LOCAL NEWS.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE.—We are informed that the Government will meet tomorrow.

WHO WROTE WOOD'S SPEECH?—This is the question which is agitating the Westmoreland newspapers.

STURGEON.—Fishing for sturgeon is being prosecuted very extensively between this city and St. John.

COUNTY COUNCIL.—The semi-annual session of the York County Council will be held in this city tomorrow.

ANOTHER PROTEST.—A hint has been thrown out that the Westmoreland local election may be made the subject of a protest.

MOONLIGHT EXCURSION.—The excursion of St. Ann's Rowing Club was postponed on Friday. It will accordingly come off tonight.

TEMPERANCE MEETING.—The Conference Temperance meeting will be held in the Methodist Church in this city on Tuesday evening.

THE UNIVERSITY.—The President of the University entertained the last year's junior class at his residence on Friday evening.

REMOVAL.—Mr J. M. McLellan, lately book-keeper for F. B. Edgecombe, has taken a similar position with A. J. Loggie & Co. of Chatham.

OUR SERMON.—We publish to-day an excellent report of the sermon delivered in this city Sunday before last, by the Rev. Mr. McDonnell.

SHOWY WINDOW.—John McDonald's upper store was the centre of attraction on Friday night. The tasteful decoration of the windows excited many favorable comments.

NEW UNIFORMS.—The police celebrated Dominion Day by donning new uniforms. They are black in color with silver buttons. The architect was John Gunn. The builders T. W. Smith & Co.

OBITUARY.—We chronicle the death of Mr. William McBeath, who discharged the duties of Secretary of the Central Fire Insurance Company ever since its institution. Mr. McBeath was born in this city in 1800. He was deservedly esteemed by his very large circle of friends.

CONTRACT AWARDED.—The contract for the construction of the new Baptist Church has been awarded to Messrs. Bond & Milden. The price is \$16,000. On Saturday the Committee staked out the site for the church. It is on the southern side of the lot and a short distance back from York street. The north side will be twenty-six feet from Brunswick street. This contract does not include the interior painting of the roof, the heating apparatus or the upholstering of the seats.

A SUCCESSFUL DRAMATIST.—Mr. Slason Thompson, formerly of this city, but now of Chicago, is meeting with great success as a dramatic writer. Associated with Mr. C. M. Green, he has produced several plays which have had great popularity. Their latest production is a New England drama entitled "Straws," which will be produced in Chicago this month. Their "Chispa" a play founded on California life, will be produced in New York in September. It has had a wonderful run on the Pacific Coast.

SUPREME COURT.—The following judgments were delivered on Friday:

Ex parte Tennant—Rule discharged.

Tufts vs Chapman—Nonsuit refused. Weldon and Wetmore dissenting.

Prince of Wales Coal Co. vs Osburne—Motion refused; verdict for defendant stands.

Ward vs Outhouse and Read—New trial granted. Allen and Wetmore dissenting.

The Court then adjourned. The judgment in the St. John Scott Act case will be delivered in a few days, and further judgments will be given on the first Tuesday in August.

DOMINION DAY.—Saturday morning dawned with a cold clear sky and with every indication that the holiday would be dull, dark and disagreeable. All day the city wore a solemn aspect. Half the stores were closed, and the other half had their windows partially closed as though in mourning for some provincial calamity. A few people lounged on Queen street with their overcoats on, and a few others made a pretence of attending to business as usual. The morning trains, especially that on the New Brunswick Railway, took quite a number of persons out of the city. Between eight and nine Queen street was made quite lively by those who were on their way to participate in the arrangements made in Woodstock for the observance of the day. There was very little driving, less boating, and little or no promenading. Most people seemed to regard the holiday as an affliction. The races at Woodstock did not come off owing to the heavy rain prevailing all day.

A FISHING EXCURSION.—On or about July 12th an excursion will leave Grand Falls for the Squatook Lakes, in charge of S. J. Raymond. The excursion will go in a towboat, which will have a good awning, and will occupy about a fortnight. A good cook will be taken along, and all the wants of the excursionists in the matter of board and lodging, will be provided for \$1.50 per day. Persons who do not desire to remain for the whole fortnight can return at any time. Accommodation will be provided for as many as wish to go. The route of the excursion will be up the St. John and Madawaska Rivers into Lake Temiscouata and thence up the Roderi to the Squatook. Some of the best inland fishing in the Province is in this section. Game is also plentiful. For particulars address S. J. Raymond, Grand Falls.

Death by Drowning.

On Friday morning news was brought to Dr. Brown, Coroner, that there had been a case of drowning near Morrison's Mills. On going to the place he found the remains of Margaret Louise Dunn which had been found in the river a few feet from the shore.

