LOCAL NEWS.

THE UNIVERSITY.—Lectures at the Uni-
versity began this morning.

YORK COUNTY COURT.—This Court, at
which the Lees will be tried, and the brigade
of perjury cases disposed of, will open on
Tuesday next. We believe that the Stanley
homicide case stands over until the Supreme
Court. This is probably because a Grand
Jury may indict for murder, although it is not
probable, and the County Court has no
jurisdiction to try a capital offence.

THE CAMPBELLTOWN ROBBERY.—We learn
that the two men who are suspected of the
robbery of the post office at Campbelltown
were traced as far as the ferry across the
Miramichi at Newcastle. They were
thought to have taken the highway for
Fredericton. A despatch to the Post Master
on Saturday announced that they were on
the road from Welford to this city, and
would probably reach Gibson this morning
and proceed to Woodstock. City Marshall
Woodward went this morning to Millville,
and watched the outgoing train this after-
noon at Gibson, but with no result.

WATER WORKS.—The wet weather has made
the digging of the pump well for the water
works a very unpleasant piece of work. It
is progressing quite rapidly, however. A
derrick has been erected, and the clay is
now being hoisted out. Yesterday, there
was some fear that the side of the excavation
would give way, and a man was kept at
work most of the day taking the necessary
precautions to prevent so undesirable a result.
This morning was occupied in protecting the
bottom part of the well from sliding in and
pumping the water out. The work of con-
structing the guard crib is proceeding in
good shape. The rise in the water makes no
material difference, nor will it interfere with
the digging of the trench if the services of
the dredge can be secured at once. The
committee this morning obtained letters from
the Lieutenant Governor and Mr. Pickard,
M. P., which they hope will enable them to
get the dredge without delay.

BLUE CLAY.—Every one who visits the
"pump well" asks "how deep does the blue
clay go?" The answer is that nobody knows.
We are told that some years ago D. Scott
started to have an artesian well bored up
where Estey's mill now stands. He bored for
one hundred and twenty-five feet through
When alternate layers of blue and red clay
when that depth was reached the augur
broke and so the question of how deep the
clay goes remains unsolved. But the anxious
enquirer after knowledge may derive some
satisfaction from knowing that it goes deep
enough to bury any building in the city,
unless perhaps the Methodist Church and the
Cathedral spires would project above it, and
until somebody bores deeper than Scott
did that will remain unknown. Prof. Hind
during his residence here expressed an
opinion that this clay would be found to
extend down a thousand feet or more, and
that if it were penetrated a never-failing
supply of water would be reached. Probably
it will now be a long time before the experi-
ment is tried.

Police News.

George McCaffery of Woodstock, an
an iron moulder, took a little too much of
ardent on Sunday and made himself decid-
edly obnoxious to the denizens of Lizzie Robin-
son's establishment by kicking in the door,
and raising a row generally. Policeman
Wright went to arrest him, but McCaffery
resisted with might and main, tearing the
Policeman's coat, and rendering it necessary
for the officer to use his baton pretty freely
in order to effect a capture. It appears that
McCaffery when arrested, went quietly with
Wright for a short distance, then turned
upon him and seizing the Policeman by one
of his arms tore the sleeve from his coat. He
then seized the body of the coat and tore it
badly. His next move was to try and see
what he could do in the way of knocking
Wright down; but the officer thought the
matter had gone far enough, so he floored
his prisoner with a crack from his "billy." He
had not much difficulty with him after
this, except at the Police Station. McCaffery's
head was cut, but he was all right again this morning. Mc-
Caffery, who seemed not to enjoy what
to him is the novelty of an appearance in the
Police Court in the character of a defendant,
pleaded guilty to the drunk and was fined
\$8. For tearing the policeman's coat he also
contributed \$8, which it will cost to repair
it, and in consideration the officer did not
press the charge for resisting him.

William Sack celebrated Saturday evening
by getting on his beer. Two \$2's and a \$1
squared the little bill this morning.

The Albert Election.

His Honor Mr. Justice Wetmore attended
at the Supreme Court Room at noon to-day,
and delivered his judgment in the Albert
County election cases upon the preliminary
objections against the petition recently
argued before him. His Honor's judgment in
the Turner case, which was quite lengthy,
sets out all the facts of the case, and the
several objections taken before him. Upon
two points only was any opinion expressed.
One of them was the sufficiency of the recog-
nizance, which was of the petitioner himself
for \$1,000 and two sureties for \$500 each.
His Honor's view of the Act is, that it con-
templates a recognizance by the petitioner
for \$2,000 and two sureties for \$2,000, but he
did not deem it necessary to decide this
point, as he considered the fourth objection
taken, namely, that the affidavits of justi-
fication by the sureties were insuffi-
cient, must prevail. The objection made to
the affidavits was that although the sureties
swore they were each worth double the
amount by which they "are bound by the
recognizance," no recognizance having
been entered into at the time, and the affidavit
expressly stating that the sureties were
"about to enter into a recognizance," there
was, in point of fact no affidavit that the
sureties were worth any sum whatever. His
Honor, therefore, ordered the petition to be
removed off file, with costs.

Mr. Gregory asked for a stay of proceed-
ings, pending appeal, but the Judge said he
had no power to order a stay.

The case for the petitioner was argued by
Mr. Gregory; that for the respondents by
Messrs. Rainsford and C A Peck.

From Under the Planks.

