A Visit from Spiritland.

A SINGULAR DREAM AND APPARITION—ITS
STRANGE FULFILLMENT.

We have never heard of a more
singular dream and apparition, and never
one better authenticated, than that told
us to-day by Major William Corbett,
formerly of Bell's Corners, but now living
in the city. This morning about 4 o'clock
Mr. Corbett dreamed that his aged
mother, whom he had not seen for a
couple of weeks, nor heard of, appeared
at the foot of his bed in her night clothes
and said, "William, feel my teeth, and
say if they are getting looser." She
smiled and the shadow gradually faded
away. Mr. Corbett woke up, and told
his wife what he had seen, and expressed
his feeling that

HIS MOTHER WAS DEAD.
Mrs. Corbett tried to laugh her husband's
fears away; saying that he must have
had a nightmare. Although only parti-
ally reassured, Mr. Corbett went to sleep
again, and the same dream and apparition
was repeated. This time the old lady
said, "Don't forget my age, Willie. I
was born in 1798, at the time of the Irish
rebellion. I am about eighty-four years
of age. You will find it in the old Bible,
if it was not burnt." The apparition
then seemed to bid him adieu, and
smiled at him, fading gradually away.
The old lady had been bed-ridden about
fifteen years, and the last time Mr.
Corbett saw his mother, about two weeks
ago, she asked him to feel her teeth,
which were very loose, from the effects
of age, and a stroke of paralysis from
which she was suffering. Early this
morning Mr. Corbett went to Mr. Moodie,
the undertaker, and told him the dream,
and asked if anyone had been in from
Hazeldean, adding that he felt sure his
mother was dead. There was a number
of acquaintances in the shop at the time.
He then went towards his sister's, on
Wellington street.

INFORMATION FROM HOME.
On the way he met Mr. Young, a
brother-in-law, who lives in Hazeldean,
and was told that his mother was dead.
On telling the dream Mr. Corbett was in-
formed that his mother was indeed dead,
and that the event took place at 4 o'clock
that morning at the same hour that he
dreamt his mother appeared to him. At
the time of the great fire in 1870, Mrs.
Corbett's house was destroyed, with it an
old family Bible, containing the register
of births. Since that time there had
always been a doubt as to the exact age
of Mrs. Corbett, and the family had often
discussed the matter. This is certainly
one of the most singular as well as the
best authenticated case of

A VISION IN SLEEP,
turning out to be a sad reality. The mat-
ter is well corroborated, as Major Corbett
told the dream to his wife, and then in
the morning to the undertaker, and was
on his way to his sister's for news from
home in consequence. Mr. Corbett tells
us he had a similar dream at the time of
the death of Mrs. John Young, a sister of
his, who appeared to him while he lived
in Birchton, and who died at Hazeldean
the same night on which he dreamt that
she stood by his bed, clasping her waist
as if in pain. She died of inflammation
of the bowels.

Lady Harberton, an Irish peeress, who
has worked so hard to induce her sex in
England to adopt a costume more con-
ducive than that now worn to their health
and comfort, has the courage of her con-
victions. In a London paper we read:—
"At the archery meeting at Exeter last
week, the Viscountess-Harberton appear-
ed at target D in the dress of the future.
The material was grey cashmere, the body
being composed of a stiff jacket, ending
at the waist, something like a mechanic's,
only it jutted outwards a little at the back
instead of lying close. The overskirt—
grey, of course—fell considerably below
the knees, and then the divided skirt
made its appearance—a kilting of grey,
with black stripes. The Viscountess's
jacket opened in front on a sort of bodice,
revealing similar stripes, to match the
kilting at the extremities. A simple
white hat, bound with black velvet, and
trimmed with a little black net, minus
feather, flower, or other ornament,
covered her ladyship's head. She wore
a plain rink collar, with a gentleman's
blue and white neckerchief, and alto-
gether discarded jewellery. Her shoes
were broad-soled and flat-heeled." And
yet we fear that this sensible lady will
fail almost entirely in promoting her
objects, if only for one cause, viz., she is
not of the first fashion.

