A FEW THOUGHTS ON THE PAST SIXTEEN YEARS.

The past sixteen years have gone like the fleeting shadows of a summer's eve. These are the years which have passed over my head since I first went to Yarmouth. Events have been rapid, vivid, solemn and cheerful, like the ever changing lines of a summer sky. Many friends have vanished, never again to cast their shadow on life's pathway, or to gaze with us on the beauties of rising and setting suns. Some have gone to genial climes, to look upon fairer scenes than earth can produce, and feel the warm glow of perpetual summer. The valley of death has been safely passed and now they walk the golden streets. Others again have fallen under the black shadows of a life of guilt, never to rise above the impenetrable darkness. In their land the Star of Bethlehem never shines, and golden harps are never heard. Sorrow, like a swelling tide, rises over the soul never again to ebb. There the darkness is unrelieved by a ray of light. Yet the crowds rush onward in the broad way—it is always full. Could the veil be lifted up and the last sixteen years disclose their results to the gaze of living mortals, what scenes of horror and despair would be revealed! Wailing and lamentations would be heard. Yet men will laugh at this, and rush on in their corrupt ways to this dark abode. I am startled at my own thoughts when I call to mind how slight are the impressions made upon the best of men by the solemn facts of revealed truth. God alone can duly impress the human mind with these eternal realities. Sin has an inconceivable and fascinating power which none but God's Spirit can arrest and destroy. The flowers that are most in the sunlight will be most beautiful, so the man who is most in the sunlight of God will be fairest to look upon. His conceptions of good and evil will be clear and true. He sees that pure happiness depends upon pure morality. Indeed the design of the gospel is to bring men into a pure, moral state. Misery then will take wings and fly away. Yet poor blind mortals oppose this system of revealed truth, which would shed glory around all their future prospects, open up delightful fields of thoughts, radiant with untold glories, ever bursting forth into new forms of expanding and majestic delight.

I was one of a group of ministers who laid the foundation of the Missionary Board at Yarmouth. Brother Day took the most prominent part in the development of its principles. Each point was carefully weighed and freely discussed. His pen nobly defended its greatest utility against an unnecessary attack which made a small ripple on the waters of paper-war. It was a harmless breeze which gave a wider spread to the canvass of the union bond. It brought its great utility before the denomination. That organization is now the most essential outlet to the strength of the body, in the development of pure Bible principles, for there is no other denomination which embraces all the Bible doctrine, and nothing else in its creed. I am happy to pen this last sentence, as one identified with the Baptists who preach the gospel on the banks of Jordan, and baptize their converts on a profession of their faith.

QUARTERLY MEETING.

According to appointment the Carleton and Victoria Counties Quarterly Meeting was held with the Jacksonville Baptist church on the 14th inst. Owing to the state of the roads and severity of the weather, there were not so many from a distance present as ordinarily. Bro. Ballentine preached on Friday evening. The sermon was followed by earnest addresses. Business meeting on Saturday forenoon, an excellent conference in the afternoon, and a good missionary meeting in the evening. Rev. Geo. IN MEMORIAM.

DEACON Z. HENRY BENNETT.

The news of the death of Z. Henry Bennett, who died at Alberton, P. E. Island, November 24th, spread an unusual gloom through the large circle in which he moved and was known. Brother B. was born in Cornwallis in the year 1818. There his youth was passed in preparation for the battles of life, but he did not depend on his own preparation or strength for victory, for when quite young he was brought to a saving knowledge of Christ, and in him he trusted. He buckled on the gospel armor and went forth in the strength of the Lord, through whom he at last conquered.

In 1836 he was baptized and began his life of usefulness in the church. Soon after this he removed to Calais, where he remained two years. In 1839 he removed to Pembroke, Maine, and the many friends whom he gathered round him during his ten years' stay there will read with grief these lines to the memory of one whom they loved and respected. In 1840 he was married to the noble-hearted lady who, now a widow, mourns the loss of her untiring affectionate husband.

Brother B. spent a short time in Mascarene, Charlotte Co., N. B., then he removed to Pennfield, where he remained until 1872, when he removed to Alberton, P. E. I.

Soon after coming to Alberton he joined the Baptist church, here and took an active part in advancing the cause of Christ, and as there were few male members of the church much of the work rolled on him; but

it was his greatest delight to be found in the service of Christ.

He was chosen to the deaconship about two years ago, and honored the confidence the church placed in him by his consistent walk and untiring efforts for the advancement of the kingdom of his Lord.

He continued in the active discharge of his duties until November 22nd, when, engaged in some work on his house, he fell and received injuries which caused his death. But although he was so suddenly called away, he was ready, with his lamp trimmed and burning.

Before he died he called his family to his bed-side and told them he was going home, and shortly after his spirit took its flight to God who gave it. No pain disturbed his parting hours, but he calmly sank down as into sweet sleep. For him death was disarmed of its terrors, and his spirit passed away in breathings of unutterable love and immortal hope.

Brother B. leaves four sons and three daughters. One son is away on the sea, and one daughter is in Eastport, Maine, the rest of the family are settled in Alberton.

We extend our sympathy to the widow and family in their bereavement, and ask the blessing of the Lord to rest upon them.—Com.

A VISIT TO ANDOVER.

To the Editors of the Visitor.

At Andover I met with my old friend and supporter Adam Beveridge. He supported me while in St. Francis by his constant attendance with his family at the Sabbath school and the preaching services. He was wonderfully persevering in this respect. I cannot remember that a storm or snow-drift ever stopped him. I can see him now as vividly as at the time he used to plough through the snow on many a bitterly cold, blustery day with his children covered up in the buffaloes. He also supported me by his money liberally. While in St. Francis several of his children died with the diphtheria, perfectly resigned and happy in prospect of their speedy departure. They called their young friends together and exhorted them to prepare to meet them in heaven. One of the boys quoted the passage, "Many shall come from the east and west and shall sit down with Abraham and Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven." When asked where he learned it, he replied in the Sabbath school.

Their triumphant deaths encourage me to persevere in sowing the seed of the Kingdom.

On Monday Bro. Vickery drove me over to Fort Fairfield to see Bro. and Sister Slocumb, whose kindness and warm-hearted christian hospitality so won my confidence and sustained me in my work in St. Francis during the time I remained with them as a member of their family. I found them very much interested in Colonel Howe, who is now lecturing on temperance at Fort Fairfield and vicinity. They think he is doing great good there. He has great sympathy for the drunkard and appears to be successful in pulling him out of the ditch. He proposes to make Fort Fairfield his centre for the winter campaign and lecture whenever called for.

On my return to St. Francis I called to see Sister Keating, my fellow-helper in the truth during my whole stay in St. Francis; but now living on the Tobique road five miles from Grand Falls. I have never been acquainted with any one who in my judgment has more clear and consistent views of Bible teaching. She has been a faithful laborer, too, in the cause of Christ, always at her post in the prayer and conference meeting to praise God and put down self.

At the Falls I met Judge Stevens, with whom I had a very interesting conversation. He is a very faithful and earnest preacher. Several of the people of St. Francis have spoken to me of the impressive manner of the judge's charge to the jury on criminal cases at Edmonston. His style of preaching is certainly very interesting and withal very dignified. It is also a rich treat to listen to his conversation. Having arrived at Baker

Brook I found the bridge of ice all gone; but the following Sunday at St. Francis it was stretched across again.
