

Whale River as late as August. The only good harbour on the bay was at Port Churchill. He was extremely anxious that a Government steamer should be sent up to test the question. In the northern part of his diocese it was impossible to grow anything, but about Moose Factory they had been able to grow a few potatoes and vegetables, and a little barley. Wheat had been tried, but without success. The country was well timbered, but the timber had no marketable value, consisting principally of spruce, which was used both for house building and firewood. His Lordship leaves tomorrow for Brockville, and will afterwards return home via the Ottawa River, Lake Temiscamingue, and Moose River.

ANOTHER SUNSTROKE.

The ability of the *Sun* to demolish its opponents is only limited by the typographical resources of its establishment. It has various stages of annihilation to which it reduces them. These may be divided as follows: the lower case, the italic, the small cap, the cap, and the handbill. He employs several of the varieties to annihilate the *HERALD*. Before we treat of the point under discussion, we wish to express our appreciation of the peculiar force of the *Sun's* method. First, it speaks of "Mr. Lugrin of the *Fredericton Herald*," and then with fiendish malignity it refers to the "*DAILY HERALD*, Charles H. Lugrin, Editor and Proprietor." Now, who can withstand such an onslaught? We cry out for mercy. To-morrow maybe he will speak of us by our full baptismal name, and mention the fact that we also publish a weekly edition.

We do not know that we are called upon to discuss the silly nonsense which our contemporary publishes. It plays the same part towards the Local Government as the jester did in the old baronial halls. Its duty is to act the fool, and the bigger fool it makes of itself the better it does its duty. But we can tell the people in whose service it is that it cannot either ridicule nor argue away the fact that the end has come to the administration. They may linger in office; but they are no longer a government. They do not pretend to be a government. They are simply a machine to give effect to the envy and spite of disappointed candidates by the dismissal of faithful officers. Their power is at an end, and they know it. They may postpone the hour of their resignation, for though the people can tell them that they no longer respect them, they cannot imbue them with a sense of political decency.

AN EXAMPLE WHICH OUGHT TO BE FOLLOWED.

The Nova Scotia Government finding that it was in a majority in the Legislature of that Province resigned. Our Executive would do well to follow this example. If they have taken the steps which ordinary prudence dictates to find out their standing in the country, they must know that they are helplessly defeated. They must know that if the House met to-morrow they could not elect a speaker of their own nomination, and that on a square vote of want of confidence, they would be left with a small following. We speak with a knowledge of the facts, when we say that we do not believe the government to-day has six supporters whom it can rely upon if a question of want of confidence were raised. The Government know this perfectly well; and they show it by the manner in which they are allowing the affairs of the Province to drift. They are not trying to govern the country, they are endeavoring to devise schemes to save themselves from annihilation. Let them manfully acknowledge their defeat now, when they will get some credit for it. If they wait until the House meets, they will go down to posterity with the humiliating record of an Executive which for the sake of the pay and perquisites, held on to office long after they learned that they did not possess the confidence of the Legislature.

A number of cases of poisoning have occurred in Moncton, caused by eating canned corned beef, an article of diet prepared by several butchers of the town. It is not known whether the poison is chemical or whether the meat was putrid when put up. There are probably forty patients in all, several of whom had a narrow escape with their lives.

Mr. John Boyd, one of the five candidates for Parliamentary honors in Victoria, B. C., says in his address to the electors, that there is danger of a massacre of the white population of the Province by the hordes of Chinese now there.

WAR IN EGYPT.

LONDON, July 22.—The *Times* says the force for Egypt will be 10,000 men, and this, with the troops sent, will make a total strength immediately available of 14,000 men. The Duke of Connaught, Major General Allison, and Major General Sir Evelyn Wood will command brigades. General Wood has been ordered to be ready to embark in a few days. The Government yesterday engaged ten vessels for transport of troops. The transport *Nyanza* has been fitted up as a condenser for Alexandria. She can condense 32,000 gallons of water daily. The embarkation of the whole force will be completed within a fortnight. Cyprus will be the rendezvous of the force.

At a meeting of the foreign consuls, it was agreed to call on the commander of the war ships in the harbor to ask what steps will be taken for the security of Europeans on shore in the event of an outbreak.

Fresh earthworks have been thrown up by Egyptians at Fort Guerniel, six miles from Port Said.

The Arabs at Ismalia are murdering Copts. Every European has left Cairo.

ALEXANDRIA, July 22.—To-day, 250 Rifles under an aide-de-camp of General Allison were pushed beyond Milaha, six miles hence, to blow up the railway. They met some of Arabi Pacha's cavalry and several shots were exchanged. The Egyptians fled after losing two dead and several wounded. The Rifles having finished work withdrew.

