LOCAL NEWS.

REFORM CLUB.—There will be a meeting of the Reform Club to-morrow (Tuesday) evening at 8 o'clock.

THE PULPIT.—Rev. J. E. Reud, of Keswick, will officiate in the Free Baptist Church during the absence of Rev. Joseph McLeod.

EXCURSION.—Hiram Lodge, F. & A. M., will give a moonlight excursion on the "David Weston" on the evening of the 31st instant.

PERSONAL.—Hon. W. H. Odell and lady are at present visiting here.

Mr. Cudlip, Inspector of Customs, was in town Saturday.

THE FLORENCEVILLE went to St. John Saturday. She will remain there until the water in the river rises, when she will load with freight for up-river.

PUBLIC ORAL EXAMINATION.—The public oral examination of the Normal School will be held on Friday next, the examinations for licences the following Tuesday.

POLICE NEWS.—The case of Newton Lee, for violation of the Canada Temperance Act, was concluded Saturday morning. Lee was fined \$50 and costs, or two months jail.

INTERCOLONIAL APPOINTMENT.—Mr. Thomas Foote has been superannuated, and Mr. Thos Williams appointed to the office of Treasurer of the Intercolonial Railway thus vacant.

RECOVERED.—James Perry, who a few weeks ago had his shoulder blade broken by being thrown from a cart, in the race course has sufficiently recovered to be able to work again.

CHANGE OF TIME TABLE.—A new time table takes effect on the New Brunswick Railway this morning. Most of the changes are slight. Hereafter a mixed train will run up the line leaving Gibson at 7.30 a. m. For further particulars see advertisement.

MARITIME BANK.—The branch of the Maritime Bank, opened on Monday last, has already begun to receive patronage. Mr. Ray is here yet and will remain until the Bank is fitted up and in thorough working order. Work was commenced on the vault Saturday.

THE MAYOR OF HALIFAX will visit this city some time during the last of this week. He is agent for the Brokenshire pavement and will visit the city with the view of that sort of pavement being used for the sidewalks. At one time this kind was proposed to be used but it was considered too expensive.

RETURNED.—Messrs. Andrew Straton, Frank Straton, W. Bliss Carman, and Fred St. J. Bliss, who left here two weeks ago on a trip up river, arrived home Saturday. They came from Edmundston in canoes. These gentlemen consider that two weeks in the summer can not be spent more profitably or more pleasantly than this way.

OVERBOARD.—On Saturday morning a man named Douglas, who was working on the Lizzie G. loading hemlock bark, fell from the top of the bark in the river. Douglas, could not swim and there being nothing for him to catch hold of went down twice before a rope was thrown to him. Having caught the rope he was landed on board, and soon was all right again.

NEW PAVEMENT.—The new pavement that is being put down between Carleton street and Wilmut's alley will be done as follows: a layer of stone is put down on which is a layer of earth. This is rolled and then another layer of stone such as is used for macadamizing, then a layer of gravel. This is rolled again and after a layer of cement is put on it, the sidewalk is completed.

CUSTOMS SEIZURE.—Mr. Cudlip, Inspector of Customs, and Mr. O'Keefe, of the Customs Department of St. John, seized goods to the value of \$1,200, in the possession of S. F. Shute, jeweller, on Saturday. Mr. Shute, however, was ignorant that the goods in his possession were smuggled in the Dominion, having bought them from a Montreal firm, on whom will fall any penalty attached thereto.

THE METHODIST ORGAN.—The new organ for the Fredericton Methodist Church, which has been placed in position, was subjected to a test yesterday at the hands of Prof. Sterne. The test proved satisfactory to those present. In volume of tone the organ is fully up to anything which could be desired, and in point of sweetness there seems very little to be desired. The organ is from the manufactory of S. R. Warren & Son, Toronto.

SUICIDE IN ST. JOHN.—On Friday evening last an unknown man committed suicide in St. John by jumping over Merritt's wharf into the water, where he was quickly drowned. His remains were grappled for and found with little difficulty and forthwith taken to the dead house. Inquiries were then made, in order to find out what the man's name was. This proved to be Daniel McCarty, brother of a Mrs. McCarty, who keeps a sailor's boarding house on Germain street. From Mrs. McCarty it was learned that Daniel McCarty was a gardener by trade, and formerly employed by Hon. John Robertson. He has been in the States for some time, and returned to St. John on the 15th inst. On Tuesday evening when he entered Mrs. McCarty's house he was cut and bleeding, but could not tell where he was when it happened. Some time ago he received an injury on the head, and since then when he was drinking. The liquor appeared to set him crazy.

