Joseph Cook on Bible Wines.

Rev. Joseph Cook, preceding his
Boston "Moday Lecture" of the 3rd
ult., in answer to a question, discus-
ed the subject of "Bible wines" as
follows:

"1. 'Were Bible wines fermented
or unfermented?'"

"Both. There are wines spoken of
in the Scriptures that are denounced
with the full vigor of the Biblical
rhetoric. There is a wine spoken of
in the Bible that our Lord Himself
used. In certain passages the exces-
sive use of wine is condemned; in oth-
ers the fruit of the vine is spoken of
as a blessing. I do not enter here and
now into a discussion of the different
Hebrew and Greek words used in
these references; but they appear to
me to justify the assertion that the
Bible speaks of two kinds of wine, or
of one kind of wine in two states, and
not merely of two kinds or degrees of
the use of one and the same kind of
wine.

"2. 'Do any facts known as to our
Lord and Saviour's use of wine justi-
fy modern drinking customs as to
wine?'"

"There are those who believe it
both falsehood and blasphemy to as-
sert that our Lord and Master put
the intoxicating bottle to His neigh-
bor's lips. I make a distinction be-
tween 'strictly non-alcoholic' wines
and 'practically non-intoxicating'
wines. There is one school of tem-
perance reformers which thinks it im-
portant to maintain that the wine
used by our Lord had not the slight-
est alcoholic element in it. This may
have been the case. I do not under-
take to assert that it was not. Such
a denial could hardly be established,
because the unfermented juice of the
grape was widely used in Palestine
in ancient as it is in modern times. It
is utterly futile to claim that the juice
of the grape cannot be kept in an un-
fermented condition for years. It is
unscholarly to assert that the ancients
did not understand the simple process
of heating the juice of the grape to
about 180°, sealing it up so that the
air could not have access to it, and so
keeping it without fermentation. That
is substantially the process in mod-
ern times, and we have reason to
believe it was a process not unknown
in ancient times. But what if I could
not prove that there was absolutely
no alcoholic element in the wine our
Lord used? I should yet be able to
affirm that the wine He used was
'practically non-intoxicating.' I
think that can be proved beyond a
 peradventure. It may be proved on
the basis of His character. You say
His enemies called Him a wine-bibber.
Yes; and a more blasphemous libel,
perhaps, was never uttered during the
earthly life of Christ our Lord con-
cerning any of his personal habits.
Are you to repeat that libel eighteen
hundred years after it was answered
by our Lord Himself? Accused by
any theory of history that affirms
that our Lord and Saviour put the
dangerously intoxicating wine-cup to
his neighbor's lips! [Applause.] A
friend of mine, a young Syrian, who
was translating Butler's 'Analogy'
into his native tongue when I was at
Jerusalem, told me that the Bethle-
hem wines, the Jerusalem wines, and
the Hebron wines are to-day so light
and unintoxicating that you must or-
dinarily drink twenty-four cups to
produce the slightest effect even up-
on a person of nervous organization.
If one wishes to reach the beginning
of intoxication one must send, so my
informant said, for Cyprian wines or
order mixed wines such as the Scrip-
tures denounce. Now I will not
maintain that, in no case, did the wine
used by our Lord have the slightest
conceivable alcoholic element. Nev-
ertheless, I think it never has been
proved that our Saviour used fer-
mented wine. I will not make my-
self responsible for the assertion that
all the wine He used was absolutely
unfermented; but I will for the as-
sertion that He never put the danger-
ously-intoxicating bottle to His neigh-
bor's lips. When, therefore, gentle-
men come forward and say that our
Lord drank wine, and that, therefore
we may drink wine, I stand aghast at

the frivolity of such a position, at its
blasphemy, at its historic and logical
heedlessness and mischievousness. I
must assert this, although very lofty
authorities have held an opposite
view. Distilled liquors were not
known until many centuries after the
founding of christianity. Intemper-
ance has poisoned our blood in mod-
ern times. If our Lord and Saviour
were with us, can there be a doubt
but that He would knot up the whip
of small cords and purge our society
of all drinking habits that are tem-
ptations to diseased blood?"

