LOCAL NEWS.

POLICE.—There were no cases before the Police Magistrate yesterday.

NEW ORGAN.—The new organ for the Methodist church has arrived.

HONORED.—Judge Steadman was honored with an address at the Victoria County Court.

NEW LAW OFFICE.—J. D. Hazen has had a law office fitted up next to Geo. H. Davis' Drug Store, and is now settled down for business.

DEAF AND DUMB INSTITUTE.—Mr. Abel is out against Professor Woodbridge's proposed Deaf and Dumb Institute in Fredericton; and the Sun is backing him up.

SUNBURY COUNTY TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—The fifth annual session of the Sunbury County Teachers' Institute will be held at Kingston's Hall, Fredericton Junction, on Thursday and Friday, Sept. 7th and 8th.

FESTIVAL AT TAY CREEK.—On Tuesday the 18th inst., the Catholics of Tay Creek will give an entertainment to raise funds to pay the debt on their Church. Bryson's Band and the Piper of the St. Andrew's Society will be in attendance. There will be the usual round of sports.

A CARD.—If the gentleman (?) who at half-past four yesterday morning took a basketful of bark from Mr. D. F. George's bark pile is unable to pay for his wood, Mr. George will provide him with a supply for the summer; but Mr. George begs that the gentleman in question will not take bark which is worth \$5 a cord. He also begs to inform the gentleman in question that he saw him take the bark.

THE TWELFTH.—To-day being the 12th of July will be generally observed throughout the Province. A large gathering of Orangemen will be held at Lakeville, C. Co., at which W. Wilson, Grand Master, will be present. There will be an excursion from St. John to St. George via the Grand Southern R.R., and a picnic will be held on the Nashwaak, two miles above Marysville this afternoon.

NEW FOUNDRY.—On Monday Messrs. Frank McCaffery and John O'Toole began the erection of a foundry on the vacant lot fronting on Queen street, above Westmorland, and formerly occupied by the Tower Hotel. The foundry building will be of wood, 40x45 feet and one storey, it will be completed ready for operations in about five weeks. Messrs. McCaffery & O'Toole contemplate building a machine shop and ware room in connection, extending from the foundry to Queen street, but have not yet decided whether they will undertake this portion of the work this year. Mr. O'Toole was employed for many years as a moulder in the New Brunswick Foundry.

PERSONAL.—Mr. C. T. Byrne left here yesterday for Canso, N. S., where he is going to work on the submarine cable. We can judge of Mr. Byrne's abilities as an operator when we know that the best operators in the Dominion are selected for that office and the one at North Sydney, where he spent last year.

Prof. Fletcher and his wife are on a visit to their friends in this city.

Mrs. Harley and her son, who have resided here for some time, will return to their home at Newcastle to-day.

Mr. A. G. Blair, M. P. P., has gone to Charlottetown.

Hon. Isaac Burpee accompanied by his family and some others passed through the town yesterday. They arrived in the 12.20 train, and stopped at the Queen Hotel for dinner, after which they started for up river by the N. B. Railway.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL CONVENTION.—The tenth annual Convention of the Sunday-School workers in the Maritime Provinces will open in Dartmouth, N. S., on Friday, August 4th, and will continue in session four days. A full programme has been arranged. Reduced rates of travel will be allowed to delegates, concerning which further particulars will be given through the press. Several delegates will attend the Convention from Fredericton. Mr. Lemont, the chairman of the Convention, has been written to by E. Payson Porter, of Philadelphia, Statistical Secretary of the International Executive of the Sunday-School Convention, asking him to arrange for a Convention of Sunday-School workers in all parts of New Brunswick, to be held in this city, early in August, at which B. F. Jacobs, of Chicago, chairman of the International Convention, and others will be present. Mr. Lemont has the matter under consideration.

A BIRD'S-EYE VIEW OF FREDERICTON.—Mr. A. M. Hubby, of Moncton, has spent the past six weeks in making sketches for a birds-eye view of Fredericton. Having completed his first sketch he is now prepared, and will at once begin to solicit orders. The picture when printed will be very interesting and will be much prettier than most engravings of the kind. Every building in the city is shown distinctly, and in every respect the city will be correctly delineated. It is Mr. Hubby's wish to surround the margin of the large picture with enlarged representations of the finest buildings in the city, public as well as private. We hope he will be well received, and that many of our citizens will arrange to have their houses or stores represented on the margin. A directory will accompany the picture. Mr. Hubby has done similar work in Moncton, Chatham and St. John and has been well patronized. This is the first opportunity of the kind our people have had presented to them and they ought not to let it pass unimproved.

DEATH OF HON. A. McL. SEELY.—We regret to learn of the death of the Hon. A. McL. Seely, which occurred at his residence in St. John on Monday last. Mr. Seely was grandson of Seth Seely, a loyalist. He spent most of his life in St. John, where he was engaged in shipbuilding and lumbering. He was appointed to the Legislative Council in 1854 and in 1875 was elected President in the room of the late Hon. J. S. Saunders. He was a member of the University Senate, and a prominent official in connection with various Societies under the auspices of the Baptist Church. For several years he was President of the Commercial Bank.

