Shortly before five Sept '81, 2; Geo Fowns Jan '81, 1; D. o'clock, on Friday afternoon, a cyclone of most terrific violence struck this town, demolishing one hundred buildings, kill-ing and wounding upwards of 30 persons. Though other towns in the vicinity felt full force of the cyclone vented itself here.

According to the evidence of an eye witness two tornadoes met right over this place and the work of destruction was accomplished in less than fifteen minutes.

At 4.30 o'clock, black clouds gathered with great rapidity. The thunder and lightning were terrific. The wind blew a hurrican, while the rain descended in blinding sheets. There was a moment's lull andthen the cyclone struck the town, almost destroying it in a minute.
