

## News Summary.

## NEW BRUNSWICK.

An attempt was made to wreck the train which left the L. C. R. depot, St. John on Saturday last, some scoundrel having placed a sleeper across the track. Fortunately the engineer discovered the obstruction in time to prevent the disaster.

Moncton advertises for \$6,000 on town debentures.

The Orangemen walk in Moncton on the 12th July.

The northern corner section of the harbor face of the deep water terminus wharf this city, was sunk into position Tuesday. Sounding will be immediately taken for the centre section of the Charlotte street extension, which will be 210 feet deep, 25 feet wide and 20 feet high.

The Sch. "Charity," Capt. King, made the run from this port to St. Andrews on Monday last in six hours, which was an unusually quick trip.

A fire was discovered about one o'clock Thursday morning in the liquor store on Union street, Carleton, kept by Mr. Peter Coughlan. The building which is owned by Coun. Emerson, was damaged to the extent of about \$200, but it is covered by insurance.

On Monday last ground was broken on the new piece of railroad between McAdam Junction and Vaneboro, and the work of construction is now being proceeded with.

The Carleton County Temperance people meet on the 13th of June for the purpose of deciding whether or not to submit the Canada Temperance Act to the people of the County.

James Hardy, a cutter in the employ of J. K. Taylor, Carleton, dropped dead in the shop in which he was working just before noon to-day. Hardy appeared to be in first rate health up to the time of his death, of which heart disease was probably the cause. The Coroner was notified and an inquest resulted in a verdict of death from heart disease.

Native tomatoes at this season are a rarity. Mr. W. Murray, of Grand Lake, brought a few to the city yesterday, which he had raised, under glass, on his farm. He expects to market a great many tomatoes this year.

A little boy named Willie Baker, aged 7 years, son of Mr. Elijah Baker, of Millville on the line of the N. B. Railway, wandered off into the woods on Monday the 25th ult. He was not missed until nightfall when search was at once instituted. On the next and following days hundreds of neighbors joined in scouring the woods in all directions, but no trace of the little fellow could be found, and all hope of rescuing him was given up when, on Saturday, 31st, the engineer of the down train from Woodstock saw him lying close to the track about 15 miles from Millville station. He was almost famished, having eaten nothing during the whole time.

A case of diphtheria broke out in the family of Mr. H. Palmer, Station Master, Sackville some weeks ago, and he immediately sent two young children to a neighbors to be out of harm's way. The case recovered and the children were brought back last week and both were immediately taken down and one died on Saturday and the other on Sunday.

The tide of emigration from St. John to the Tobique ungranted lands continue unabated, and during the past week some twelve or fifteen settlers, some of them with their families, have gone and occupied lands there. Nearly all of these parties have gone altogether on their own account, independent of aid. There have been a number of coming grants to parties who intend going the coming week and applications for certificates are being made daily.

In the Bangor Police Court on Thursday, Robert Willis of St. John was sentenced to thirty days in jail.

The new church belonging to the Shemogue and Port Elgin Presbyterian congregations, at Little Shemogue, W. Co., will be opened for public worship on Sabbath, the 15th inst, by Rev. Messrs Tallach, of Amherst, and Darragh, of Goose River.

On Wednesday afternoon last pursuant to notice given, a meeting of temperance men was convened in Victoria building, Sussex. A lively discussion took place relative to the best legitimate means to be adopted to bring the temperance vote on the 26th of June to a triumphant issue. It was recommended that all the clergymen in the various parishes of the County be requested to deliver temperance sermons in their respective churches on the 23rd. Public meetings are to be held in the various parishes and copies of the Canada Temperance Act, as well as a synopsis of the same, distributed among the electors. All the gentlemen present expressed a firm conviction and sanguine expectation that the election would result in a glorious triumph for the temperance cause.

The Government, we understand have come to the determination to hold the next Provincial Exhibition in October, 1880, and to fix upon St. John as the place for holding it if satisfactory local arrangements can be made.

The eleven young men who graduated on Wednesday at the Mount Allison College, held a meeting before leaving Sackville and unanimously resolved to contribute \$100 each toward a fund for the erection of new College buildings. We understand that this enterprise will be carried out at the earliest date practicable. The buildings devoted to collegiate work at Mount Allison are by no means adequate for the requirements of that vigorous young College. No doubt, the enthusiasm and liberality of the students will stimulate older and wealthier men to aid in the carrying out of the contemplated work. The Rev. C. H. Paisley, A.M. of Woodstock, has been unanimously elected by the Board of Governors of the Mount Allison Institution to the Principalship of the Male Academy, rendered vacant by the resignation of the Rev. Principal Longley.

