ple. The Guv'nor was played with success
in Halifax, under the patronage of His Ex-
cellency Sir P. L. McDougall, K. C. B., Col.
Dundas, and others.A HIGH-HANDED ACT.—On Thursday night,
just before midnight, Policeman Vandine
was awakened by a blow, as of a stone, upon
his house door. He at once sprang to his
bedroom window, which was open but par-
tially concealed by the branch of a tree. He
saw two men, one being in the street and the
other behind the tree. Thinking that,
perhaps, they were the night police he called
out not in a very loud tone of voice, when
the man behind the tree discharged a pistol
at the window immediately beneath that at
which Mr. Vandine was. The pistol was
loaded with shot. The charge broke four
panes of glass, tore away part of the window
casing, and broke the glass in a picture on
the wall. The men immediately fled and
pursuit was out of the question. There is
not much doubt that the door was struck so
as to bring Mr. Vandine to the window, and
that the intention was to do him serious in-
jury.

Normal School.

The closing exercises of the Normal School
for the current session were held in the As-
sembly Hall of the Institution to-day. The
morning session opened at 9.30. There was
quite a number of visitors present. After
singing and prayer, Mr. Crockett announced
the first exercise would consist of the reading
of papers by the Student-Teachers, on some
branch of professional work. He first called
on Miss Vandine, who read a paper on "One
day's teaching." Mr. Legere read one on
the same subject. Miss Davis read a paper
on "Teaching Form." Miss Gregg read a
criticism on a lesson in geography, one on
arithmetic, and one on grammar. These les-
sons had been given a few days ago in the
Model School. Mr. Crockett then questioned
a number of students on Pestalozzi, an edu-
cational reformer of Zurich, taking up the
various stages of his life.The next exercise consisted of examples of
teaching by the students, Miss Kierstead
giving a lesson on Reading, Mr. Belding on
Geography, and Mr. Hamilton on Arithmetic.
The morning session then adjourned.The afternoon session opened with sing-
ing. The students were examined in various
branches including arithmetic, physics and
some other branches. In physics the work
was chiefly experimental but in this as in
the other branch, good proficiency was dis-
played. The attendance in the afternoon
was larger than in the morning. After the
examination in the various subjects had been
concluded, Dr. Rand, in a few remarks, pre-
sented the Lorne Silver and Bronze Medals.
Each was won by a King's County student,
the former by Miss Keirstead, of Studholm,
the latter by Albert Belding, Apohaqui.
Both were offered in professional work, the
bronze medal being competed for nine
months, the silver for three months. The ses-
sion closed with singing and the students de-
parted with looks that betokened that they
were pleased the examination was over.

Woodstock Notes.

Woodstock, July 28.

It is said that Mr. Jewett's jewelry stock
will be returned to him, and that he will
have substantial damages awarded him.Our amateur oarsmen intend having an ac-

September, the same day as the fall meeting
on the Park.Mrs. Merrill, daughter of Mr. R. B. Belyea,
while here on a visit to her friends, died after
a very brief illness on Monday morning last.
She leaves two children, one an infant four
days old. Her husband is in Colorado, and
was thus unable to be present at the funeral.
The whole circumstances are very sad, and
the sorrowing parents of the deceased have
the sympathies of the community.—*Sentinel*.The *Press* thus speaks of the late James
Jones:Mr. Jones' father was one of the Loyalists
who came to this Province in 1783, and set-
tled at Keswick, York County, where James
was born in March, 1804. Mr. Jones came to
this county in 1832, and settled upon a farm
about 14 miles above Woodstock in what is
now called Middle Simonds, but which was
then a part of Wakefield. He was one of the
pioneers of that section. He married a
daughter of the late Daniel Shaw. They
had eight children, seven daughters and an
only son, R. K. Jones, Esq., the present
Mayor of Woodstock. Three of his daughters
are dead. Mr. Jones was very successful as
a farmer, and also as a lumberer, which busi-
ness he pursued in connection with his farm-
ing operations. In 1856 he sold his farm and
moved to Woodstock, where he has resided
ever since. Mrs. Jones died in 1863. In 1867
he married the widow of the late Samuel
Jones, who is now left to mourn her bereave-
ment.
