

News Summary.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Carvill, McKean & Co., lumber shippers, St. John, have failed. On the 1st of January, Mr. E. R. Burpee assumed the position of Superintendent of the New Brunswick Railway. Codfish remain scarce, and a few fine fares have been taken at Grand Manan. Retail prices have advanced to 5c per lb. The Savings' Bank returns for December show the deposits for the month to have been \$123,947 and the withdrawals \$77,390.47. Henry Osburn, Esq., General Manager of the New Brunswick Railway, has sent his resignation of the position to the Directors of the road. The weather during the past week has been exceedingly cold, and the usual January "thaw" has not taken place as predicted by our weather prophets. Capt. A. H. Parker, of the bark "Melbourne," was presented with a Binocular Glass from the Government at the Mayor's Office, St. John, on the 4th inst., for rescuing the crew of the bark "Siliestria." Mr. A. Park, who teaches the Alms House school very successfully, received such injuries some time ago by a fall that he was unable to walk or attend to his scholastic duties for about four weeks. He is now almost quite recovered. Severn Smith, the colored man who on Dec. 6th was arrested for a savage assault on Timothy Connolly, on the "Western Extension," died on Sunday morning in the public hospital in consequence of a sickness contracted in the jail. The total Dominion revenue for the first six months of 1882-83 was \$18,065,597, against \$15,876,960 in the same period of 1881-82. The total revenue for December was \$2,480,764, compared with \$2,318,971 in the same month of 1881. Seven brigantines of 350 tons burthen are to be built at Parrsboro by W. W. Cannabell and others, for parties in New Zealand. The vessels will be despatched to N. Z. as fast as completed. I. Olive Jr., of Carleton, has been appointed foreman of the work. It is said that when Mr. Gibson's paper mill at Marysville is completed, he will build a railway from that point to the river at Gibson, to convey his goods there for shipment, and that he will also utilize it for the conveyance of his logs, instead of floating them down the Nashwaak. NOVA SCOTIA AND P. E. ISLAND Sydney harbor is frozen over. Pictou harbor is still clear of ice. Potatoes are selling for shipment at 50 cents per bus. in Kings Co. N.S. Quite a shock of an earthquake was felt in Annapolis New Years eve about 10 o'clock. Capt. W. T. Kelley, of Halifax, launched a fine brigantine called the "Zingara" 162 tons register, recently. The apple trade at Annapolis is very brisk now. One steamer has loaded and gone and two more are expected this month. Messrs. Yonston's barque "Orquell" which left Pictou Dec. 13, arrived in Cardiff on the 27th, making the passage in fourteen days. Mr. P. O. Wood, River Hebert, was attacked by a bear while chopping in the woods, recently, and got away from it with difficulty. The Colonial Standard, of Pictou, is to be issued by a joint stock publishing company. Mr. Power retires and Mr. Tanner assumes the position of managing editor. The inquest held by Dr. Black, of Amherst, upon the body of the young woman Pigot, resulted in the jury finding a verdict of "death from an overdose of strychnine." The firm of Wm. Cummings & Son, Truro, gave Christmas presents among their employes to the value of \$100. This speaks well both for the employers and employes. Mr. David Smith, of Lunenburg, N. S., launched on Dec. 26th from his shipyard the handsome schooner "Narcissus" of 127 tons register. Her owners intend to put her in the West India trade. Mr. L. B. Archibald, the Superintendent of the P. E. I. Railway has issued a circular ordering all employes found drunk to be instantly discharged. It is to be hoped that Supt. A. may succeed in having this enforced. Justices Cutten and Greenfield, of Amherst, imposed a fine of \$300 or six months' imprisonment, upon David Cameron for operating an illicit still at Spring Hill Junction. The accused, unable to subscribe the money, was incarcerated in jail.

OTHER PROVINCES.

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company will issue stock for \$75,000,000 on the European and American Markets. It is announced that the Canadian Parliament will meet for the despatch of business on the eighth of February. The land grant bonds of the Canadian Pacific Railway have been all sold by the Bank of Montreal, and the account closed. The National Line Steamship Co. have contracted for a new steamer of 5,400 tons, called the America, to ply between Liverpool and Montreal. It is stated that Mr. Archambault, Q. C., is preparing an action for \$50,000 damages against the Courier de Montreal, for libel against Mr. Senecal. Six thousand two hundred delegates attended the Liberal convention in Toronto Jan. 4th. Shaftsbury Hall was too small to hold the crowd, so two meetings were organized, one presided over by Mr. James Young, M. P. P., and the other by Captain McMaster. Addresses were delivered by Hon. Messrs. Blake, Mowat, McKenzie, Pardee, McLaughlin, Bell, Fleming, Hardy, Edgar and Rymal. The will of Sir Hugh Allan has been filed in Montreal. He leaves an estate estimated to be worth six to ten millions, exclusively amongst his own family. His eight daughters each receive \$150,000 on attaining their majority. During their minority they are allowed \$1,500 per year. The married daughters are to receive interest on their portion from the present until the estate is finally wound up and that will occur when the youngest son attains his majority. Hugh Montague and Bryce J. Allan will be made partners in the firm now. Their portion is \$50,000. Alex. R. Allan gets \$50,000 and a deed of the property he lives on in Brockville. Hugh Montague Allan is made heir of Ravenscraig, with \$400 per week to keep it up in present condition and style. At the settlement of the estate Hugh Montague gets one half, Bryce James one fourth, and Arthur Edward one-fourth of the residue. BRITISH AND FOREIGN. The Rhine is beginning to fall. Gambetta's fortune is estimated at about 750,000 francs. The Suez Canal tariff has been reduced half a franc per ton. Gladstone has resigned the chancellorship of the English exchequer. The Hematite Iron Company, Maryport, England, failed for \$1,000,000. The Danube is again rising and it is feared will break through Florisdorf dykes. The Standard's Syria correspondent reports that Erzeroum is placed under martial law. Germany is reported to be anticipating an amicable cession of Heligoland from England. Minneapolis has built 2054 houses and 296 stores the past year, at an outlay of \$8,242,825. The French Government devoted 20,000 francs to meet the cost of the funeral of Gambetta. The Malagassy envoys have started from Manchester with the American Consul for Madagascar. The New York city debt is \$96,141,943, about two millions dollars less than last year at this time. The Times Calcutta despatch says that the Exhibition there will open in December next. Goods intended for it are to be admitted free of duty. Following the example of Russia, Germany is stationing large garrisons on the frontier and erecting large barracks and double tracking some of her eastern railways. The year's work at the anthracite coal mines of Pennsylvania will be the largest on record. The shipments will aggregate 29,000,000 tons, or nearly one million more than the product of 1881. A merchant of Manchester, Eng., who failed thirteen years ago, and then paid his creditors half his dues, has lately surprised them by paying the balance. Legally he was free of his obligations, and it took \$125,000 to pay the creditors off. Such principle is so rare that it deserves record. The United States at the close of 1881 had within 4,000 miles as much railroad as all Europe. The total footing for the year will not be less than 12,000 miles. In less than three years there will be as many more miles of railroad in the United States, as in all the rest of the world besides. Gambetta died at his residence at Ville D'Aury, Paris, at midnight Sunday, 31st ult. He was quite conscious to the last. The death agony lasted two hours. Spuller, Meplorne, and Dr. Fleuzal were present at the last moment. The physicians who attended Gambetta state his death was due to suppressed erysipelas.
