LOCAL NEWS.

ARRIVING.—Most of the Students of the University arrived yesterday.

PARTIDGE SHOOTING.—Yesterday was the day set by law for the beginning of partridge shooting.

POLICE NEWS.—A lad named Ross was fined \$2.40 yesterday for stealing apples from John Cole.

C. T. ACT.—Some cases under the Canada Temperance Act will be before the Police Court to-day.

P. O. BOXES.—The Post Office boxes are absolutely insecure. With a stout knife one could open any of them.

TOW BOATS.—There are two tow boats at the wharf now; they came down the river laden with the productions of Shaw Bro. tannery.

THE COURT HOUSE.—The alterations on the Court House are all completed except the painting of the woodwork and putting the shelves in the vaults.

PICNIC.—The Methodist picnic on Ox Island near Burton, was quite a success. The amount cleared was over \$80. The repairs of the church will go right on.

UNSUCCESSFUL SEARCH.—As some of the planks were being taken up from the street yesterday, an "eye was kept" for the billiard ball which so curiously disappeared a few weeks ago, but the ball was not found.

THE STEAMERS.—The *Florenceville* and *David Weston* arrived about the same time that the *Queen* left her wharf for St. John yesterday. The number of persons travelling by the river seems to be as large as at any time this summer.

CITY COURT.—Mr. Marsh, P. M., was engaged all day yesterday in trying a disputed matter of account between Messrs. Inch and Estey, both of Bright. Mr. Black and Mr. J. A. Vanway appeared for the plaintiff and defendant respectively.

A USE FOR THEM.—It has been suggested that the best of the planks out of the Queen street sidewalk should be laid out to the railway station. An order was made for a plank sidewalk from Long's Hotel to the station seven years ago.

BAZAAR AT KESWICK RIDGE.—Under the auspices of the F. B. church a bazaar came off yesterday afternoon, owing to the weather the attendance was not as large as it otherwise would have been, yet there were a good number present and the affair was a success.

NEW ORGAN.—The Methodist congregation of Nashwaak have purchased another fine organ for their church from Messrs McMurray & Fenety. This firm has ordered one of the same make for the Episcopal Church, Stanley, and another for the Kirk Sunday School of this city.

JUDGMENTS.—Judge Wetmore will deliver judgment in the case of the Albert county members, which was heard Tuesday evening, on Monday next. The Police Magistrate will deliver judgment in the case of the City of Fredericton, ex Commercial Travelers, on Saturday next.

TEA MEETING AND CONCERT.—To-day is the date fixed for the tea meeting and concert on the grounds of W. H. Griffith, Cardigan. The services of a party from the city have been obtained, both to sing and deliver addresses. Sports will be held in the afternoon, for which prizes are offered.

THE LEGISLATIVE LIBRARY.—It would be a good plan if the Legislative Library Committee would put Mr. Lester in care taker of the Parliament Building, in charge of the Library during the days that the Librarian is not there. Mr. Lester keeps things in excellent shape, and it would be beneficial to the Library and a source of satisfaction to strangers if it were open.

THE PAVEMENTS.—The Road Committee have decided to take up the plank sidewalk from Westmorland to York and from Regent to St. John street, and to put up a temporary curb and lay a pavement ready to receive the asphalt. This is all that will be done this fall. The temporary curb will be eighteen inches inside of where the permanent curb will stand and will be made of deals.

DEATH OF MR. M. S. EARLE.—Mr. M. S. Earle, son of Coroner Earle, who went to Manitoba not long since and was taken ill, died at Winnipeg on Tuesday afternoon. On the tidings of his son's illness reaching St. John, Dr. Earle started immediately for the West but did not arrive before the death of his son. Dr. Earle's many friends will deeply sympathize with him and the family in their deep affliction.

WATER WORKS.—Operations at the well and trench are being pushed forward with all possible speed. The well is down for about one half the necessary distance, and is now being sunk into a bed of blue clay of unknown thickness. The trench is about one third dug. The rain has somewhat interfered with the work, but not seriously. The guard crib is being built under the supervision of Mr. Kennedy. From present indications the committee will get their work done in good time, and at a reasonable cost. We learn that it is possible that the day's delay in accepting the tenders for iron pipe may occasion a fortnight's delay in its shipment from Scotland.

ELECTION PETITIONS.—The Kent election petition will be tried on the 38th inst., notwithstanding the resignation of Messrs. Wheten and LeBlanc. When we say tried, we mean that the Chief Justice will attend to try it and the petitioner will insist upon his proceeding to hear evidence on the question of personal disqualification. To this the answer will probably be made that the Act does not provide for a judgment in the matter of disqualification unless a judgment be given at the same time on the question of the election, and that the members having resigned, the Court cannot make any order in respect to the election, and consequently none on the personal matter.

The Kings Dominion election petition will be tried on Monday before Judge Weldon. We judge from the course taken by Mr. Foster in the local election that he contemplates having to fight his battle over again, and thinks it well to make all possible capital for himself.