In all his relations in life Mr. Seely has preserved his career unsullied. He was honorable not only in title but in fact. He was twice married, his second wife surviving him. He leaves five sons and four daughters. His eldest son is Mr. A. Seely, Assistant Superintendent of the N. B. Railway.

Mr. Seely has been in failing health for some time and his death is scarcely unexpected.

His funeral will take place to-morrow at 3 p. m.

THE EXHIBITION FIRE.—The only insurance on the Exhibition Palace was \$3,000, held by the City, divided as follows:—\$1,000 in the Western, and \$1,000 in the Citizens, John Richards & Son, Agents, and \$1,000 in the North British, J. L. Inches, Agent.

The persons who saw the fire at first say that it appears to have been started in the rear of the building. It spread with wonderful speed and with a roar which awakened the whole neighborhood. There can be no doubt about the incendiary origin of the fire. Mr. J. H. Reid, the morning after the fire, found a bottle with some paraffine remaining in it, lying near the ruins.

The night police gave the following explanation of their movements the night of the fire. At one o'clock they were in front of the New Brunswick Foundry, talking with the night watchman there. Shortly after one they left him and went to the look-up for lunch. When they had completed this and were preparing to start out they heard the small fire bell, and immediately after the Methodist bell. Policeman Wright at once went to the City Hall. Policemen Phillips went out Carleton street, and seeing the location of the fire, concluded that his duty required him to keep a watch on Queen street. Policeman Vandine, on hearing the fire, concluded as Policeman Phillips did, that the incendiaries might have in contemplation some further mischief on Queen street, and he also came to the front part of the town and made a careful examination of all open places. This will account for the absence of the police from the fire. They were doing their duty elsewhere, and we think acted very wisely.

Educational Institute.

The sixth annual meeting of the Educational Institute of New Brunswick opened at 2.30 yesterday afternoon in the Normal School Building. The present students furnished the music. There was quite a large number present, including teachers and visitors. The Secretary enrolled about fifty names. This number will be considerably augmented when all the teachers have arrived.

Mr. Creed, on behalf of the Executive Committee, submitted the following report:

The accounts of the Secretary-Treasurer for the past year have been duly audited and found correct. They show the receipts to have been \$118 from the Institute and \$100 from the expenses connected with Professor Walter Smith's visit; the expenditure, \$280.05, leaving a balance of \$62.05 due the Secretary-Treasurer for the year.

2. At the December meeting of the Executive Committee for the annual meeting of the Institute a communication was received from a committee of the various Temperance Unions, asking that opportunity be allowed for an address on Temperance in Schools, by Mr. Hunt, of Massachusetts. The committee have fully considered the matter, replied in effect that they would assign an hour for an address upon the importance of teachers using fully and conscientiously the means contemplated by the existing Regulations of the Board of Education respecting Instruction of Temperance. This was accepted by the committee of the W. C. T. Union. The committee further appointed certain gentlemen to follow the address of Mr. Hunt with suggestions for the giving of the lessons on Temperance required by the Course of Instruction. The further arrangements made for the Institute were substantially those which appear on the printed programme.

The report was adopted. The following were appointed a Nominating Committee: G. W. Fenwick, John Lawson, D. P. Chisholm, G. E. Crosseup, John Montgomery and Thos Stoddard.

The session then adjourned.

Grand Falls.

Of the many places in the Dominion that prove of interest to the tourist, and especially to the admirer of Nature, there are few more deserving of a visit than Grand Falls. The natural scenery of the St. John compares favorably with any in the Dominion, but having in addition to this such a sight as Grand Falls presents, the St. John River thereby surpasses many others with triple the volume of water.

The Falls are situated at the lower bend of the river which circles the upper part of the town, and to the eye of even a dull observer presents a magnificent spectacle. The dark water, flowing down quietly above, in an instant transformed into a foam, when boiling and seething it rushes on through the chasm in a mad career, and not until it has gone considerable distance does it recover its natural color and quietness.

Nothing short of actually seeing the place can give a good idea of its beauty and grandeur. Considering therefore the easy communication with the various parts of the Province there is no New Brunswick who

makes a point of spending a few days vacation each year, but should visit the place that is acknowledged by men who have travelled a great deal, as being only second to the great Niagara. Besides the scenery itself the surrounding country affords ample room for enjoyment. Good fishing ground and easy means of access can be obtained, in fact everything to enchant a person, especially one accustomed to a city. For the accommodation of persons visiting the place, a very fine hotel was erected a few years ago which this year is under the control of Wm. Olive. As a proprietor of a hotel Mr. Olive cannot be beaten and no person who has ever stopped at the Grand Falls hotel since he has taken charge but will say that he pays the strictest regard to the comforts of any person stopping there.
