The Queen's Birthday.

HOW THE DAY WILL BE CELEBRATED IN FREDERICTON AND ST. JOHN AND WOODSTOCK.

There is every indication at present that the day will be very quietly celebrated in Fredericton, as the probabilities are that a great many will take advantage of the 71st Battalion Band's excursion to St. John, which seems to be the chief centre of attraction and interest on account of the cricket match and the good time of which there is every promise. A large number of tickets have been sold for the excursion, although some others may take a run up to Woodstock to see the fun at that point. The Band excursion to St. John will leave Fredericton at 7 in the morning and returning will leave Carleton, St. John, at 10 o'clock the same evening, although an effort is being made to have this train held over until 11 o'clock in order to allow any of the excursionists who may wish to do so a good opportunity of seeing "Sam" presented by the Chanfrau Combination at the Institute.

The children of the Methodist Sunday School hold a fancy sale in the basement of the church, which promises to be a very successful affair. The doors will be open at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and the sale will be continued in the evening. Admission 10 cents, the proceeds to be devoted to the purchase of books for the School library.

As the Fredericton Club goes to St. John there will be no match between them and the Fredericton old cricketers, as was contemplated a short while ago.

The members of the York County Rifle Association have a match on the Range on the 24th, the first of the season. The arrangements were made on Saturday last, and a suitable prize list will probably be made up.

The feature of the day, or rather evening—in Fredericton will be the Grand Promenade Concert and Bonnet Hop of St. Ann's Boat Club in the Exhibition Building. The Committee of the Club having the affair in charge have spared no pains to make it a grand success and it will no doubt be a most pleasing and well patronized event. The Fredericton Brass Band has been engaged for the occasion, and will play the following dance programmes:—

ST. JOHN.

In St. John the attractions will be many and varied. There will be an excursion up from St. Stephen, accompanied by a band, over the Grand Southern Railway, and the Band excursion from Fredericton, with the home bands, will make a grand musical combination; to say nothing of the crowds of people which the excursions will bring into the city. In the morning there will be a grand Polymorphian parade, and the cricket match on the Barrack Square between the St. John and Fredericton elevens. There will also be a field day of sports and games on the Barrack Square, held by the non-commissioned officers of the St. John Fusiliers, 62nd Battalion, at which their band will be present and play. There will be foot-races, sack-races, potato-races, officers' race, go-as-you-please race, etc., etc., to take place in the afternoon. The bicycle race that was announced will not come off, it is said, as the ground is too rough. The admission to the grounds will be 10 cents.

A feature will be the grand promenade concert and sunlight hop in the Exhibition Building in the afternoon, from 2 to 6 o'clock, in aid of the City Cornet Band. The 71st Battalion Band, Fredericton, and the St. Stephen Cornet Band, have kindly consented to be present and will perform some of their finest selections. A good programme of dancing has been arranged. A large and efficient committee will be in charge, and will see that the best of order shall prevail. A refreshment table will be in the building.

In the evening the Chanfrau Combination will present "Sam" in the Mechanics' Institute.

WOODSTOCK.

In Woodstock there will be a grand celebration of the day under the auspices of the Woodstock Hose Co., No. 1, assisted by the citizens of Woodstock. The following programme has been arranged:—Grand polymorphian parade, from 8 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. Royal salute (Woodstock Field Battery), at 12 noon. Grand Fireman's Military and Trades Procession, from 1.30 p.m. to 3.30 p.m. Vocal and Instrumental Concert at 4 p.m. Grand display of fireworks at 8 p.m. Meals will be served in the skating rink from 11.30 a.m. until 7 p.m., and the day's entertainment will conclude with a bonnet hop in the Town Hall.

The Commercial Traveller's "Land League."

