LOCAL NEWS.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The annual meeting of the Sons of Temperance will be held in St. John, to-morrow.

HAY.—Saturday a schooner came up the river having on board about 29 tons of hay. It is the property of Mr. Havelock Coy.

TOW BOAT.—Yesterday a tow boat was loaded at the wharf with freight for up river. The boat goes all the way to Grand Falls.

FRUITLESS SEARCH.—During Messrs. Cudlip and O'Keef's stay here, they paid Mr. John Babbitt a visit, but found nothing to repay their search.

NEW ROLLER.—The new roller for the city has been completed. Yesterday afternoon it was used for the first time. It weighs five tons and produces the desired effect on whatever it is used.

PUBLIC EXAMINATION.—The public oral examination of the Provincial Normal School will take place on Friday next, beginning at 9.30 a. m. and 2.30 p. m. It is expected that the exercises will be of unusual interest.

SERVICES AT GIBSON.—The Sunday services at Gibson and Robinson, held by Rev. Mr. Brewer, attracted very large congregations. The sermons were of a high order, and the people were very much pleased with their new pastor.

ON GUARD.—Yesterday afternoon Miss Pickett spent most of her time on guard in the Court House. She sat at the head of the stairs, and held a pole in her hand, with which she intended to inflict bodily harm on some person.

LECTURE.—Prof. Walter Smith, of Boston, already well-known to our citizens, will address the Students of the Normal School on Industrial Drawing, &c., this afternoon, at 3 p. m., in the Assembly Hall of the School. The public are invited.

MORE PLATE GLASS.—The plate glass for the windows in Devers building, occupied by the Maritime Bank, and Mr. Jennings's clothing store, arrived Saturday without damage. The two panes for Mr. Jennings part of the building were put in yesterday afternoon.

ORGAN RECITAL.—There will be an organ recital in the Methodist Church, on Thursday evening. Prof. Max Sterne will preside at the organ. Prof. Sterne is known as one of the best known musicians in the Province, and will furnish music that will excel the expectations of the most critical admirer.

RAFTING.—Owing to the slow current in the river, a smaller number of joints of logs were rafted last week than former weeks. At the Douglas Boom, 1,030 joints were rafted at the Glazier Boom, 680 joints, and at the Mitchell Boom, 730 joints. This makes a total of over 19,000 joints, or about 60,000,000 feet of log have been rafted this summer.

HARMONY CLUB EXCURSION.—This excursion will leave St. John this morning at 8 o'clock and will arrive here about 11. The usual sports and games will be held for which nice prizes are offered. The train will stop at Regent street, the nearest place to the grounds, and will return there at 6 p. m., at which hour the excursionists leave for St. John. The Eton bands will be out part of the day.

Rev. J. J. O'Leary, of Grand Falls, came down by the New Brunswick Railway yesterday. He remained in town last night.

R. T. Babbitt, Registrar of Deeds of Queen's County, is in the city.

THE HABEAS CORPUS CASE.—The Chief Justice declined to discharge Martin on habeas corpus. He held that whatever doubt might exist as to the legality of the first arrest, it was clear that the second arrest was valid, either because the first arrest was void, or because it was good and the prisoner escaped. In either event Long would be justified in making a second arrest, and although he had no right to imprison him without a remand, yet there having been a remand before the return to the order was made, the custody of the prisoner must be held to be legal.

POLICE NEWS.—In the Police Court yesterday morning the Police Magistrate, said that there was no more evidence to be produced in the Russell case, and he would deliver judgment this morning at 11 o'clock.

Mr. Julius Inches, was up for placing obstructions on the highway. By consent of both parties the case was postponed until Wednesday Aug. 2nd.

The cases of Quinn, Yerxa and Seanes, commercial travellers, were postponed until July 29th.

James Bonnel, for drunkenness, Saturday night, deposited \$5. On account of non-appearance the money was forfeited.

THAT CUSTOMS SEIZURE.—Mr. Shute has shown to the satisfaction of the customs authorities that there was nothing irregular in his importations and the goods which were seized have been released. Every one who knew Mr. Shute felt satisfied from the first that so far as he was concerned everything would be found correct.

POSITION AS ORGANIST.—The congregation of the Methodist church, Gibson, are anxious to procure the services of Mr. Eli Perkins of this town, as organist in that church. Mr. Perkins for many years was organist of St. Paul's church, where he performed the duties attached thereto with good satisfaction. Last Sunday evening Mr. Perkins officiated at the organ in the Gibson church and the singing was rendered by a choir composed largely of city talent.

