LOCAL NEWS.

ANNUAL MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Fredericton Gas Light Company will be held to-day.

LAD INJURED.—Master Fred Estey, son of Mr R A Estey, was badly cut about the head at the Brunswick street fire yesterday.

THAT FLAG.—Some of the Tories are greatly worried over Mr Pickard's flag at Phoenix Square. If they feel badly over so small a matter what will they do in the day of their great tribulation, which is so near at hand.

PERSONAL.—Messrs Purdie, Daniel and Chamberlin arrived by "David Weston" yesterday afternoon, en route to Edmundston. They are making a collection of the birds of New Brunswick for the N B Natural History Society.

A LIVELY STREET.—Regent street was pretty lively yesterday. The C T Act was not in force to any extent, and there was considerable danger of "ructions" on several occasions, to use the expressive term of a driver of African descent and whiskey inspiration.

FIRE.—Yesterday afternoon a fire broke out on the roof of Messrs. Brown & Palmer's Tannery, Westmorland street. No. 4 Engine was immediately on the spot, but the fire was extinguished without its aid. The roof is supposed to have caught from sparks from the chimney.

DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.—A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society was held in the Madras School Room yesterday afternoon. The Metropolitan addressed the chair. The object of the meeting was to prepare reports for the annual meeting.

POLICE NEWS.—There were five persons arraigned before the Police Magistrate yesterday for being drunk. They were disposed of as follows: John Thompson, an old offender, fined \$5 or thirty days' jail. Peter Saccoby, fined \$3 or five days' jail. Patrick McLean, fined \$5. Andrew Wilson, fined \$4. James Jones, fined \$4. The last three paid their fines.

TORY MEETING.—Our St. Stephen correspondent writes: "The Tories held a public meeting in Chipman's Hall on Monday evening. D Main, Esq., occupied the chair and Hon B R Stevenson and Sir L Tilley addressed the meeting. Mr Stevenson occupied three-quarters of an hour in telling the people what ability, firmness and determination he had shown in representing them in the Local Legislature, and said he would do the same for them in the Dominion Parliament, where he thought he was better fitted to represent them than was his friend Mr. Gillmor. Sir Leonard dealt at length with the questions of the day, that were easily disposed of, leaving some more serious ones untouched, his chief efforts being in praise of the National Policy. The Liberals are organizing and feel confident of success, reports from all parts of the County being most encouraging."

WATER SUPPLY.—The engineers have examined the site on Mill Brook proposed for a reservoir for the city water supply by Mr Ketchum. We understand that they express themselves as most pleased with it, and that they say if the Mill Brook could be depended upon it would be very easy to supply the city by gravitation. Otherwise it will be impossible by any outlay within the means of the city to secure a sufficient supply by gravitation from any source upon this side of the river. It is of course impossible for these gentlemen to speak of the sufficiency of the Mill Brook supply. This can only be judged by those who have observed it for a number of years, and the weight of testimony would be against its sufficiency. It would not seem to be very good policy to depend upon such a precarious source, so long as we have a magnificent river flowing before our doors. There are many summers when the supply would be ample, but there are others when it would be entirely inadequate to the ordinary wants of the city.

A \$13,000 Blaze.

Yesterday evening at 6.30 o'clock, a young man named Manzer, who was drawing a pail of water from Mr. George Todd's well, observed a fire in the Brunswick street end of Factory annexed to Todd's Foundry. Running to the spot he found the flames originated in a pile of dry pine shavings, and although he made every effort to extinguish them his efforts were fruitless, and in a moment almost the whole interior of the building was a mass of flames. The alarm was at once given and the engines were brought to the spot.

IN SPLENDID STYLE,

but the flames had gained so much headway that, in spite of the utmost speed, before any water could be thrown, the fire had already assumed large proportions. Those who saw it in the early stages say that the factory burned as rapidly as it could have if it had been

SATURATED WITH OIL.

