LOCAL NEWS.

THE WESTON had on board about sixty passengers when she landed at the wharf yesterday, and also a good load of freight.

FINANCIAL.—The St. Vincent de Paul Society succeeded in clearing about \$200 at their picnic on Wednesday the 9th inst.

TENDERS FOR NEW DWELLING.—This evening Mr. B. McCafferty will open the tenders for Mr. Fisher's new dwelling house. Three gentlemen have been figuring on it, two in the city and one from Gibson.

FUNERAL.—The funeral of the late Wm. Shenick, takes place this morning from his late residence King street, leaving the house at 9 o'clock. The St. Dunstan's Society and the Firemen will attend, each in a body.

PREACHING.—The Rev. Mr. Nairns, of Harvey, will occupy the pulpit of St. Paul's Church to-morrow morning. Rev. Mr. Brewer will preach in the Methodist Church in the morning, and Rev. Mr. McCully in the evening.

PRESENT FOR THE SUCCESSFUL CRICKET CLUB.—C. H. Thomas, Tie Manufacturer and dealer in gents' furnishing goods, has procured a bat which he intends presenting to the successful eleven in the match which is to be played next Wednesday.

SABBATH SCHOOL CONVENTION.—The Sabbath School Convention of the Maritime Provinces, which has just closed their annual session at Dartmouth, will hold their next annual Convention in this city, beginning about the first of August, 1883.

MR. O'TOOLE'S FOUNDRY.—The building to be used for a foundry by Mr. O'Toole is about completed and the machinery is now being put in. The boiler which was put in a few days ago was tested Thursday and proved sound and satisfactory. Mr. O'Toole will commence work in a few days.

COMPLAINT.—That travelling party, the gypsies, are making themselves so much at home above town that a gentleman from there came in yesterday afternoon to lay a complaint against them. They appear to be having a week's picnic, which, with the whiskey, makes them exceedingly noisy and no less insulting to persons passing that way.

PERSONAL.—Rev. Dr. Kingdon, Coadjutor Bishop of Fredericton, is visiting Miramichi for the first time this week. He held Confirmation service at Blackville on Wednesday forenoon at 11 o'clock, and at Derby at 7 last evening. He is to be at Chatham to-day and will be the guest of the Rural Dean and Rector Rev. D. Forsyth.—Chatham Advance.

THE SHERIFFS.—Alfred D. Olmstead is gazetted Sheriff of Victoria. We are sorry for Albert D. Olmstead, who has discharged the duties of the office in a very satisfactory manner. Walter S. Butler is appointed in the room of William Howe, Esquire, resigned. As the appointment is an annual one it would appear as if Mr. Howe's resignation was a worker of supererogation.

INDIAN RELICS.—During Dr. Bailey's visit to Grand Lake he succeeded in procuring some very fine relics, most of which, however, he obtained from persons living there. Among the articles he received were several arrow heads, some of which were beautifully carved. He got some other articles, formerly property of Indians. At Long Reach he did not discover any fossil fish, but obtained a large number of specimens of rocks. He obtained one stone weighing about twenty-six pounds, over the side of which was the marks of fossil shells, &c.

CONTEMPLATED BOAT RACE.—In the event of a race between Nagle and Donabue, there probably will be another immediately after, or at least a challenged issued to the winner of the above race. Yesterday a gentleman made arrangements with an old oarsman of this city, and one who possesses the muscular calibre to drive a shell at no mean rate of speed, to go into immediate training for a race, stakes to be not more than \$500 a side, the race to be rowed on the St. John River, if possible at Fredericton, distance to be five miles. These gentlemen have agreed to furnish boats, etc., and will put up the stakes, and if their man is successful will pay him half the stake money.

THE LEE CASE.—The Lees were taken before the Police Magistrate yesterday and remanded until Tuesday next, on account of the absence of Mr. Wetmore, their counsel. The P. M. stated that if Mr. Wetmore desired he would take up the case at an earlier day. After announcing the remand, Mr. Marsh said that he felt it his duty to refer to certain rumors which had been circulated upon the street. He did not, as a general rule, take any notice of street rumors; but when they were so utterly false as those to which he referred, and were calculated to interfere with the administration of justice, he felt it to be his duty publicly to contradict them. He had heard, and he could name if he wished the parties who had so stated, that he had agreed to remit a penalty which had been imposed upon a person in this city, as an inducement for that person to appear and give testimony in the shooting case. This statement was absolutely false. He had held out no inducements to any person to procure their testimony; he had not been approached by any person with a view of such inducements being offered, neither had he approached any one upon the subject. If the Crown wanted a witness, the necessary steps would be taken to procure his testimony, and he had no right nor authority to hold out any inducements, and as a matter of fact had not done so. As these reports were spread abroad for the purpose of defeating justice, he felt it to be his duty to refer to them; otherwise he would not have done so.

The Administration of the Crown Lands.

To the Editor of the Herald:

SIR,—Will you kindly inform me if our Crown Land Office has a chief officer? If so, does he know and do his duty? If he does, is he discharging it honestly, or in the interest of party and mercenary motives? The reason for asking these questions is as follows:

Some eight years ago Mr. Thomas Turner, a resident of Little River, Sheffield, filed an application in the Crown Land Office for a grant of 100 acres of wilderness land at this place, under the Labor Act. Subsequent to the filing of the application for said grant, to-wit, in the year 1877, Mr. Turner performed the labor required by the Government for the payment of said land, as appears by the certificate of Newton Burpee, Esq., commissioner, and now on file in the Crown Land Office. In the year 1881 Mr. Turner desiring to leave the place, conveyed all his interest in, together with an order for said grant, to Mr. John Campbell, also a resident of this place, which deed of conveyance and order was filed by Mr. Campbell in the Crown Land Office on the following April.

On the 27th of September, of the same year, Mr. William Smith filed an application for another grant, of the same piece of property with Mr. Michael Adams, our present Surveyor General, and notwithstanding the fact that the Government had sold said piece of property and received their pay in full for the same, Mr. Adams sent a Mr. Jack to value the improvements on the same which were subsequently valued at fifty-eight dollars. Now, what we desire to know is: What right had Mr. Adams to sell Mr. Campbell's property or to receive an application on behalf of the Government to grant the same? If he had the right, why does he not pay for the improvements as assessed by his own assessor. But the owner can get neither the assessed value of improvements nor his grants, and when he asks Mr. Adams to return his papers he positively refuses. Has Mr. Adams used the money and his office to help sustain the present government? The writer suggests the appointments of a Legislative Committee to investigate Mr. Adams' office as soon as possible. Knowing you to be a friend of justice I submit you the following facts for publication in your valuable journal.