Messrs. C. F. Olmich & Sons have purchased from Messrs. Stephenson and McGibbon the Point Wolf saw mills and timber lands, together with eight and one half million feet of logs in the mill pond. The mills are now in successful operation under the charge of E. G. Clinch Esq. the Junior member of the firm. This property is fifty miles east, from St. John on the Bay of Fundy Shore. The river and its various branches extending back twenty-five miles into Albert King's and St. John Counties.

## NOVA SCOTIA.

Two Englishmen have been digging for gold on the Dartmouth Common, and have sent home fair specimens of gold and copper.

Somebody entered the store of Mr. A. Hanington of Liverpool, N. S., by false keys, and stole goods to the value of \$30.

The Intercolonial Railway department have closed Ishgonish, Greenville, and River Philip stations.

Henry Lawson, a young unmarried man, employed in the rolling mill, Londonderry, was accidentally killed on the 4th, while cleaning out cinders near the squeezer.

A load of this season's grass, was a curiosity that presented itself to the public gaze, of Pictou, on Saturday last. It was of good height, and was cut on the last day of spring.

The jury on the inquest on the body of the late Simon Low, who was drowned while river driving on the LaHave on a Sunday, censured the employers who worked their men on a Sunday.

M. H. Wilkins, a laborer, residing at Lorway Mines C. B., recently received the very pleasant intelligence that he has fallen heir to a very valuable estate in Essex County, England. The estate comprises 800 acres of land, much of which is under cultivation. Mr. Wilkins intends to leave for England at an early date.

A few days since two children of Mr. and Mrs. H. Harrison, of Lynn, Mass., died. It is a singular fact that on the day of the death of the son in Lynn, the afflicted parents received news of the death of the daughter at the home of her aunt in Cornwallis, and from the same fatal disease—diphtheria.

Deacon Joseph Flint (colored) of Halifax is chaplain of his lodge and a prominent temperance worker. The officers raided his premises on Tuesday and discovered a whiskey still in full blast in his cellar, which he rented to some "white gentlemen," about whose movements he "knew nothing." The affair has caused an excitement in the church and the temperance bodies.

A farmer friend from Wilmot informs us that one-third more wheat has been sown this year in that locality than last.

Mr. W. Cummings has been appointed Harbor Master for the Port of Annapolis vice Mr. Jacob T. Starratt, superseded.

## PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

The Charlottetown schools were visited during the week by a number of members of the Legislature. They expressed themselves as highly pleased with the state of efficiency in which they found them.

Yesterday a child accidentally fell from the second-story window of a house on Dorchester St. Charlottetown. Its head struck against the platform, fracturing its jaw and inflicting injuries from which it is not expected to recover.

King's County is the banner county. The Canada Temperance Act was carried there on Thursday last by a tremendous majority. There were 1076 ballots cast in favor of the petition, and only 50 against it. This is encouraging news from the Island. Queen's Co. is to have an election on the 5th July. Then the whole of the Island will have voted in favor of the petition.

We are glad to learn that the boat "Sailor Cassie," which left this port on the 14th ult., for Wood Islands, in charge of Mr. Donald McLeod, Flat River, and Mr. J. McSwain, Belfast, and about whose safety fears were entertained, has turned up safe at Pictou.

On Sunday night, the 25th ult., Isaac Miller, of Georgetown Royalty—a young man in the 17th year of his age, left his father's house taking with him an old flint-lock musket, with the intention of going to shoot ducks or brant, and was not up to Thursday last heard of.

On Tuesday morning the easterly section of the Island was visited by a snow storm. At Souris, the storm made outdoor business disagreeable.

The walking mania seems to have taken great effect upon some folks in Charlottetown and Summerside. Several walking matches have taken place, and more are talked of.

The Island papers from time to time give long lists of "successful Islanders abroad." We think the lady mentioned below might head the list of the most successful:—"At a Ladies' walking match in Boston a short time ago, a Miss Margaret Dinah Martin, daughter of Mr. John Martin, Dundee, Lot 50, competed, beating all competitors, and carrying off a prize of \$1,500. And this is added one more name to the list of 'successful Islanders abroad.'"

The children's concert under the direction of Mr. John Ross in the Market Hall, Charlottetown, on Monday evening was a very successful affair. About 400 children from the City schools occupied the platform and presented a very pretty appearance. The entertainment consisted of choruses and rounds interspersed with recitations. The children sang remarkably well considering the very short time they have been under Mr. Ross's instructions, and the audience were very well pleased with the entertainment.