The reason of this was that it contained a great quantity of highly seasoned lumber, which was as highly inflammable a material as can be imagined. Almost in a shorter time than it takes to tell it the factory, a two story structure, was a mass of flames and the fire had extended to the adjoining building, a two story dwelling house, also owned by Mr. Todd and occupied by Mr. John Atherton. The fire quickly spread in the westerly direction, or up the street, and the one story buildings next above the factory were soon in flames. The first of these was owned by W. Patterson and occupied by Chas. Jarvis. The second was owned and occupied by Wm. Wynn. At this time the outlook was very serious. A heavy wind prevailed and great fire brands were carried in all directions. Fully

A DOZEN BUILDINGS,

in addition to those destroyed, were on fire at one time, and the Leslie barracks, so called, narrowly escaped destruction. There was imminent danger at this time of the fire extending to the corner of Northumberland and Brunswick street, and had it done so it is hard to tell where it would have stopped. With excellent judgment the Chief Engineer divided his forces, and directed one stream on the King street buildings and keeping the two story house owned by Wm. Pollard constantly wet, succeeding in averting a serious disaster. Meanwhile the flames had caged the two story building owned by W. G. Dykeman, and occupied by the Rev. A. J. Mowatt. Here, however, their progress was arrested.

The total loss may be put at \$13,000. Geo. Todd puts his loss at \$10,000. He has no insurance. He had just repaired the steam engine in the wood factory connected with the foundry, and had started work only yesterday. Mr. Dykeman's loss is about \$1,800, with \$1,400 insurance in the Western, John Richards & Son, Agents. Patterson's dwelling was worth about \$400, and was uninsured. Wynn's was worth about \$700 and was uninsured. Slight damage was done to several other buildings. The Rev. Mr. Mowatt says he will not be a loser to any amount, and the same may be said of the others so far as their furniture went.

The cause of the fire is unknown. Mr. Todd says it could not have caught from the engine, as the place where it originated was seventy feet from the furnace. He also says that his loss, though so heavy, will not cause any interruption to his business.

Election Echoes

There was not much news from the County yesterday. The candidates are scattered far and wide, and all are hard at work. The last we heard of Dr. Dow was that he was meeting a very warm reception. Indeed if the doctor had his health he would give some of the candidates a pretty hard race; and as it is he may not be at the foot of the class by a point or two. Messrs Colter and Wetmore are doing all they can for Mr. Fraser, but are losing by taking such a course. Mr. Wilson is said to have met with a good reception at Harvey and Canterbury. Mr. Thompson made a fine impression at Millville, and his progress through the County is most satisfactory. Mr. Blair stands very well indeed. Mr. Fisher and Mr. Everett are busy at work. The former will lose a good many votes and so will Mr. Wilson, by not declaring themselves squarely in Opposition. It is a great pity there is not an Opposition four in the field for York. A vigorous canvass would elect them.

A Queen's County correspondent writes that the Liberal prospects are brightening daily. From Carleton we learn that Mr. Lindsay has taken the field and is assisted by Hon. John Costigan. Mr. Irvine and his friends are also hard at work. They are confident of success, though not boastful.

University Honor Examinations.

The University Honor examinations, which took place June 1st, 2nd and 3rd, have produced strange results. The different prizes offered each year are determined by five examinations, two at Christmas, two at Easter and one at the end of the year. This last one counts double, so that the highest possible number of marks for each prize is 6,000. The above examination is the last for this year, and by it the competitors for no less than three different prizes have virtually made "ties." For the Lorne Gold Medal, offered this year for proficiency in Classics, and open to the Senior and Junior classes, William Brodie, '83, J. R. McIntosh, '82, and F. B. Meagher, '83, have made the average of 757, 750, and 745 respectively.

For the Lorne Silver Medal, open to the Freshmen in Science, Messrs. Duff and Ganong have made 968 and 965 respectively.

For the Microscope, open to the Juniors in Science, F. StJ, Bliss and H. Barker have made 903 and 901 respectively.

It has been decided to award the Lorne Gold Medal to Mr. Brodie, the Lorne Silver to Duff, and to give two money prizes to Bliss and Barker, the whole amount being equal to the price of the microscope. As regards the medal, this seems the only way of awarding them, but as the microscope is presented by the University, and the competitors have come so very close, it would seem the most reasonable and the most satisfactory way, to the competitors at least, to present two microscopes.

Only once before this time has a "tie" occurred for this prize. That was in 1876, when Mr. Broad and Mr. Towers made about the same average. Then the Metropolitan presented a microscope to one of the competitors and the University one to the other. Last year Meagher and Brodie in competing for the Classical scholarship, came so close that the prize was divided.

In the Junior class F. StJ. Bliss wins the English scholarship. In the Senior class Wm. Fowler wins the Mathematical scholarship, and William Crockett the prize for French.
