Dr. Cramp.—Please insert the following resolution of condolence passed at a meeting of the Board of Directors of Acadia College, Dec. 1881: Our Heavenly Father in his wise providence has taken home to him- self our beloved brother in Christ, Dr. Cramp. The event, though unexpected, for he had reached a ripe age, fills us with a sense of per- sonal and public bereavement. This loss, and our whole denomination sustained a great loss, for though removed from active service through the weight of years for some time, his sympathies were with us, and his prayers unceasing in our be- half.

Of the work performed for Acadia College by our deceased brother it is needless to say, if it were not impossi- ble, as to speak particularly. For his labors were incessant and abundant, such as only a Christian man, endued with his great qualities of mind and heart, assisted by his won- derful and varied learning, could per- form. They were labors for which Acadia College owes the most pro- found thanks to the Giver of all good. When Dr. Cramp came to take leave of our institutions of learning, at difficulties lay in our way, at discouragement was upon the hearts of its friends and patrons, and then our way at times has been through serious trials.

But from the first he manifested, as he ever maintained, a cheerful courage, and a truly Christian spirit. To this spirit, as well as to great efforts he put forth in due, great measure, the success that Acadia College has enjoyed. Our remembrance of the zeal of Dr. Cramp, in all our denomination- terprises, is grateful and will long be cherished. He sought to inspire around him with zeal for Christ his cause. News Summary.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

John Carson, St. Martins, launched a new schooner on Wednesday last.—James Ryan, John Whalen, Alex. Friars, John Ramsay and Jos. E. Leggett were each fined \$50.00 at Sussex last week for violation of the Canada Temperance Act.—Furlong, the accomplice of Lewin in the passing of Gibson's paid check was acquitted last week, and Lewin has left the country.—The Chairman of the Water Commission in this city has resigned owing to financial embarrassments. He is at present in Boston.—A man named O'Leary has been arrested at Fredericton on a charge of bigamy; his second wife is a well known young lady of that place. The bigamist, as usual, is a Yankee ad- venturer.—The brig Annie Bogart, of Digby was wrecked at Grindshe Island on Saturday last and 3 lives lost.

UPPER PROVINCES.

The following appointments are gazet- ted: Samuel G. Rigby, Q. C., of Halifax, to be Judge of the Supreme Court, vice Desbarres resigned. Wm. Cochran Mil- ner, of Sackville, to be collector of Out- comes, Parliament was further prorogued till fourth of February, by the regular Gazette, but by an extra Gazette Parlia- ment is summoned to meet on the 9th of February for the despatch of business.—New regulations for the disposal of the Dominion coal lands provide for leases not to exceed 320 acres for 21 years, renewable for like term; the annual ground rent to be twenty five cents per acre, payable half yearly in advance and a royalty of ten cents per ton; failure to commence mining within two years, or active operations within one year to involve forfeit- ure of lease.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The American exploring ship "Jean- nette" about which the gravest fears had been entertained, has at last been found with all hands well.—During the celebration of high mass in the Church of the Holy Cross, at Warsaw, a man was seized while picking pockets. In order to ef- fect his escape the culprit cried "Fire." Immediately a great panic seized the congregation who rushed for the doors. During the confusion fifty women were crush- ed to death, and forty other persons seri- ously injured. The pickpocket was soundly beaten by the crowd. The cul- prit is a Jew. The lower class of people are much excited against his co-religion- ists, several of whom have been mal- treated, and had the windows of their dwellings broken. The military had to be called out.—In a shooting affray at Helenwood, Tenn., on the 25th, one man was killed and five others fatally wound- ed. The trouble grew out of a dog fight.

The World's London despatch says: The English government has determined to break up the Ladies' Land League, which has perfected its methods of agita- tion, and is as formidable as Parnell was. There are now three hundred and fifty prominent Irishmen in jail, lying there, of course, without trial, but the tale of agrarian outrages does not decrease, although there are now (counting constabulary with military) 50,000 armed men in the country. The daily story of the outrage and murder and ministerial incapacity is read with feelings of intense weariness in this country. The Premier may look for many bad quarters of an hour when Parlia- ment meets.—The Privy Council has determined to proclaim Dublin anew, making it illegal to possess arms without license.—Catholic priests are circulating in Ireland, copies of Bishop Nulty's letter to the priests of his diocese (Meath) stat- ing that the land is the common property of all.