The British troops now occupy Aboukir and will occupy Ramleh to-morrow.

Arabi Pacha has levied a war tax upon the land to the nominal amount of \$500,000.

The Khedive has received advice that Arabi Pacha is well supplied with provisions and ammunition, but his force is not increasing.

Alexandria, July 23.—The Khedive has signed a decree dismissing Arabi Pacha and declaring him a rebel. He will also issue a general order forbidding the Egyptian army to obey orders from Arabi Pacha and forbidding the people to pay him their taxes.

The *Observer* in a special edition prints the following: The proclamation issued by the Khedive asks the people to assist the English, who, it says, are promoting the real interests of Egypt.

The troopship *Malabar* with 1,108 men and a battery of artillery have arrived at Alexandria.

According to the last news from Cairo there are 8,000 starving, homeless persons camping in Esbeih gardens.

There are rumors that the French marines disembarked at Port Said, but it is impossible to verify the rumor.

Arabi Pacha Sunday massed 700 cavalry with a field gun at the pumping station of Ramiah Water Works. It is supposed that his intention is to destroy the station.

Yesterday the *Bittern* cruised off Rosetta to reconnoitre, but did not approach within firing distance. The fort has 15 guns mounted; on the appearance of the *Bittern* the men stood to guns, but did not fire. At Aboukir there was a large number of guns and men, with a flag of truce flying, but no English troops landed to spike the guns. The country is drifting into fearful anarchy. Atrocities equal to any ever perpetrated in Bulgaria are committed with impunity. Arabi is flooding the country in front of his entrenchments to provide for the civil population. The chief engineer of the *Bittern* has been placed in charge of the steam cotton works, where he will be able to condense 100 tons of water daily from wells of brackish water.

It is considered certain that Arabi will destroy Cairo unless defeated and captured.

In reply to the proclamation of the Khedive, Arabi has appointed a ministry of his own at Cairo. Preparations have been made to attack Aboukir. Arabi is moving portions of his troops in that direction.

For an illiterate country Egypt is pretty well supplied with newspapers. There are in Alexandria three dailies in French, two in Arabic, two in Italian and one each in Greek and English, with circulations running up to \$5,000. There are also six weeklies—two in French, two in Arabic, one in Italian and one English. Cairo, with its population of 350,000, has but two dailies, both in French, and four weeklies. Of the latter, Egyptian Event, in Arabic, is the government organ and has a circulation of 10,000. At Port Said, there are two French weeklies, and Suez, Ismalia and some other places have feeble apologies for a newspaper.

The *Victoria Standard* asks: "What will become of the Chinese when work on the road has to be relinquished during the winter months? 8,900 Chinese in one locality, with more to arrive."

A gentleman just back from a tour in the North West says he met several disappointed Canadians returning from the country. They complained that every acre of good available land was grabbed up by the Syndicate, the Hudson Bay Company, land companies and speculators. All northern Dakota nearly, he says, is settled by Canadians driven back from Manitoba and the North West by the fatal policy of Canadian Government.

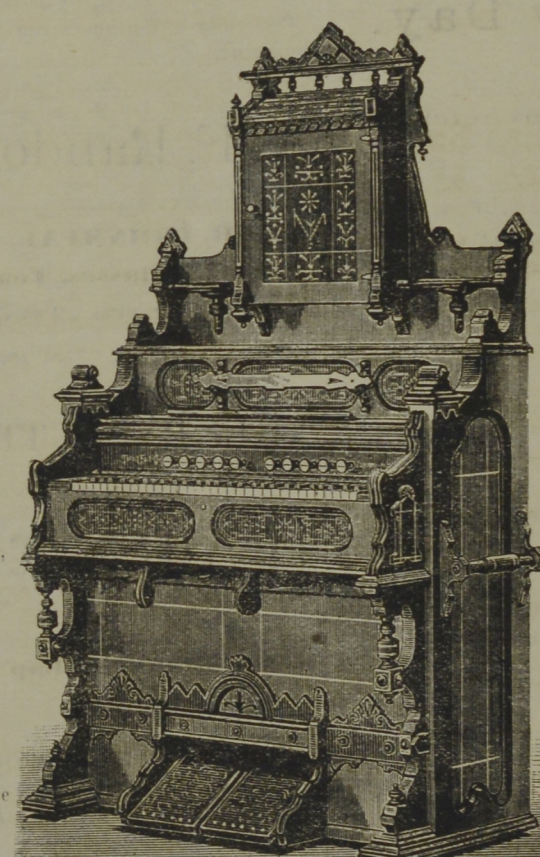
