THE SCHOOLS.—The vacations in the public

Time 2.37, 2.38, 2.37½.THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND SYNOD.—The
thirteenth session of the Church of England
Synod of the Diocese of Fredericton opened
on Wednesday in St. John. His Lordship
the Metropolitan, the Bishop Co-adjutor,
sixty-one other clergymen and fifty-nine
lay delegates were present. A long and in-
teresting discussion occurred over the recog-
nition of the Rev. Mr. Davenport of the
Mission Church as a member of the Synod.
A memorial was presented from the Parish
of St. Paul, in which the Mission Church is
situated, protesting against the establish-
ment of the church and the licensing of Mr.
Davenport. The matter was finally referred
to a Committee.Rev. Canon Medley was elected Secretary
of the Synod.A request was submitted from the House
of Bishops asking the diocese to con-
tribute £300 towards the salary of the Bishop
of Algoma. It is proposed to raise an en-
dowment fund of £5,000, of which £1,000
will be contributed by the S. P. G. of Eng-
land, provided the balance be raised in four
years.COLLEGIATE SCHOOL EXAMINATION.—The
midsummer examination of the Collegiate
School was held yesterday afternoon. Among
the visitors were Dr. Harrison, Dr. Bailey,
Prof. Rivet, the Secretary of the School Trust-
ees, Mr. Foster, of the Park Barrack School,
Principal Crockett and others, including a
number of former pupils and ladies. The
classes were examined in classics by Mr.
Parkins, in geography, history and arithmetic
by Mr. Horseman, in English grammar,
analysis and composition by Miss Gregory,
and in geometry by Mr. Fenwick. Mr. Par-
kins, in referring to the work of the school,
said that the pupils of this school had taken
during the past year, high positions at dif-
ferent schools and colleges in Canada, among
them being three gold medalists besides a
number of other prize winners. The prizes
awarded were as follows: Lorne Silver
Medal and mathematical prize, the latter
given by the University, Frank Jarvis, of St.
John; Douglas Silver Medal to William
Anderson, of Fredericton. Dr. Harrison
made a few remarks, praising the efficiency
of the school, after which the examination
closed.

Water Supply.

As the question of Water Supply is now the
most prominent matter engaging the atten-
tion of our citizens, we present a number of
facts bearing upon the Holly, or direct pump-
ing, system. The facts are taken from the
report of the Engineer of the Town of Water-
town, Massachusetts.From Binghampton, New York, the Super-
intendent of Water works, writes as follows:
"Our water works were established in 1858,
and have been in constant and successful
operation since, and are known as the Holly
Water Works. * * * We are running to-day
(1874) the same engine pumps and machinery
put in by this company, and we are now sup-
plying over three thousand water takers from
over twenty-two miles of water mains. In-
cluded in this number, as one water taker, is
the entire fire department of the city, having
for its use over one hundred and fifty fire
hydrants, some of which are over two miles
from the pumping house." He also says
they supply six railway companies and various
factories, some of which employ hundreds
of men. "Having had charge of the water
works since the engines started in October
1858, I can truthfully say there never has
been the slightest failure of any portion of
the work furnished by the Holly Company,
and it is working to-day with the same ease
and smoothness, and is in as good order as
when first put in motion, and to this date has
performed over sixteen years constant ser-
vice, of ten hours per day, with less than fifty
dollars expense in the engine, pumps and
machinery. * * * From my experience as
Superintendent of the Holly system of water
works here and from witnessing the same in
other places, I am fully satisfied that it is the
cheapest in first cost, most economical in
maintaining, and more reliable than any
other system of public water works now in
use or known. * * * With our mode we
maintain simply domestic pressure and put
up to fire pressure when told to do so by our
alarm telegraph, extending to all our hose
depots. The water is always forced promptly
and in abundance. Our steam and hand en-
gines are never called into use, and our loss
by fire has been of little account since our
works were established."The report from Bangor is to the same ef-
fect, but speaks even more highly of this sys-
tem, which has been improved extensively
since the Binghampton works were set up.
An account is given of a test of the Bangor
works, made at the instance of the Newbury-
port Commissioners, and the verdict of the
Commission is "the Holly system is the
system." The town of Taunton, Mass., sent
circulars to a number of towns and cities
asking for information as to this system.
From the replies we learn much of value.
Columbus, Ohio, has a supply of 9,000,000
gallons a day, distributed through 33½
miles of pipes by this system. In reply
to the question, "Has the Holly system
proved entirely satisfactory and would you
recommend it for a city of twenty thousand
inhabitants?" twenty six replies were re-
ceived all of which are favorable except two.
In one of these the reply is that "Our works
are too light for our city," the other says
that "An engineer would do himself an in-
justice to recommend any system without a
personal knowledge of the locality where it
was proposed to introduce it," but the other
replies are as follows, Allegan, Mich., "It
has, and would recommend it to any city;"
Auburn, N. Y., "Entirely satisfactory. Our
city would not change for any other sys-
tem;" Columbus, Ohio, "Yes, without any
reservation;" Memphis, Tennessee, "Yes,
one hundred thousand;" Saginaw, Mich.,
"It has more than met our expectations;"
and so on.In sixty cities and towns having Holly
water works the authorities have sold or
offered for sale their steam and hand fire-
engines, because they have no further use
for them, except in some cases where a part
are retained to protect the buildings not
within reach of the hydrants. From Auburn,
N. Y. we are told that they only have one
hand engine on hand which "is stored in the
second story of a building." From
Rochester, N. Y., "Three steamers out of
service. After some extension of mains will
dispenze with two others," and there are
other reports to the same effect.DISGRACEFUL JOURNALISM.—The *Capital*
justifies its insulting remarks in reference to
Mr. John Calhoun by saying that what it
published was not given "as facts—merely
as Bloomfield Ridge yarns." A more hu-
miliatory confession than this no journal can
make. It is disgraceful to the press of New
Brunswick that a paper published in this
Province believes it to be right to publish
deliberate falsehoods about people and
prides itself upon its superior "cuteness" in
so doing. But it is not content with pub-
lishing falsehoods about Mr. Calhoun, it
must further insult him.In reference to the statement that Mr.
Calhoun disavows the communication and
his signature to it, we have simply to tell
the editor of the *Capital* that he (the editor of
the *Capital*) is a wilful and deliberate
liar. We apologize to our readers for
using this expression; but we desire
to place on record the fact in the plainest
and most unmistakable terms. Ordinarily
we do not care what the *Capital* says; but
when he throws out his accusations of for-
gery we wish to give him the plainest pos-