A jury was summoned consisting of the following:—William McKay, foreman; James Duffy, William Dolan, Robert Nichols, William Godsoe, Joseph Etching, Nevil Grant; and an inquest was held. The facts appeared about as follows:—Miss Dunn was a sister of Ephraim Dunn, and a daughter of the late Richard Dunn. Since her youth Miss Dunn, who was thirty-eight years of age, has always evinced a nervous temperament, at some times more so than at others. When her mother died, the shock was severe on Miss Dunn, her friends fearing that she would lose her reason entirely. Her chief trouble appeared to be the fear that the creditors of the estate, which was left to her control, and against which there were some debts standing, would not give her sufficient time to meet them. She occasionally talked with her brother about the matter and he always did all in his power to allay his fears. Not long since she inquired one day if it would be any disgrace to her parents if she should die without having paid their debts. These things which her friends at the time did not think serious, have left the impression that she brooded over the thought of taking her own life. She continued to go about among her friends as usual and just before her sad death occurred was visiting the neighbors. Nothing unusual was noticed about her of late except that she maintained a more quiet mood than formerly. She was last seen alive by her sister-in-law, Mrs. Ephraim Dunn, at whose house she had for the last few weeks made her home, about 12 o'clock Thursday night. At that time she was quietly sleeping in her bed. At 6 o'clock Friday morning, Mrs. Dunn arose and going to Miss Dunn's bedroom found the bed vacant and her clothes as they had been left the day before. Search was made around the premises but to no avail. At last some persons took grappling irons and proceeded to search the river. They soon found the body of the unfortunate woman about forty feet from the shore, in about five feet of water. Everything indicated that she had met her death by drowning and it is supposed that she jumped into the river off some logs near the shore. The jury brought in the following verdict that "Margaret Louise Dunn met her death by drowning during a state of mental depression."

Methodist Conference.

FRIDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

After the opening of the Conference in the usual form, Revs. Messrs. Duncan, Burwash and Marshall obtained leave to withdraw their respective resolutions respecting the transfers to and from this Conference.

It was moved by Rev. Mr. Duncan—Whereas, in the opinion of this Conference the action of the Transfer Committee in transferring Rev. Mr. Pascoe from the Newfoundland Conference to this Conference is illegal, contravening the second regulation of the Discipline, page 48, paragraph 124, relating to transfers, and therefore an infringement on our rights as a Conference; therefore

Resolved, That we protest against said action and appeal to the General Conference or such Court of Appeal as the Conference may direct, in order to secure a vindication of our rights.

After some discussion the matter was allowed to drop.

A Sunday School report and programme for the public meeting was submitted and adopted.

Rev. Mr. Berrie was appointed Corresponding Secretary of the S. S. Committee.

The examination of candidates was made the order of the day for 10 a. m., on Saturday.

The Rev. Messrs. Daniel, Narraway, Pope, Prince, Payson, F. W. Harrison and Mills were reported as the Supernumerary Ministers.

The recommendation of the St. John District that Rev. Mr. Tweedy should become a supernumerary for one year, was adopted.

Rev. Mr. Dutcher was returned to the active work.

The report of the Superintendent Fund was received, and a communication from the Nova Scotia Conference on the same subject, was also received.

It was ordered that the Supernumerary fund be the subject of discussion immediately after the examination of candidates.

It was ordered that the General Conference business be the order of the day for Tuesday. Conference adjourned.

Saturday morning, after routine business, was devoted to the examination of candidates, three of whom, namely, Messrs. Wadman, Thomas and Moore, presented themselves. The examination was conducted by Dr. Stewart.

POLICE.—The receipts of the police office during July were \$504. Of this \$350 was for violation of the Canada Temperance Act. These fines are and have always been paid to the City Treasurer for city purposes, as the law directs, and are not and will not be paid to the Dominion Government, which, in point of law, has no right to receive them.

Guiteau was hanged on Friday noon, just two days before the anniversary of the shooting of Garfield. For nearly year this melancholy business has been kept before the public. In any other country the matter would have been disposed of in less than a month.

It is announced that the Powers have determined upon an armed intervention in the affairs of Egypt.

CANADIAN NEWS.

Work on the C. P. Railway is rapidly progressing. The track is now laid 100 miles beyond Brandon, and the road is graded for a further distance of 75 miles. The stations on this road will be about eight miles apart.

P. W. Nickerson, an ex-policeman of Yarmouth, N. S., has been sent to the penitentiary for two years for perjury.

Sir John Macdonald has gone to Manitoba.

Three of the mounted police have been murdered by Indian horse thieves.

Native strawberries have appeared in St. John.

The Dominion Convention of the Y. M. C. A. will meet at Truro on the 10th of August.

Crop reports from all parts of the Dominion continue to be excellent.

The Moncton liquor dealers have raised a fund and are going to fight the Scott Act.

Homesickness led a young Irish emigrant to attempt suicide in Toronto. He did not succeed.

Somewhere about three years ago the propeller "Lake Erie" was wrecked during a heavy storm on Lake Superior, and with the exception of four men, the entire crew were drowned. Among the saved was William Wilson, a fireman, native of Ottawa, where about a year previous to the disaster he had married a young girl from the neighborhood. Though saved from drowning, Wilson took no steps to contradict the impression which had got abroad that he was among the lost. Since then until Monday last his wife, believing him to be drowned, took service in a hotel in this city, and has earned her living in this way. On Monday last Wilson returned to the city, in the employ of the "Big U. S. Circus," in the capacity of assistant boss canvass man, and visited his wife, to whom before leaving with the show he related the story of his escape from the steamer, promising that on the expiration of his engagement with the show he would return to Ottawa.