John Hunter Duvar, Esq., has been appointed Inspector of Fisheries for the Island. Mr. Duvar has, we learn, given the Department substantial proofs of his fitness for the position.

Mr. Donald Gillis, father of Capt. J. Gillis of Charlottetown though aged 88 years, walked, on Thursday, 22nd ult., from Montague, to Charlottetown, a distance of about twenty-five miles, starting from there at 9 in the morning, dining at Lot 49, calling on several friends as he came along, and arrived Charlottetown at tea the same evening.

We are pleased to learn that our lobster factories are doing good work this season. Mr. N. McFadyen of Murray Harbor, has already 90,000 cans ready for shipment. The recent storms destroyed many of his traps, but they were soon replaced. Between his two factories he can now put up 7,000 cans a day.

## UPPER PROVINCES.

The Canada Temperance or Scott Act has been carried in Lambton Co. Ont.

The Orangemen of Ottawa will have a procession on the 24th of July, the meeting of the Triennial Council. Trouble is feared.

Only two Elections are reported in Ontario by acclamations, Mr. Parkhill, Conservative, for South Simcoe, and Mr. Mack, for Cornwall, claimed Ministerial by the Globe and Independent by the Mail.

H. Campbell, of New Brunswick, and G. Duffas, of Nova Scotia, received the first prizes in their respective classes Kingston Military College.

Last week in Montreal the caretaker of Morey & Co's., Livery Stables was fatally stabbed while defending his employer's property. The assassin then set fire to the livery stable, and destroyed some \$15,000 worth of property. The caretaker was a married man and leaves a widow and three young children.

The Duke of Argyll and party arrived at Clifton, Ont., yesterday. They will spend several days around the Falls.

His Excellency the Governor General's work entitled "Travels in the Dominion," illustrated by the Princess Louise, will be published this season in London.

The Supreme Court, Ottawa, yesterday took up the case of the City of Halifax vs. Kenny, the question at issue being whether the City has the right to tax as personal property of resident vessels which have never come into Halifax or any other N. S. ports.

Considerable excitement was caused in Montreal yesterday by the refusal of the Merchants Bank to accept the bills of the Ville Marie Bank. They were subsequently accepted, but a record was kept of the depositors. Negotiations have been opened with the Bank of Montreal to guarantee the circulation of Ville Marie Bank.

J. T. Clayton & Co., Montreal, wholesale dry goods, have suspended, with direct liabilities of \$700,000.

The Ontario ministry has been sustained by an increased majority. The new assembly will be composed of about 57 Liberals, 31 Conservatives and Independents. The members in the late Assembly were 53 to 35. All the Ministers were re-elected.

The Princess Louise Dragoon Guards have been honored with an invitation from the 13th Battalion, Brooklyn, to participate in the 4th of July celebration in New York. They offer to furnish the troops with horses. The Dragoons also received a similar invitation from the citizen's corps of Utica, which they accepted.

Two earloads of household servants, and effects left Ottawa, a few days ago, for Quebec. It is His Excellency's intention to spend considerable portion of the summer in the capital. Only a few days will be spent by them at Halifax.

## BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The death of Baron Lionel Rothschild, the head of the great firm of Rothschild & Co., took place Tuesday, in London.

In consequence of the treaty concluded with Portugal, for the development of freedom, commerce and civilization in Africa, a British man-of-war has been bordered to Mozambique to co-operate with the Portuguese for the suppression of the slave trade.

The Woolwich Arsenal in England has been of late busy in preparing balloons for the African war. The largest is called "Saladin," and contains 38,000 cubic feet of gas. Arrangements have been made for telegraphic communications with them, when aloft, by means of a wire running through the cable restraining them. Means have also been found for re-inflating them with gas while in the air.

Vivian, the British Consul General, goes to Cairo to deliver a protest from his Government, against the arbitrary manner in which the Khedive's decree of 22nd of April, dealt with the creditors of the Egyptian Government.

France and England have agreed to abstain from any interference in Egyptian administration, and will not require the appointment of European khedives or monarchical general, but will uphold the Khedive responsible for the consequences of his acts.

The German Government has decided to address the other European Governments on the subject of the improper, and in some cases, inhuman manner in which the war in South America is being carried on by the belligerent States, and to suggest joint interferences.

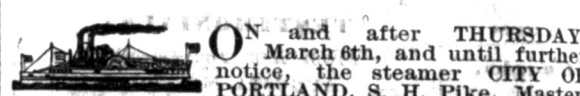
