LOCAL NEWS.

THUNDER SHOWER.—A heavy thunder shower passed over the city Saturday afternoon.

The entrance was made through the cellar, the burglars entering the cellar by a door in the back and coming up through the floor. Mr. Doherty does not know exactly what is stolen. A pile of clothing which was on the counter was picked through and scattered over the counter. Several burnt matches were scattered over the floor. Mr. Doherty does not miss any boots or shoes, but a number of pairs could have been stolen and not be missed.

The former being a much larger company, is no doubt the better company, but still the latter gives entire satisfaction wherever it goes. Before the Exhibition Building was burned it was said that the Fifth Avenue Company would play there. If the world, the Exhibition Building was minus a few cents, the Exhibition Building would still be standing, and the theatre-going people of this city have the privilege of seeing an extra performance.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.

A Lady is Drowned in attempting to save her Neice, who is also Drowned.

On Saturday afternoon about 5.20 o'clock the town was thrown in a state of excitement by a report that two persons had been drowned near Spring Hill. The first report spread but nothing definite could be ascertained as to who it was, or how it happened. Finally about six o'clock word was brought to town that Mrs. John Babbitt and Miss Maggie Chestnut were the persons, and that the former was

DROWNED IN ATTEMPTING TO SAVE the latter. On repairing to the scene of the tragedy the facts of the case were ascertained to be as follows: Mrs. Chestnut and her sister, Mrs. Babbitt, with their families have for the past few weeks been living at Berry Hill where the drowning occurred. They have occupied rooms at Mr. James Camber's during the night but have lived in a small house near by during the day. On Saturday afternoon Nellie Randolph, a niece of these two ladies, who has been stopping there also, and Maggie Chestnut wished to have a bath. Mrs. Babbitt said she would accompany them in case of anything happening. Near the place where the girls entered the water was a scow on which Mrs. Babbitt sat down with a knitting work. The girls went in the water Miss Chestnut being a little ahead of Nellie Randolph. All at once Nellie saw Miss Chestnut disappear and immediately after Nellie felt herself going under the water. In plunging, however, her foot touched a rock by means of which she was able to raise herself with sufficient force to place her in shallower water again. When she got there she called to her aunt, who was a few yards above. Nellie says when she looked at her aunt she was waving her hands at them and until she (Nellie) called does not think that their danger was known. Mrs. Babbitt cast a glance around apparently looking for help and then throwing her knitting work down, ran down the bank and

PLUNGED IN THE WATER. Nellie on getting out turned and saw them near each other both disappearing at the same time. This is the last time they were seen. When Nellie ran up the bank for help a man named J. Dunphy was coming down the road to whom Nellie told what had happened. When he got to the spot, however, he was unable to do anything as neither Mrs. Babbitt or Maggie Chestnut were visible and Dunphy was unable to swim. He set to work making a grapple and with help that arrived from Spring Hill commenced searching for the bodies. The body of Mrs. Babbitt was found about 5.45, or about forty-five minutes after she was drowned. The body of Maggie Chestnut was not found until 10 o'clock yesterday morning although the river was dragged all night. It was about 150 yards below where she entered the water. The most remarkable feature of the whole affair is that when she was found her spectacles were held by her two hands as she had taken them off showing clearly that she had

DIED WITHOUT A STRUGGLE. Maggie was the only daughter of Mr. Henry Chestnut of this town and was fourteen years of age. Her remains were left at Berry Hill from which they will be conveyed for burial. The funeral will take place this morning at 9 o'clock.

As soon as the news reached here Mr. Babbitt accompanied by Mrs. Dr. Black drove to the scene of the accident. They arrived there about the time that the body of Mrs. Babbitt was recovered, and although every effort possible was put forth, owing to the length of time that the body was in the water,

LIFE COULD NOT BE RESTORED.

Mrs. Babbitt's body was conveyed to town about 2 o'clock yesterday morning and will be interred this afternoon, the funeral leaving the house at 3 o'clock.

Mrs. Babbitt is the youngest child of the late Mr. Wm. Turnbull, of Bear River, Digby Co., N. S. Mr. Turnbull's family consisted of eight children, the other seven of whom are living. Mrs. Turnbull, Mrs. Babbitt's mother, is a very elderly lady, living with Mr. Randolph. This is, therefore, the first death that has occurred in the family since Mr. Turnbull's death, which happened thirty-seven years ago. The remaining family consist of two brothers, both living in St. John, W. V. Turnbull and C. G. Turnbull; and five sisters, Mrs. Chestnut, Mrs. Randolph and Mrs. Justice Steadman, of this city, and Mrs. C. E. Burnham and Mrs. Falis, of St. John.