One of the employees of the Barker House
found when the platform was taken up from
before the door several reminders of bygone
days. One of them was a button from a
coat belonging to the 22nd Regiment. No
trace could be found of the rest of the gallant
soldier whose coat of red the button confined
to his manly form and no grounds exist for
a belief that he may be somewhere down
underneath the accumulated debris of a
dozen platforms. Then there was "a Stiver,"
all the way from Essequibo and Demerara,
and bearing the date 1812. These coins are
a rarity here now-a-days, but those of us
who remember the days of £. s. d. know
that there was a time when enough of them
would make "a pocket full of rocks" and
no mistake. Then there was a New Brun-
swick penny of the year 1843, which is still
worth a penny if presented to the office of
the Receiver General, when by the way the
searcher after uncurrent coin will find, or
would a short time ago find enough of these
coins to stock all the museums in the
world. The most interesting part of the
find was a small coin or medal of a
little less diameter than a cent, and quite
thin. On one side it bears the head of His
Majesty George IV, and on the other a
Scottish thistle, with the legend, "Scotland
exults in the presence of her King." A small
hole is drilled in it near the rim. The gen-
eral opinion is that this piece is a medal
struck in honor of the King's visit to Scot-
land. No one who has yet examined it seems
to be able to cast any light upon this point.
No doubt there are other curious things
hidden in the earth beneath the planks, but
the number of coins which have been found
so far is surprisingly small.

THE ELM TREE.—Specimens of the ore
taken out of the Elm Tree Silver mine,
at a depth of thirty-three feet, have been
received by stockholders here, and look to
be rich in silver and lead. Everything is
progressing satisfactorily at the mine, and it
is believed that the vein, at the point
where it has been struck by the shaft, more
than justifies the promise of the outcrop.—
Chatham World.

COUNTERFEIT.—Counterfeit \$5 notes of the
Bank of Nova Scotia are now being cir-
culated. The fraudulent note is made by the
photographic process.—*Transcript.*

TELEGRAPHIC.

LATE NEWS FROM EGYPT.

ALEXANDRIA, Sept. 23.
General Wood, on his march to Damietta,
reached Chibirn last evening, and was to
remain there until this morning. The rail-
ways are blocked by deserters from Abdal-
lah's camp. General Wood telegraphs that
Abdallah's troops continue to desert. Of
8,000 originally with him only 800 blacks
remain, and they have plundered the bar-
racks, the Governor's house, many private
residence and exchange.

Some of the Princesses of the Khedive's
have been seriously compromised by the
late revolt.

It is generally believed that property val-
ued at £1,000,000 will be confiscated and ap-
plied to the indemnification of sufferers by
the massacre.

The publication of the *Moniteur Egyptian*
has been transferred to Cairo.

DAMETTA, Sept. 23.
Gen. Wood, with two regiments, arrived
at Damietta to-day. Abdallah surrendered
at the Railway station. The troops are ex-
pected to surrender their arms this after-
noon. The surrounding country is quiet.
The crops are in splendid condition.

ALEXANDRIA, Sept. 23.
The British troops occupied Damietta. On
their arrival the negro garrison instead of
surrendering, fled, taking besides plunder, a
quantity of ammunition.

It is officially announced from Jiddah that
the Grand Shereef of Mecca has been deposed
and imprisoned at Taiffe, where Midhat
Pacha was a prisoner. Abdallah Abricoun
has been named Grand Shereef. He is a
brother to the Shereef who was murdered
some time ago, as was then supposed by
orders from the Sultan because he was
favorable to the British.

CAIRO, Sept. 23.
Gen. Macpherson and staff arrived here
last night. The Indian troops and mule
battery will leave Zagazig to night to march
hither.

LONDON, Sept. 23.
A correspondent at Constantinople reports
his proposal that the ambassador meet to
discuss the question of the Greek frontier.
The Italian ambassador has invited rep-
resentatives of the powers to a conference
to be held on Sunday.

Suspected Murder.

A MAN CHARGED WITH MURDERING HIS WIFE.

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—The residents of Chapel
street were to-day thrown into a terrible
state of excitement over the reported murder
of a woman named Mrs. Deslaures, by her
husband, a mill hand. The tragedy appears
to have been enacted yesterday morning,
but nothing was known about it until this
afternoon. It appears that Cassimer Des-
laures and his wife did not live happily
together, and their home was frequently the
scene of conflict. He was addicted to drink,
and his better half bore a light reputation.
A week ago they had a severe encounter,
after which the woman left her home and
sought shelter under the parental roof in
Rochesterville (a suburb of the city), com-
plaining of a severe pain in her neck at the
time. On Tuesday night last she returned
to her husband and yesterday morning was
reported dead.

A SUSPICIOUS OCCURRENCE.

Some of the neighbors looked upon the
matter with suspicion but said nothing about
it until to-day, when officer Quinn, who was
doing duty in that district, was informed of
the circumstance. He entered the house
shortly before the hour fixed for the funeral
and on examining the body came to the
conclusion that the unfortunate woman had
not died a natural death. He immediately
reported the result of his investigation at
headquarters, whereupon the Chief of Police
ordered the arrest of Deslaures on suspicion
of having committed murder. Coroner
Wright was notified and a jury empanelled
with E. Germain as foreman. Drs. Corbett
and Kelly were ordered to make

A POST MORTEM EXAMINATION,
which is in progress at this writing. Gazing
on the corpse as it lay stretched out on a
rude table nothing could be seen to indicate
that death had been produced by other than
natural causes. The features were calm and
composed, but the white shroud once re-
moved revealed numerous bruises evidently
inflicted by some blunt instrument. Madame
Larabie was the first witness called. Her
testimony was substantially the same as the
facts mentioned above.

THE CHARGE BREAKS DOWN.

The evidence in the inquest on the body of
Mrs Deslaures was continued to-night. Not-
thing was elicited to criminate Deslaures
and he was consequently released from cus-
tody.
