Physician; C. H. Hatt, Organist.DEAF AND DUMB INSTITUTE.—Prof. Wood-
bridge, Principal of the Deaf and Dumb In-
stitute at Halifax, N. S., is in the city. The
object of his visit is the establishment here
of a school for the deaf and dumb. In a
circular which he has issued he sets forth
many reasons why such a school should be
established. According to the census re-
turns the number of deaf mutes in the Pro-
vince must be upwards of three hundred. Of
these only twenty-nine are receiving the
benefit of an education, but even this com-
paratively small number is nearly one half
of the whole attendance at the Halifax
school. The latter institution is now over-
crowded. It is probable that a school at
Fredericton would receive support from
other provinces. Prof. Woodbridge proposes
to open a school here about September 1st if
he can make the necessary arrangements.
He has met with a very favorable reception.
The object is a very laudable one, and we
hope that he will receive the active co-operation
of our citizens.MADAWASKA ELECTION.—Mr. Theriault is
in the city, and states the following as the
state of affairs with respect to the Madawaska
election. No returns are in doubt except
those from St. Francis. There the vote stood

Nadeau..... 156A dispute having arisen between Mr. Lynnot
and the returning officer as to the correctness
of this count, the votes were gone over again
with this result:Theriault..... 14

Nadeau..... 149On return day the Sheriff was in doubt how
to act; but between Hon. Mr. Costigan, who
was present, and the Attorney General who
was communicated with, the Sheriff received
instructions to declare the vote according to
the last named figures, which gave Mr.
Lynnot a majority of one. Mr. Theriault
claims to be able to account for the change
on the second count in St. Francis, but pending
legal proceedings which are to be taken,
it would not be wise to state what he professes
to be able to prove.

Preliminary Examination.

The preliminary examination of Sheldon
McNally, who is charged with setting fire to
the hdy in W. Aiken's barn on Friday last,
came up before the Police Magistrate yester-
day afternoon.The lad came down, accompanied by his
uncle. He does not appear to realize his
position; but seems to be a dazed condition.
He looks intelligent, except on close exami-
nation, when his eyes are seen to have a
peculiar wandering appearance.Mr. E. L. Wetmore, Q. C., appeared for the
boy.The Police Magistrate stated that the only
matter he would take up would be the com-
plaint of the Chief Engineer of the Fire De-
partment of a fire alleged to have been set in
William Aiken's premises; but from infor-
mation he had received it would be neces-
sary to hold an investigation into the fires at
the Brayley House stables, Todd's foundry,
and at Segee's premises. This he would
take up to-morrow (Tuesday).

The first witness called was

Edward Williams, who being sworn said:
My name is Edward Williams; I reside on
Brunswick street in this city, on the corner
of Northumberland street; I live in William
Aiken's house. There is a barn in the rear
of the house, connected with it by a shed. I
rent the barn; the barn is on Northumber-
land street, and so is the shed. On Friday
last, the 7th inst., in the evening, I went out
and fed my horse for the night; I harnessed
the door but did not lock it when I came out; I
went into the house, took off my boots and
sat down; my little boy came in and told me
that Sheldon McNally had gone into the
barn with matches; I ran out in my
bare feet; I found the door open; I went to
the foot of the stairs; I ran up and
saw Sheldon McNally; he was standing over
a fire which was blazing up about a foot
high; he was standing just alongside of it;
I caught him by the collar and pushed him
on it, and he tramped the principal part of
the blaze out. I called for water and a
young man, named Henry Painter, brought
up a tub of water and put it on the fire; he
brought another tub full and put it on also.
I hung on to the boy and took him down
stairs; he begged me to let him go;
he said, "For God sake let me go
and I won't do anything again." Mrs.
Winn said to let him go. He kind of
twisted out of my hands, and I let him go;
he did not say anything more himself; this
is all I know about it.Cross examined by Mr. Wetmore.—It was
dark; some lights were lit in the neigh-
bors houses. The boy who told me about
Sheldon's going in the barn was Edward
Williams, my grandson; he is not here; he is
eight years old past I think; he said that
prisoner had gone into the barn with matches;
when I got there no one was in the barn but
him; there was between two and three hun-
dred in the barn besides some straw; the fire
was just in the edge of the hay, right under a
beam, and a horse blanket hung right over it.
There was just a little blaze when I got
there; the boy tramped it out himself; he
was standing just alongside of it; he turned
to me and said, "For God's sake Mr. Wil-
liams let me go;" he went on to the fire
himself when I caught him; he did not speak
till I caught him; I was pretty well ex-
cited; I did not use him rough; I caught
him pretty quick; when I caught him I
pushed him on the fire; I think likely he
stepped on the fire before I got hold of him;
I thought he wanted to put the fire out
before I caught hold of him. I know William
Winn's boy Isaac; I saw him before the fire
in the front part of the house, and likely
after but I don't remember; there was a big
crowd around then. Winn was burned out
a short time before; Mrs. Winn keeps a
couple of hens in the barn, so does Mrs.
Staples; the hens roost on the beam next to
where the fire was set; I don't know where
the nests are; the beams were about ten
feet apart; I can't say whether the fire was
the result of design or accidental; I know
the boy; I ordered him and Thos. Winn out
of the barn sometime during the week; they
said they were looking for eggs; I heard
that prisoner is subject to fits.To the Police Magistrate—I showed the
place in the barn to young Mackey; several
persons went up to look at the fire that even-
ing after it was put out; I don't remember
any of their names.To Mr. Wetmore.—The barn is not much
exposed; you can see it from the street, but
cannot enter from the street. Silas Staples
and William Winn were up in the barn just
after the fire; I don't think you can see the
entrance to the barn from Brunswick street.The Magistrate proceeded to take the wit-
ness' recognizance in the sum of \$100, to ap-
pear at the County Court.The witness asked what would be the con-
sequence if he did not enter into it.The P. M.—"I will send you to jail."
The Witness—"I guess I will say yes."