The existence of a "Land League" in the Celestial City has been unearthed by P. M. Marsh and City Marshal Woodward. Rising against the grinding oppression and tyranny, as they think, of the license tax on commercial travellers, a number of them recently formed what was jocularly known among themselves and their friends as the "Land League," and the query mildly put, "Are you a member of the Land League?" was sure to bring a grin of quiet satisfaction to the face of the commercial traveller addressed, if he happened to be one. The idea was suggested to them by some other commercial traveller finding out that if he was a taxpayer in the County of York he would not have to take out a license, and accordingly bog lands, swamps, sand hills and other sterile lands which could be bought at an almost nominal figure were in demand. In the Police Court yesterday morning the extent and nature of this "Land League" was disclosed. A commercial traveller by the name of Archibald T Briggs, was brought to trial before the Police Magistrate on the information of the City Marshal for doing business in the city without being duly licensed. Mr J F McManus appeared for the defendant Briggs, who put in defence that he was assessed in the Parish of Southampton, in the County of York, for the sum of seven cents on \$20 worth of property located in that Parish, and submitted a deed of the same.

It appeared from this deed submitted to the Court, which is dated the 31st of August, 1880, but was not acknowledged until Feb. 23, 1882, that conveyed to Archibald T Briggs and nineteen other commercial travellers the aforesaid piece of land for the sum of \$200, each of the grantees paying in \$10 towards this sum total. The assessors, however, valued each individual share at \$20. Singular to say, the right of dower is not conveyed by the deed, nor has the same been recorded, but has remained in the hands of one of the grantors, from 1880 up to the present time. The following are the names of the grantees:—Joseph Archibald, J Harvey Brown, James T Hurley, Peter Mullarkey, Frank L Gross, Archibald T Briggs, James Lear, Patrick J Quinn, Chas T Vincent, Chas J Seoney, Chas Gyde, Wellington Yerxa, Chas L Shorey, James J McGaffigan, Thomas Nason, Wm G McFarlane, John J Monroe, Stephen C Matthews, Alex J Tait and Robt A C Brown.

These grantees, immediately after the recital of their names in the deed, are designated in the following unique manner:—"Commercial travellers of Montreal, Quebec, Halifax, St. John, Boston, and other cities." It also appears from the body of the deed that the property was purchased by the grantors for \$175 under mortgage sale.

The deed is a curiosity of modern conveyancing and contains more legal, technical and clerical errors to the square folio than any similar document that ever came under the notice of the Police Magistrate in his lengthy career both as a lawyer and a magistrate.

The Police Magistrate will deliver judgment in the case on Thursday.

Exchange Gleanings.

The Woodstock Town Council has passed a by-law against cows running at large on the streets, and the *Sentinel* pats the Board on the back. The *Capital*, having probably got used to cows, turned its attention the other day to bulls, but nobody seemed inclined to pat the *Capital* on the back. We agree with the *Sentinel* that such a by-law should be enforced, and would remark that it might be more stringently carried out in this city without seriously putting any one out. The composed dignity with which a cow ambles down Front street every now and then through the day is only equalled by the dignity of some of the Aldermen who enacted the by-law against their running at large.

The "tinted" paper of our semi-weekly contemporary the *Reporter* seems to have taken the eyes of its exchanges, as it forms a most conspicuous part of every congratulatory notice. The Woodstock *Sentinel*, which of course mentions it, wishes their "old and valuable contemporary increased prosperity in its new relationships." We cannot understand where or how the "relationships" come in.

"Wisdom in Chunks" is the heading of an article in the *Summerside Journal*. A very small chunk would make a great change in the *Journal*.—*Moncton Times*.

The newspaper warfare at Fredericton, says the *Moncton Times*, is having a bad effect. Even the innocent bovines have caught the infection. The *Times* then gives a couple of items clipped from the *HERALD* about ferocious cows on the warpath, but says nothing at all about the *Capital's* bull.

In New Glasgow, N. S., somebody tore down a sign board the other night. The *Chronicle* of that town calls him a miscreant and a vandal, and says the police are on his track. This is just what the papers have been saying about the murderers of Lord Cavendish and Secretary Burke, and the police are on their track too.

It is reported that Capt. Mutch, of the "Northern Light," saw a sea serpent the full length of the steamer, while crossing from Pictou to Georgetown on a recent trip.—*Eastern Chronicle*. If any of the ferry boat captains running between Fredericton and the other side of the river were to report having seen a sea serpent, or even a good sized water snake, the people would say it was the Scott Act.

A "Trainer" Makes a Clean Breast of It.

