ence upon a child, apart from that  
ceived under the parental roof, as  
at which is given by a kind and in-  
elligent man or woman in the daily  
ntine of school life. Bands of Hope  
ve been and are of inestimable ad-  
vantage in aiding to train children in  
the habits of abstinence, and will not  
be superseded by school tuition, yet  
is to the latter that the Temper-  
ance reformer must most steadily  
ok for the great results we hope to  
be produced upon the rising genera-  
on. It is, therefore, most satisfac-  
ry to know that the School Board  
of London has given its official sanc-  
tion to the subject of Temperance  
ing taught in the schools of the  
etropolis, by stamping with its ap-  
roval "The Temperance Lesson-  
ook," by Dr. Richardson, and by  
mitting the Band of Hope Union  
arrange for some most admirable  
tures to the schools by Dr. Sin-  
r Patterson.—*Temperance Re-

TEMPERANCE IN BURMAH.—A  
veller lately returned from Burmah  
ys: "Knowing as I do, the king-  
y well, and being acquainted with  
his character and habits, it is impos-  
sible for me to believe that there is  
y truth in the stories current about  
his drunkenness. Strong drink, in  
urmah, as in Europe, is condemned  
by the dictates alike of religion and  
morality. The laws of the country,  
o, provide somewhat stringently  
against the evil. A man convicted  
of drunkenness is for the first offence  
araded through the streets with his  
ands tied behind his back, and his  
posure to the public gaze has gener-  
ally a good effect. When he is  
ound guilty a second time he is  
eaten severely. Is he found guilty  
third time? Then he is beaten  
ill more severely—sometimes even  
o death. Taking it in all, it may be  
aid with safety that drunkenness is  
very rare thing in Burmah, and the  
country people there are among the  
oberest on earth. It will please the  
Temperance people to know that the  
rimer refreshment among the Bur-  
ese is pure water. It matters not  
here one goes in Burmah, along the  
oads and all over the country, there  
is everywhere to be found the little  
shed with the drinking fountain with-  
it, and an adjoining seat for the  
eary traveller to rest."

A most interesting feature in con-  
nection with the work of Temperance  
is the scope it gives for ladies to work.  
As woman were last at the Cross,  
first at the grave of our Lord, so in  
his grand work of reclaiming our  
fellows are they oftentimes first to take  
up the cross and no doubt will be  
last at the grave when the old demon  
alcohol is buried. As Canon Wil-  
perforce has said, "one woman who  
comes out boldly on this question is  
worth half-a-dozen of the inferior  
ex."

A GOOD MOTHER'S PLAN.—A lady  
gave us a rule, not long since, by  
which she had succeeded in interest-  
ing her fun-loving boys, so that they  
preferred to stay at home evenings,  
instead of seeking amusement else-  
where. She said:  
"I remember that children are  
children, and must have amusements.  
I fear that the abhorrence with which

some good parents regard any play  
for children is the reason why child-  
ren go away for pleasure. Husband  
and I used to read some history, and  
at the end of each chapter asked  
some questions requiring the answers  
to be looked up if not answered cor-  
rectly. We follow a similar plan  
with the children; sometimes we  
play one game and sometimes another,  
always planning with books, stories,  
plays, or treats of some kind, to  
make the evenings at home more at-  
tractive than they can be made  
abroad. I dislike to think that any  
one could make my children happier  
than I can; so I always try to be at  
leisure in the evening, and arrange  
something entertaining.

"When there is a good concert,  
lecture, or entertainment, we all go  
together to attend it; for whatever  
is worth the price of admission for  
us older people, is equally valuable  
to the children, and we spare no ex-  
pense where it is to their advantage  
to be out of an evening.

"But the greater number of our  
evenings are spent quietly at home.  
Sometimes it requires quite an effort  
to sit quietly, talking and playing  
with them, when my work-basket is  
filled with unfinished work, and books  
and papers lay unread on the table;  
but as the years go by and I see my  
boys and girls growing into home-  
loving, modest young men and maid-  
ens, I am glad it was my rule to give  
the best of myself to my family."