The next witness was

Andrew Lipsett, who, being sworn said:
I am Chief Engineer of the Fire Department
of the City of Fredericton; I made the com-
plaint in this case. On Friday evening I
got information about 9 or 10 o'clock of an
attempt to set fire to Aiken's barn, and an
attempt to set fire to Segee's premises on
King street, and that the party accused was
one of Mr. J. G. McNally's sons. I went to
Mr. McNally's shop and told him; after I
had been there a short time the prisoner
came in; his mother was present and began
to question him and search in his pocket for
matches; the boy seemed to be in a sort of
half-unconscious state at the time, at least
so I took him to be; in answer to his mother
he said the Winn boy gave him the matches
and told him to go up and set the place on
fire; he did not say which Winn boy. Hesaid he went up there to see some bantam
chickens; I asked him further questions but
he gave no further answers; I asked him
if he knew the danger of setting a fire; he
just looked at me and did not answer; he
had a wretched appearance at the time;
he seemed stupid and pitiful; the next morn-
ing I made an examination of the premises in
company with W. H. Vanwart; I went into
the loft, but I must say I did not see much
appearance of a fire; I could see where water
was thrown on it; I could see neither
burnt hay or the smell of burnt hay,
though I examined particularly; the place
was pointed out to me; there ought
to have been some appearance of burnt
hay, but I would not like to say that there
was no fire because there was no smell or
appearance of fire the next day. The fire must
have been very slight or there would have
been some trace of it.Cross-examined by Mr. Wetmore.—The fire
must have been so slight that it must have
been just ignited when it was put out; I
think the boy was in the office that day; I
have heard he was subject to fits; his father
told me he had over sixty fits in March; he
did not seem inclined to answer questions;
there is a queer difference between his ap-
pearance to-day and then; his mother asked
him several questions, but he did not answer;
the only question he answered was about the
matches.Isaac Winn was called. He told the Police
Magistrate that he was ten years old. He
was shown the New Testament. He said he
could read; he never read the bible; he knew
what it was; he said God would punish him
if he told a lie; he said he knew about the fire;
Sheldon called to me to let him see the
banty; I said it was in Mr. Rainsford's barn;
he said let us go and see the hens; I said Mr.
Williams would not let him.Mr. Wetmore asked that the lad might be
sworn and his evidence taken.Being sworn he said: I am ten years of
age and son of William Winn; my father
lives on Brunswick street in the same house
with Mr. Williams; I know the barn; we
keep hens there; I know Sheldon McNally;
I heard about the fire; Last Friday evening
about seven o'clock he came to the foot of
the stairs and asked me to go and see the
bantams; I told him they were not there, they
were up to Mrs. Rainsford's; then he asked
to see the hens; I told him not to go into
the barn for Mr. Williams would not let him;
he went up in spite of me; I then ran in and
told Mr. Williams that he went into the barn;
he came out and caught him. I did not
tell him what he had gone for; I did not go
into the barn; he brought him down; I
don't know anything more.To Mr. Wetmore.—Edward Williams told
his grandfather, too, about Sheldon being in
the barn; Sheldon did not say anything
about setting fire; I have seen him have fits
three times; I know prisoner's mother; I
did not tell her I was up in the loft with
Sheldon that night hunting eggs, and saw
him lighting matches to look for the eggs,
and ran down and told Mr. Williams.The Police Magistrate stated that he
thought it necessary to hold an investigation
into the other fires before concluding with
this, and would adjourn this case until next
Thursday. At the request of Mr. Wetmore,
the examination into the other fires was set
down for Wednesday.Mr. M. McNally said that he would guaran-
tee that the boy should be kept confined.
The Police Magistrate told the prisoner that
if he came out on the street again he would
be put in jail.

News of the World.

The Powers intended yesterday morn-
ing to ask the Sultan to intervene in the
affairs of Egypt, and he was to be given
until Wednesday to decide upon his
course. If the Porte refuses or seems
afraid to take action, 25,000 men with
15,000 in reserve will be concentrated
by the intervening powers. The army
will land at Aboukir and will be divided
into two parts. One will march on Alex-
andria and will be supported by the
fleet which will open fire as soon as the
army is landed; the other portion will
cross the dry lake of Aboukir to Kaf-
rdenar and seize the railway at Darmna-
bour, Arabi Pasha's only means of retreat,
and will thus force him to either fight or
yield.The action of the Powers in this matter
does not govern the course which Eng-
land will take in reference to the pro-
tection of the Canal or the bombardment
of Alexandria. The latest information
on this point is as follows.ALEXANDRIA, 3 p. m.—Admiral Seymour
is preparing a proclamation to be pla-
carded all over the city, charging the
authorities with a breach of faith in
continuing work on the fortifications,
and demanding surrender of the fortifi-
cations within twelve hours, and warn-
ing the authorities if they fail to com-
ply with the demand that fire will be
opened upon the forts at the expiration
of a further period of 24 hours. Admiral
Seymour has gone on board the "Invinc-
ible," which will move into the outer
harbor, alongside the "Monarch." The
Ministry continue to declare their re-
solve to resist. They have taken pre-
cautions to ensure the safety of the
Khedive in the event of troops being
landed.July 9—midnight.—All the Consulates
are now on board vessels in the harbor.
The English Consul has sent notice to
other Consuls, advising them to notify
their countrymen to quit Alexandria
within 24 hours.