KING WILLIAM.—The schooner bearing this name for a load on the stern, and a load of gravel on the bow, is worth a view. She is anchored beside the wharf, where the master and crew (which are one and the same), is at hand ready as well as willing to furnish any amount of information about the vessel. The name of the captain and crew is Weldon, which also is the name of the builder, the whole craft having been built, and being now owned and manned by one individual. "Not a plank in her is steamed. Every one is hewn to shape," said the builder, and we accepted his statement with a little mental reservation on the question of shape. "She is steady as a rock," said the Captain, and we believed him. "It takes a good deal of wind to drive her," said the crew, and we thought it likely. The "King William" is loaded with gravel for Mr. Randolph, whom the captain and crew unite in pronouncing "a little the finest man in the Province."

Suicide of a Canadian.

A QUEBEC GOVERNESS WHO WAS TIRED OF LIFE.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—A tall, shapely woman of 30, well dressed, with jet black hair, dark eyes, a fair complexion, and regular features, applied at the Sturtevant house on Wednesday, and was given rooms 41 and 42, among the best in the house. She had two trunks. She said she was to leave the city yesterday. She paid for her board in advance, and appeared to be well provided with money. She registered as "Madame Delvriel." Nobody about the hotel knew her or had seen her before. On Thursday morning the hotel attendants remarked a strong smell of gas, which seemed to escape from the keyholes and crevices of her door. Knocking failed to arouse the occupant. Then the door was forced, and the woman was found lifeless in her bed. On the table was an empty wine bottle. She had evidently retired after turning on all the gas in the room. Search revealed the fact that she had left a packet directed to Edward Sheridan, a superintendent of carriages at one of the city hotels. Sheridan was sent for and recognized the woman as Josephine Parant of St. Germain, Province of Quebec, Canada. She had left for him, to pay her funeral expenses, \$241 in cash, and some jewelry and trinkets. She had bought a ticket for home, had sent one trunk, and had expressed her intentions to send another. According to Sheridan's story, he had known the woman for several years. She had stopped at various hotels in the city, and was a governess. He said she came of a good family in Canada, and that she had one sister, who was a sister of charity. She had informed her people that she was married, and had had a notice of her marriage published in a newspaper and had forwarded it in order to deceive them. She was well educated and spoke French fluently. Her chief occupation was teaching French. For several years Sheridan said he had known of her having rooms in various places in this city. She had lived in Waverly place, id Twenty-fourth street, and in Brooklyn, always in respectable houses. Within two years she went south with a wealthy family, in the capacity of governess, and Sheridan told Coroner Knox that she had recently confessed to him that she was leading a bad life and that she would commit suicide to end it if he would take charge of her remains. He says that he reasoned with her, and that

she afterwards said would go to her people. She recently spoke of taking a house on Forty-sixth street, but that plan fell through, and she telegraphed to Canada withdrawing from an arrangement for one of her relatives to come back and live with her. An inquest will be held.

AFFAIRS IN EGYPT.

ALEXANDRIA, Sept. 19.—A troop of the Indian Cavalry escort the Khedive from this city to Cairo on Thursday.

Abdullah Pacha telegraphed that he never intended to disobey the orders of the Khedive, and intimates his readiness to surrender. He says that he awaits the Khedive's orders.

Ironclads Menotaur, Sultan, Inconstant and Achilles, and gunboats Falcon and Condor are now anchored off Aboukir forts. They will be occupied by sailors and marines.

Altogether 2,300 men from various parts have made submission at Kafr-el-Dwar.

Telegraphic censorship has been abolished.

The *Times* despatch from Cairo says Abdallah Pasha has surrendered.

From 10 o'clock on Monday morning until late in the afternoon infantry, cavalry and artillery poured in from Aboukir and surrendered their arms. There are many more to come.

The *Times* Zagazig despatch says the Khedive sent a despatch, commanding that all respect be paid to British troops, who come as friends, and urging all persons to return to their usual avocations.

A despatch from Cairo to the *Chronicle* says Gen. Wolseley and Admiral Seymour are concerting a plan for a simultaneous attack on Damietta by land and sea.

Abdallah Pacha, commander at Damietta, has requested that an officer be sent to inform him of recent events. This is considered as foreshadowing the surrender of Damietta.

A large body of Egyptian infantry with four batteries, supposed to be from Salihieh, appeared at Tintah and surrendered to a battalion of Highlanders.

Mahmond Pacha Some has been arrested disguised as a priest.

Two passenger trains daily are now running between Cairo and Kafr-el-Dwar.

All the Egyptian wounded in the battle at Tel-el-Kebir have been brought here.

The Grenadiers are guarding Arabi Pacha and Toulba Pacha.

Half of Gen. Wood's brigade start for Cairo to-morrow. The remainder go there on Thursday. There are now 300 officers prisoners at Ramleh. They place some consequence on the reports that the Christians at Damanhour are sent there by train.