To the Editor of the Herald:

I got tired of working about the farm and concluded to go and be a school teacher. The old man ridiculed the idea and called me a simpleton, but I paid no attention to that. I felt that I had a future before me, that I had a destiny to fulfil; I didn't know then that before I could fulfil anything I'd have to be filled full myself. I've discovered that fact; I've got my full fill of it. I attended school for a considerable time, acquired a little knowledge and more conceit, and set out for the Normal School "full of high hopes and pious ambitions." The teacher told me I would go through the institution without any trouble. I'd like to go through that teacher. Of course when I came up here I felt that I was the most considerable individual in the city. I was fulfilling my destiny. I was the coming man. I would multiply honors and go home under flying colors. I have multiplied colors variously, and thought of flying, but the honors are left out of the question.

I have been deceived. I didn't know that a teacher had to be a chemist, a doctor, a scientist, a rhetorician, and a cyclopedia of miscellaneous information. I know it now; I know all about it. I wish that ignorance had been bliss, for 'tis awful to be wise. Every time I see a man with a shovel or a wheelbarrow, I think sadly of the old plantation and the discarded potato patch. I'd like to swear, but it isn't a part of my creed. Perhaps if there wasn't any Creed I wouldn't want to swear. I have changed my mind with regard to the future. I don't want to have a destiny; I want to go home. I want to make a big fire and fire my books into it and then go home. I suppose I'll have to stay till the end of the term though. The die is cast and I must stay if I die for it. I intended to try for the medal; I guess I won't meddle with it now. I'll endure the agony with as good a grace as possible, and when I get out of this my presence will never grace the Normal School again. I pen these lines as a warning to all young men from the country who have a destiny.

Better to have a legacy of two acres of land on a blue-berry barren, and a yoke of oxen, than to have a destiny. The Normal School is a splendid institution for men who have brain power enough to manufacture thunder and lightning and that sort of thing, but an ordinary individual had better stay home and manufacture rye bread and pancakes for home consumption. I shall return to the farm. If this, the relation of my sad experience, may be the means of saving other young men from a like misery, it will be a source of pleasure to me in after years, when I sit by the kitchen fire on long winter evenings shelling corn and beans and ruminating on my early tribulations.

"Kit, the Arkansas Traveller."

The presentation of "Kit, the Arkansas Traveller," in the City Hall, last evening, by the Chanfrau Combination, was witnessed by a large audience, and a capital and thoroughly enjoyable performance it was. Spiced with just enough of sensation, enlivened with characteristic humor, and marked with stirring and romantic incidents, there was running through it a strain of manly and noble thought and action that made it acceptable to all, while the acting was admirable in its strength and evenness and left nothing that could be desired by the most exacting. Too much can not be said in praise of Mr. Chanfrau's Kit Redding. It was natural, easy and picturesque throughout, from the time of his appearance as a rough backwoodsman until he appears in more civilized garb and society, and the glimpses he gave at intervals of the true heart and noble nature concealed beneath a rough exterior, were masterful and striking. The whole was a character well conceived and most admirably carried out; pleasing to every critical taste, yet artistic where perhaps its handling by an actor of less known ability and care would have made its rough picturesqueness repulsive to many and the flashes of a better nature merely ridiculous by contrast. Mr. Chanfrau's support was excellent and in the utmost harmony. The Mary Redding of Miss Regina Dace was marked with much power, and her Alice pleasing and natural. Mr. Barr's Manuel Bond was thorough, and his transitions from the gentlemanly gambler to the rougher or his assumed true character were strikingly natural. Mr. Atkins' James Temple was good, and Mr. J. H. Alliger invested the good looking English cop with considerable interest. Miss Cameron as Mrs Temple was lady-like and easy, and the Mrs Washington Stubbs of Miss Floyd most characteristic and true. "The Judge" and "The Major" were admirable impersonations, and portraits of character that "held the mirror up to nature" as given by Mr Barfoot and Mr R L Taylour, whose acting was perfect. "The Judge" made himself an especial favorite with the audience.

All who were present were unanimous in the opinion that "Kit" is the best thing in its line ever put on the boards of the City Hall.