Deceased was about 45 years of age. Coroner Earle held an inquest on the remains on Saturday.

A DAY AFTER THE FAIR.—Our semi-weekly contemporary told its readers on Saturday that a petition against the return of Messrs. Blair and Colter is talked of. Seeing that Friday was the last day for filing petitions in York, it would seem to be a waste of breath to talk of any petition. It also says a petition against the Sunbury election is spoken of. We beg to inform it that the time for filing that petition expired on Thursday. Also, our friend says that one from Kent is spoken of. The Kent petition was filed on Saturday.

A CORRECTION.—The *Capital* in its report of the proceedings in the Martin case makes a few errors which we think ought to be corrected. Mr. Lugin did not order Russell and Barker to desist from arresting Martin and Mrs. Cochrane. He simply asked them to produce their authority, and of their own accord they at once released the prisoners. Messrs. Lugin and Belyea did not lay complaints for assault and battery. New papers were not made out against James Martin. He was arrested so the gaoler says upon the original warrant. Mr. Lugin did not on Saturday morning inform the Justice that he had no right to remand the prisoner. He did not know he had been remanded, and was informed by the gaoler that he was brought up for the purpose of being taken before the Chief Justice. These errors made by our contemporary were made in all good faith, but it is just as well that they should be corrected.

MARTIN'S CASE.—The habeas corpus in Martin's case was argued before the Chief Justice on Saturday. Mr. Lugin contended that the prisoner was illegally imprisoned. Barker, who arrested him, not having been a constable. Therefore, he argued, the Magistrate had no right to remand him. That, even if the arrest were regular, the remand was not valid, being made for no good cause, and to an improper person. That, not being properly in arrest, Martin was justified in escaping, and that Long had no right to retake him. That the warrant was exhausted when the first remand was made, and Long had no right to act under it at the time of the second arrest.

Mr. Wetmore contended that Barker was *de facto* a constable, and his acts were to be deemed legal. That it was not necessary to show why the remand was made. That, if the first arrest was void, the second one was legal, and that although Long might be liable for false imprisonment for having detained Martin in his custody, the fact that he had, since the Judge's order was served upon him, taken the prisoner before the Justice and obtained a verbal remand rendered his custody of the prisoner legal.

The Chief Justice stated that he would require to give the question some consideration, and as he would be absent from the city would not be able to give judgment before this morning.

At no period that we remember, says the *St. Catharines Journal*, have the crops looked better than now, and every indication points to a large harvest throughout the Niagara district. The wheat is exceedingly fine, and is already turning yellow for the harvest. Rye, barley, oats, and grass will also yield heavily. Corn is somewhat backward, but with a month of hot weather will show signs of marked improvement. Root crops of all kinds promise a heavy yield. The yield of fruit will not be so large as expected. The apple crop will be deficient. The yield of peaches will not be large, but in some localities better than others. Plums promise well, and will give a large crop.

TO REMOVE MILDEW.—The following from an English journal, though not claimed to be infallible, will often prove effectual: Make a very weak solution of chloride of lime in water, about a heaped up teaspoonful to a quart of water, strain it carefully and dip the spot on the garment into it, and if the mildew does not disappear immediately, lay it in the sun for a few minutes, or dip it again in the limewater. The work is effectually and cheaply done, and the chloride of lime neither rots the clothes nor removes delicate colors, when sufficiently diluted, the article is rinsed afterwards in water.

The meanest story on record comes from Campellford. A new church was being built, and in laying the corner stone a number of coins and other articles were placed therein. During the following night some parties knocked off the top stones and stole the money, bible, and everything worth taking. Could a thief do a meaner act?

Thus far six hundred millions of dollars have been spent in the payment of pensioners on account of the late American war. The future annual payment for pensions for a few years, it is said, will be fifty-four millions of dollars, all of which is chargeable to slavery. Terrible retribution.

It is stated that the Salvation Army, which created such a sensation in Toronto and other cities, will shortly pay a visit to Ottawa.

The Canada Pacific Railway is being constructed over the prairie at the rate of three miles a day.
