Marine Railway Stations, from the
first of October next.
Conveyance to be made in a suitable vehicle drawn
by two or more horses, subject to the Postmaster
General's approval. The mail to be conveyed five
times each way, between the Post Office, St.
John and the L. C. R. and St. John and Marine Rail-
way Stations, as may be directed and at such hour
as the Postmaster may from time to time appoint,
and to be promptly in attendance at the Railway
Stations to convey the mails to the Post Office with
all possible despatch.
Separate tenders will also be received up to
the above date for a daily service between the Carle-
ton Post Office and the Carleton Railway station,
and for a semi-daily service between St. John P. O.
and Carleton P. O.

to conditions of contracts may be seen and blank
forms of tender may be obtained at the Post
Offices at Carleton and St. John.