Methodist Conference.

THURSDAY'S SESSION.

The first business that occupied the atten-
tion of the Conference yesterday was the
travelling expenses and the report of the
Committee on the same was adopted. The
following is part of the Committee of the
Children's Fund, Revd. Messrs. Duncan
Currie, Combsen, Johnson and Marshall.
The Contingent Fund Committee submitted
the following resolutions:That the Conference be recommended to
instruct the district meetings to make
definite arrangements for the more efficient
working of the fund by public meetings so
as to more largely aid in carrying out the
second object of the fund; and secondly—
The Committee also recommend that the
whole of the grant from the R. and E. Fund
be devoted to the relief of brothers suffering
from large unprovided deficiencies and that
a small committee be appointed to look into
the question and apportion amounts to
several brethren and report to the Confer-
ence.The report of the Children's Fund Com-
mittee was laid on the table.Rev. Mr. Weddall moved the following
resolution, which was unanimously adopted:Resolved, Financial District Meetings be
recommended by this Conference to take into
consideration the advisability of providing
one or more Scholarships for each District.
Such Scholarships to be made available for
ensuing year.Leave of absence was granted to Rev. Mr.
King for two weeks to visit his friends in
Boston; also to Rev. Mr. Pepper to visit
England, the latter gentleman to supply a
substitute. A vote of thanks was passed in
favor of the choir of the Methodist Church;
also a vote of thanks in favor of Dr. Young
for his services during his visit.

Dr. Young made a short reply.

The order of the day was then taken up,
and as it was in regard to the Centennial
Exhibition, the committee submitted a reso-
lution to the effect that this Conference ap-
prove of the resolutions passed by the N. S.
Conference, and join them in the celebration
of the event, and the building of a new Col-
lege Hall at Sackville. After speeches were
delivered by Revs. Messrs. Daniel, Pickard,
Duke, Currie and others, the resolutions
were unanimously adopted.

Session adjourned at 12.30.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The first work of the afternoon was the
hearing of Rev. Mr. Daniel's pastoral ad-
dress. It was adopted and ordered to be
placed in printed minutes.Mr. Chapman read the report of the com-
mittee appointed to inquire into the Milltown
matter, which report was adopted.The Conference then elected the remaining
number of delegates which had been left yester-
day. The persons elected were Revds.
Messrs. Sprague, Duncan, Currie, Evans
Chapman, Cowperthwaite, Marshall, and
Pope.Rev. S. T. Teed was elected alternate mem-
ber of committee. Rev. Mr. Duncan was re-
elected Financial Agent of the Conference
to the General Conference. The following
were appointed as a special committee—Drs.
Pickard, Stewart, Pope, and Revds. H. Dan-
iel and Reid. Committee of arrangements,
Revds. Dutcher, Currie, Duncan, Deinstadt,
Sprague, Burwash and Campbell. The next
General Conference will be held at St.
Stephen, on the 4th Wednesday in June.
The order of business for 1883 was read and
accepted.

Session adjourned at 5.30 p. m.