An Irish Crime.

THE "MOONLIGHTERS" METHOD OF MURDER.
John Leahy, farmer residing at Searteen,
within a few miles of Killarney, was yester-
day morning murdered by a "Moon-
light" party, and the facts that have
come to light place the crime among the
most heartless and atrocious of those per-
petrated in the name of the land agita-
tion. Leahy was an aged man, and had a
large and respectable family. He was
formerly employed as a driver or rent
warmer on the estate of Lord Kenmare,
but had given up that position in order
to turn his attention to the cultivation of
the several farms which he and members
of his family possessed. It does not ap-
pear that in the discharge of his duties
as rent warmer he became an object of
popular enmity or dislike; on the con-
trary, those who knew him describe him
as a good-natured sort of man, never in-
clined to harshness or unfair dealing.
The special facilities which his connection
with the Kenmare Estate Office afforded
him of acquiring farms exposed him to
the charge of land grabbing, which jeal-
ous neighbours were not slow to level
against him. However, the chief cause
of the ill-feeling which is supposed to have
led up to the murder is attributed to the
following circumstance:—Some weeks
ago, a farm of about 60 acres at a place
called Lackabrone, held by Lord Hadley
from Lord Kenmare, was put up for
auction at a sheriff's sale and was pur-
chased by a man named Daniel Cronin,
of Gortatlea, who was returning from
South Africa, where he had amassed a
considerable amount of wealth. After
he was declared the purchaser, the sale
was for some reason annulled, and the
farm given to a man named John Cronin.
The latter is the son-in-law of Leahy, who
was popularly believed to be the prime
mover in the transaction; and this
circumstance was sufficient in the present
temper of the country people to provoke
their anger and resentment. Leahy, the
victim of the present crime, was in Kil-
larny yesterday, and returned home at
eight o'clock. There was in the house his
son John, his daughter Hanora, and his
wife, together with the three male ser-
vants. His son shortly afterwards left
the house to visit his brother-in-law,
Daniel Daley, who resided a mile away.
The household went to bed, leaving the
door unlocked till the return of the young
man. The husband and wife were sleep-
ing on the ground floor off the kitchen,
and the daughter and servants upstairs.
Mrs. Leahy, while awake, awaiting the re-
turn of her son, heard a person enter the
kitchen and in a peremptory manner
order her husband to get out of bed. In
a few moments men entered the room
and dragged Leahy out of bed. Mrs.
Leahy estimates the number of marauders
at between 12 and 15. They were fully
armed, but undisguised. One man, who
appeared to be the leader, ordered her
husband to be placed on his knees in the
kitchen, and addressing his followers,
called on "No. 1" to fire. Despite the
frantic efforts of the wife, who placed her-
self between the doomed man and the
assassins, the order was obeyed, and
Leahy was badly wounded. The captain
then called on "No. 10" to advance, and
another shot was fired. "No. 14" was
then summoned, and his was the last shot
fired, though a bayonet thrust was made
at the prostrate old man. Miss Leahy,
leaning over the staircase, asked the men
to desist, but the person in command only
replied with a brutal threat against her
own life. When the assassins finished
their work they searched for young Leahy.
Fortunately he had not returned from his
brother-in-law's house, and they took their
departure. The servant men who were
witnesses of the shocking outrage never
interfered to prevent the violence, and
when Mrs. Leahy requested them to go to
Daniel Daley's house for her son they re-
fused, and she herself went away in the
dark across the fields and brought assistance.
When the medical man and the
priest arrived Leahy was dead. This
morning Captain Plunkett visited the
place, and five young men, principally
farmer's sons, were arrested.

"What shall my song be to-night?"
said Miss Tibbs at the tea table. "We

ed, "I would try something I could come