SINGULAR CASE OF DROWNING.—Mr. James Alexander, Leicester, was drowned in his mill pond on Monday, while bathing. The body, when found, was standing erect in the water, with head slightly bent forward, sufficient to cover the face in the water, the crown or larger part of the hair being out of the water and not even wet. The depth of water was supposed to be 9 to 12 feet. An inquest before Dr. Black resulted in a verdict of "accidental drowning," probably caused by disease of the heart, from which he had been previously suffering. He leaves a widow and six children.—*Amherst Gazette.*

BILLIARD BALL LOST.—On Saturday evening, as a couple of gentlemen were playing billiards in Howard & Crangle's Billiard Hall, one of the balls jumped the table and rolled out the door on the street. One of the players went out immediately, but could not see the ball, nor has it yet been found. It is a mystery where the ball disappeared so suddenly. There were three women passing as the ball rolled out, but one would not think they had anything to do with its disappearance. Any information about the ball will be thankfully received by Howard & Crangle.

ORGAN RECITAL.—It was announced on Sunday night that Prof. Sterne, of Marysville, would give an organ recital in the Methodist Church in this city, on Thursday evening. This announcement will give very great pleasure to all lovers of good music. Mr. Sterne's abilities as an organist are too well known to need a word of praise from us and those who heard his magnificent improvisations on Sunday evening, will agree with us that praise is unnecessary. He is certainly a master of that grandest of all instruments—the organ. In connection with the recital there will be singing. Solos will be given by Mrs. Lemont and Miss Annie Lugin, and probably by others.

NISI PRIUS SITTINGS.—The adjourned Nisi Prius Sittings of the Supreme Court opened yesterday, Judge Weldon presiding. The case which was taken up was that of Steadman vs. Venning. This arises out of the seizure of the plaintiff's rods and fishing tackle, with which he was fishing on the Miramichi. It is one of three suits, the others having been brought by Messrs. Phair and Hanson. The former of which was tried and resulted in favor of the plaintiff. Mr. E. L. Wetmore is counsel for the plaintiff on the present trial, and Mr. L. R. Harrison, Deputy Minister of Justice is counsel for the defendant, who is the Inspector of Fisheries for the Province, and acted as a government officer in making the seizure complained of.

WATER WORKS.—The Water Works Committee have decided not to send one of their number to confer with the Holly and Waterous Companies, but to conduct their negotiations by correspondence. It would have been better for one or two of the Committee to have visited the Companies, if time is any object. It is not a little curious that the system of water works which have been adopted is that which the *Colonial Farmer* and Mr. John Richards advocated so strenuously several years ago. At the time the matter received a very great deal of discussion. Mr. Richards' proposition, made on behalf of the Waterous Company, was to lay mains on Queen, King, and Brunswick streets, and cross mains on all the cross streets to Charlotte, with fifty double fire hydrants, for \$55,000. The estimate of the engineers, increasing the number of mains, by laying them on George and Charlotte streets, is \$85,000. At the time there was a great out-cry because it was alleged that Mr. Richards was to make \$10,000 out of the operation, and it was so stated in a city journal. The senseless nature of the objections to the project which were made at that time will now be understood.

An Action of Libel.

James H. Crockett yesterday instituted an action for libel against Henry A. Copley of the *Capital*, laying his damages at five thousand dollars. The cause of action is certain allegations recently made in the *Capital* reflecting upon Mr. Crockett's habits of life. Those who have watched the manner in which the *Capital* has assailed every one, who did not see eye to eye with it, will not be surprised that this climax has been reached. This is the result of the dragging of the private character of people into public discussions. Nothing ought to be more strenuously avoided than this, but the *Capital* has during the last six or eight months invariably attacked personally every person who questioned its opinions, or commented upon its political career. Its editor does not appear to have learned how to distinguish between discussing public men in their public capacity, and abusing them in their private relations. The *Herald* has frequently felt called upon to point out to its contemporary that it was transgressing the bounds of journalistic propriety in these matters; but all the thanks we got was abuse, and therefore we decided to let him alone. He now has a libel suit on his hands, which he will probably find very uncomfortable company whether he gains or loses it. How much better would it have been for him to have treated his contemporaries as they treated him, solely in his public capacity.We hope with this action will come the end of this sort of writing. Perhaps no person has more reason to complain of the treatment he has received, in this respect, than the editor of the *HERALD* who has been personally maligned, time without number, by journals which, feeling themselves unable to answer his arguments or his arraignment of public men, have endeavored to dull their point by a resort to low abuse and vilification. To show the length to which this vile personal abuse would be carried if certain persons had their way, we may mention that it was lately proposed by one of our city papers to publish a statement of alleged facts concerning a young journalist and a young lady, which would have utterly ruined the character of the latter. The article in question was written, but was afterwards suppressed.
