The Ocean Abolished.

Marconi's latest achievement proves that as soon as there is a station on this side of the Atlantic similar to the one in Wales no steamship equipped with the necessary apparatus need be removed from communication with one of the shores. Ship owners, or other agents, can follow the progress of a ship hour by hour if they want to and in the event of a race between ocean greyhounds from coast to coast it could be followed as easily and as continuously as a yacht race lasting only a few hours. Those who go down to the sea in ships will still lose sight of land, but they need never be out of communication with those on land. The main terror of the ocean, therefore—always excepting the sickness—the misery, the isolation, the severance of normal relation, the being perched for a period between the thing that were and the things that are to be, the elimination of the present beyond the sides of the ships, passed hereafter into history as completely as the uncertainty felt by the mariners of Columbus that they would ever get anywhere. It must be supposed that hereafter, for some years, hardly a month will pass without some new use being found for this wonderful convenience—the young Italian has given the world. As with the telegraph the telephone and phonograph, we shall presently grow to be familiar with wireless telegraphy, and shall go about availing ourselves of its utility to our individual selves with as little sense of the marvellous as we now feel in going to the telephone. There are too many things in our everyday life that have a touch of the marvellous in them to put all our admiration upon any one. There are elements of the marvellous—or would be to the men of any given number of centuries ago—in the bread we eat, in the clothes we wear, in the house we live in, in the vehicles that annihilate space on land and sea for our convenience. Marconi has proved his case. Therefore we pass Marconi by and wait for the next one. "He is with the immortals," even if, as is probable, he prefers the society of mortals.

Both a Prisoner.

A London despatch of the 4th inst has the following:—

The Brussels correspondent of the 'Daily Telegraph' says in a despatch that Kruger has received a long report from General Botha affirming the Boer government to be fully determined to continue hostilities and outlining the proposed midsummer campaign.

It is reported, but the story is not confirmed, that General Louis Botha was recently made a prisoner and got away again. According to the report the affair happened after the capture of Borha's laager near Knapdaar, and the astounding details would not now be known had not a trick been played on the British censor. The tidings came in a private letter from an officer in the field, the letter having been mailed by an intermediary at a free port to avoid the censor's scrutiny and certain mutilation.

When Remington's troops made the night attack at Knapdaar they captured several prisoners and the camp equipment of the Boers. Among the men taken was General Louis Botha, but the British did not recognize him, and the other prisoner took care to shield him in every possible manner.

After a pursuit of the fugitives had ended the captured men were divided into groups, and Botha—fortunately for him—was included in the number that was entrusted to the care of the rear guard.

Another force of Boers, hearing of the disaster to the main body, and that their general had been captured, menaced the British command. In the confusion of the expected attack the body of British troops that held Botha as their prisoner permitted a few of the burghers to escape, and among the number was the redoubtable Botha.

Unpleasant Table Talk.

If there is ever a time when one should particularly avoid unpleasant conversation it is at table. It has been said that a merry heart adds digestion, and certainly ill-timed remarks and gossip are not conducive to a state of content. The hostess, therefore, who has the tact to keep the conversation at dinner in a happy channel, or the woman

who can guide the table talk at home in a cheery channel is a missionary of more import than she often realizes.

An excellent example of this thought is given in the story of a young matron, around whose table some distinguished men and women were gathered, and who was startled by the loud statement of her guest of honor that he had spent the day in the court room, where a scandalous divorce case involving the honor of a well known man and a hitherto much-loved woman was then being tried. The hostess with all the courteous entreaty of a voice too pleading to be offensive, interrupted:

"Forgive me, general; but it is sorrowful enough to know it is going on; please do not talk of it."

Although robbed of his proposed position of reporter, the general with a new deference in his manner, said: "I beg your pardon; I forgot that you might not be interested," and himself led the conversation in a different direction.

Crossed The Sea to Plead.

Judge Newburger suspended sentence yesterday on James Beniton Corr, who was arrested last January for stealing between \$6,000 and \$7,000 from the dry goods firm of which he was bookkeeper.

The aged father and mother of the prisoner, who had crossed the Atlantic to aid their erring son were in court, and made an earnest plea on behalf of the young man. The father is a wealthy painter and oil manufacturer of Belfast, Ireland. He has made full restitution for his son's speculations. The young man pleaded guilty to grand larceny.

"If I can save somebody it will take the rough edge off my work, which at the very best is none too pleasant," said Judge Newburger. "I will suspend sentence on this young man, on condition that he leave this country at once with his parents, who hurried here to save him. If at any time he returns here and does not conduct himself properly, nothing will save him from the most severe punishment I can inflict under the law."

Then, turning to the defendant, Judge Newburger said: "Go home, and sin no more."

"I thank you," said the young man. His mother fell on his neck, weeping with emotion.—New York Journal.