This shock to the family is a severe one. Especially does the blow fall heavy on Mrs. Babbitt's mother and on Mrs. Chestnut, who, although in poor health, has to bear the loss of a sister and a daughter. This event has cast a gloom over the whole community, every one admitting that years have passed since as sad an affair as this has occurred. Our sincerest sympathies are with the mourners in this sad affliction.

RELEASE OF McDONALD.—Saturday morning McDonald, who was some time ago committed for trial at the County Court for perjury, was released upon his own recognizance to appear for trial. The application was made to Chief Justice Allen by Mr. A. L. Belyea, upon affidavit of the facts disclosed at the examinations of Thompson and Martin, in which the material facts were the same as in McDonald's case.

SEPULTURE.—The remains of Mrs. Paisley, was interred yesterday afternoon. The funeral left her late residence George street, at three o'clock. The following were pall bearers Geo. Hatt, ser. Geo. Coulthard, John Edgcomb, A. P. Miller, John Edwards, and S. H. McPherson.

Attempt to Assassinate the Police Magistrate.

This morning at four o'clock Police Magistrate Marsh was awakened by some person at his door. He came to the head of the stairs and enquired who was there. A voice replied:

"You are wanted at the office right away." Mr. Marsh added "what's the matter?" The voice, Dow Vandine is shot. Mr. Marsh, "Who are you?" The Voice, "John Hurley." Mr. Marsh, "What, Jack Hurley?" The Voice, "No, John Hurley the Shoemaker up town."

Mr. Marsh made some reply when the person at the door asked if he would not come at once. Mr. Marsh replied that he would come at once. Upon that a pistol shot was fired.

The pistol was evidently placed quite close to the woodwork of the window, which bears the mark of the powder and pointed in the direction of the place where Mr. Marsh was standing. The ball struck the banisters a little below Mr. Marsh's position. He at once seized a small pistol and ran to his front window, when he saw

passing by out of the gate. He at once fired at them but missed. He then threw open the shutters. As he did so, one of the men, who had passed beyond the range of the next building returned apparently to renew the attack. As he came to the corner of the house, Mr. Marsh again fired. This was repeated three times, but unfortunately the miscreants escaped uninjured. They must have got away very rapidly; for though the police were very soon upon the ground they saw none of them.

CRICKET.—The match between the Liberal and Conservative members of the club is to be concluded this afternoon. While our cricketers are by these matches being put in better condition for meeting another club than they have been, yet, considering the strenuous efforts that are being put forth by other clubs, especially by the St. John club, to insure victory in their next match, they should not be content with the practice received in an occasional match, but spend more time in the field. For a few years St. John has cherished the idea that they had the best eleven in the province, and the results of matches tended to prove this. This year, however, they have been twice beaten on their own ground. Since then the zeal which the hope of victory itself inspires has not been sufficient, but the club has had recourse to other inducements to fit the club to win back their laurels. Let our boys then so arrange matters, that at the next meeting with St. John, they will present a respectable show.

With regard to the match with Moncton, the secretary, Chas. L. Richards, has received a letter that arrangements will be made for a match at their next meeting.

FEITS FOR DAMAGES.—Saturday morning William Russell was served by Sheriff Temple with a writ at the suit of James Martin, for malicious prosecution and assault, the damages in each count being laid at two hundred dollars. It will be remembered that Russell charged Martin, before Justice Anderson, with perjury, but failed to satisfactorily establish his charge, and the case was dismissed. The assault is alleged to have been committed on the day of the attempted re-arrest of Martin by Barker and Russell, in front of the Queen Hotel.

Deputy Sheriff Long was also served with a writ, in an action brought by Martin, for false imprisonment. The damages are laid at two hundred dollars.

Mr. A. L. Belyea is the plaintiff's attorney in both cases.

FIRE.—A barn belonging to Frank Doherty, situated on the Brick Kill Road, was destroyed by fire at 2 o'clock this morning. The fire was the work of an incendiary and the police are on his track.
