News Summary.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

A most distressing accident occurred on Thursday last in Guter's mill (now owned by a Mr. Mann) situated hard by the Intercolonial Railway at St. Martins. The victim was a young man named Griffiths, who, while putting a belt on a running pulley, was caught by the arms and whirled around with the shaft, his body at the same time striking the floors above and below. The arms were pulled out of their sockets, and the legs and head, as well as other parts of the body, were horribly mangled. The unfortunate fellow, it is said, was between 16 and 17 years of age and leaves a widowed mother.

We understand that Mr. Parks has returned from Montreal and we hope that it will be seen that the new cotton mill has made good progress in his absence. He will now be able to give it a hand himself.

The dredge New Dominion was not taken up to Ormoco on Wednesday, but was still lying at Indiantown on Saturday. It is expected that she will be taken up very soon and got to work with all possible speed. The water in the river at present is not very low and so far this season the boats have experienced no difficulty getting over the Ormoco shoals.

The school-house known as the "Frog Pond," in the Parish of Simonds was destroyed by fire on Monday night. The school was in charge of Miss Bowles. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

Mr. W. C. Burnham, eldest son of C. E. Burnham, Esq., of this city, received the degree of M. A., on Wednesday last, at the closing exercises of the Colby (Baptist) University, Waterville, Me. Mr. Burnham, who is now in St. John on a vacation, graduated at Colby, and is a Professor of Rockland College, on the Hudson, to which institution he was attached about a year ago. He will return to his duties in a few weeks.

The potato bugs made their appearance at St. Martins on Saturday in a field belonging to Mr. Holland. They were first seen on the weeds as if waiting for the potato to come up. Mr. H. applied a coat of straw and set fire to work giving them a warm reception.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

Now that the warm weather has set in, the lobsterers are swarming closer in shore and large catches are being made at the different factories. At New London there are two establishments, one owned by Mr. H. L. Sawyer, and the other by Captain J. A. McLeod, of Kensington. Mr. Sawyer's factory is managed by 50 hands while he has twelve boats at work, and his average catch is about \$5,000 per day. He has also another factory at North Rustico where he employs seventy hands and twenty boats. The average catch there is said to be \$15,000. Captain McLeod's establishment is magnificently fitted up, and everything in connection therewith seems to be in first-class order. The factory is supplied by steam and the lobsters are cooked in the newest process, which makes the meat white and delicate. Mr. McLeod employs 50 hands who are under the charge of F. T. Knaut, a packer of 18 years experience. The average catch is \$4,000 per day with 2,000 traps set. The Captain has another establishment at Malpeque where 45 hands are employed. The novelty here is the arrangement for cracking the lobsters, the board is so placed that as every fish is shelled the shell falls back into the sea and is carried out by the tide, leaving no refuse what- ever about the building. At Park Corner Mr. A. C. McLeod has a nice tidy factory, and employs 45 hands, the average catch there being 8,000 lobsters per day. The proprietor has built a strong wharf on which are rats and a large crane which is moved up and down to the factory by a strong windlass, the cable being pulled from the boats right into the cable pulley on the wharf.

The Inspector of steamboats for the Maritime Provinces, W. M. Smith, Esq., has been visiting the Island on official duty. The Inspector highly complemented the officers of the P. E. Steam Navigation Co., on their efficiency.

We learn with deep regret that the house and barn of Mr. James McLeod, of East Point, was wholly consumed by fire recently. Mr. McLeod saved nothing save a few articles of furniture, and had no insurance upon his property. The fire is evidently the work of an incendiary.