Wesley on Liquor Revenue.

Rev. Dr. Wm. H. Holmes, in a
very interesting historical article up-
on "Methodism and the Temperance
Question" in the *Christian Ad-
vocate*, gives the following extract
from John Wesley on the subject of
liquor revenue:

"On the revenue from the sale of
liquors, Mr. Wesley said: 'However,
what is paid (the duty) brings in a
large revenue to the king.' Is this an
equivalent for the lives of his subjects?
Would his majesty sell 100,000 of his
subjects yearly to Algeria for £400,
000? Surely no! Will he then sell
them for that sum to be butchered by
their own countrymen? 'But other-
wise the swine for the navy cannot be
fed.' Not unless they are fed with
human flesh? Not unless they are
fatted with human blood? Oh! tell it
not in Constantinople that the Eng-
lish raise the royal revenue by selling
the flesh and blood of their country-
men.'

We commend this view of the sub-
ject to the thoughtful consideration of
the advocates of "high license."

GENERAL CLINTON B. FISK, in the
New York Tribune's "Talks About
Town," is reported as saying re-
cently:

"The liquor-traffic must be crushed
by the people of America. If the
saloons of New York were allowed
but twenty-five feet front each, and
placed in a straight line, they would
reach from the Battery to West
Point; while the churches of all de-
nominations, Roman Catholic includ-
ed, would scarcely reach to the
other end of Manhattan Island."

THEN AND NOW.—Senator Frye,
in a recent letter to the Maine State
Temperance Alliance, writes:

"In this matter of temperance the
Washington of to-day hardly resem-
bles that of twenty years ago. Then,
on New Year's day, the open house
without the hospitalities of the side-
board was almost unknown. Now
its tempting display of the wine that
mocks is almost forgotten. Then the
government official who was not
lavish in his offer of liquor to every
caller was looked upon as a fanatic
unworthy of his high position. Now
nothing would be more discredit-
able. Then the public man who refused
was regarded as eccentric—impolitely
odd. Now the majority decline. In
this reform Maine took the lead."

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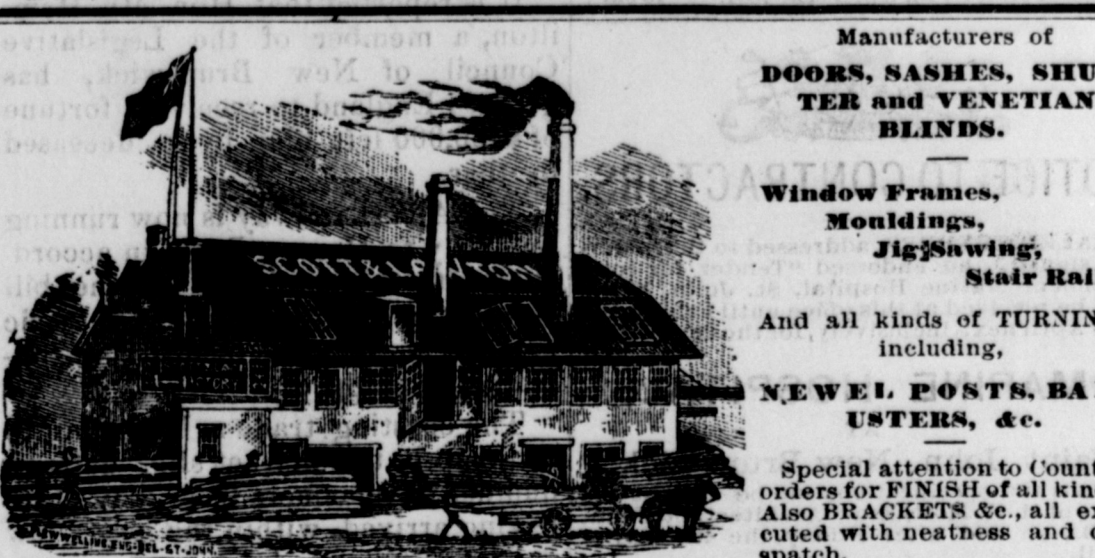
