LADIES' SEMINARY.

As this building is not yet completed we defer giving any description for the present. The male academy is also quite new, and was seen by many for the first time, during the late anniversary week. Acadia, for the present is amply and well supplied with educational edifices. The same is true also of the teaching staff. There is no educational institution in the Maritime Province, if there is in the Dominion, where so many different educational centres and systems are represented upon the staff of instructors. Nor is it too much to say that all these varied systems are made to blend harmoniously in the production of an educational training pre-eminently adapted to the wants of the Maritime Provinces. Acadia to-day is better equipped than ever before for work, and increasingly worthy of the best and largest gifts of her friends and sons and daughters. The small debt remaining on the buildings must be remembered and wiped out, as a first duty owed to an institution that has reflected more honor on the Baptist name in the Provinces than all their other work combined.

Obituary.

Rev. Patrick Duffy departed this life on the second day of June, in the seventy-fourth year of his age. His health for sometime past was failing. He went down through the valley and shadow of death without much physical suffering. His faith was strong and hope firm in the God and rock of his salvation.

Bro. Duffy was a native of the North of Ireland. He came to this country with his parents in 1820. He was brought up in the Roman Catholic faith, about fifteen years of age he was converted to God, and by the power of the Divine Spirit and the force of truth upon his heart he was led to embrace Baptist doctrine and practice. He was "buried with Christ in Baptism" by the venerable Joseph Crandall. From the very first he took an active part in religious service. His soul was filled with anxiety for the salvation of sinners. He frequently travelled with that veteran pioneer, being youthful and small of stature at that time, Bro. Crandall would have him stand on a chair or bench for a pulpit, while he declared the messages of life to the perishing. His labors even then were not in vain in the Lord. He was ordained as an evangelist at Hillsboro, Albert County, in May 1849. He devoted much of his time to Missionary labor in Albert and Westmoreland Counties. He had at different periods the pastoral oversight of the Churches at Baltimore, Dawson Settlement, Dorchester Cape, Point Midgie, and other settlements, where his preaching was very much appreciated. Bro. Duffy was a very consistent Christian man, highly esteemed where ever he was known. Some of his children have passed on to the better land before him. He has left his beloved companion, three sons and three daughters, and a widowed sister to mourn. The funeral was largely attended, and by request the writer preached on the occasion, in the Hillsboro Baptist Church. Rev. S. C. Moore, and Bro. N. Gross took part in the service.

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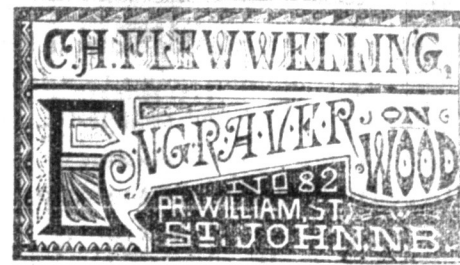
