LOCAL NEWS.

TAXES.—The amount of the taxes paid into
the City Treasurer, during the time discount
was allowed, is \$22,386.97.

PERSONAL.—Mr. Rainsford We more has
arrived home, having finished his studies at
the Kingston Military School.

THE COUNTY OFFICES.—The work of con-
verting the lower flat of the Court House
into County offices is progressing very
rapidly. The Committee do not appear to
have contemplated the introduction of water
works. This is worthy of their considera-
tion.

PERJURY.—Yesterday Henry McDonald
was brought before Justice Anderson on a
charge of perjury laid by Patrick Bradley.
McDonald, it appears, swore he bought some
liquor from Bradley on the 10th of June,
which Bradley is prepared to prove incor-
rect. The examination will be held Friday
morning.

THE MADAWASKA ELECTION.—Mr. Theriault
has determined to file a petition against
the return of Mr. P. Lynot in Madawaska. He
will claim that the seat ought to be awarded
to him, or that a new election should be
ordered. His petition has been prepared by
Messrs. Fraser, Wetmore & Winslow, his
solicitors, and his sureties arrived in the city
yesterday.

NO BALM IN GILEAD.—A young Indian at-
tempted to get law yesterday on the follow-
ing grounds: He was playing cards with
two squaws and succeeded in winning
seventy-five cents. He accordingly gave
one of them twenty-five and received a dollar
bill. The latter, when he tried to pass it,
proved to be of no value here, as it was of
the Bank of Hayti. On finding this out and
not being able to get his twenty-five cents
back, he was anxious to press his claim
through the law.

TEMPERANCE MATTERS.—The Rev. Mr.
Phillips, of Toronto, is in the city. He is a
gentleman well known for his connection
with temperance work. His chief object in
visiting Fredericton is to introduce a system
of life insurance, on the assessment plan, in
connection with Temperance institutions.
The membership is confined to total ab-
stainers.

Mrs. Hunt and the Rev. Mr. Phillips will
address a public meeting this evening in the
City Hall. A choir will be present.

Educational Institute.

THE session opened Tuesday night at eight
o'clock, Dr. Rand in the chair. Among the
gentlemen occupying seats on the platform
were Wm. Crockett, A. M., Rev. Mr. Paisley,
Principal of Sackville Academy, Rev. Joseph
McLeod, and Inspectors Mullin, Dole, Smith,
Landry and Wetmore.

There was a very large number present.
The minutes of the afternoon session were
read and approved. Rev. Joseph McLeod
then read a portion of Scripture and offered
prayer. After singing by the students, Dr.
Rand introduced Mr. Creed as the gentleman
to give the opening address to the Institute,
having as a subject "Physical Education, its
Scope and Place in Public Schools."

Mr. Creed, after a few preliminary remarks,
struck out boldly in the subject, delivering
an excellent address. He spoke of the limited
use of the word Education. He took a retro-
spective view of physical training, and point-
ed out that this exercise as indulged in even
by the ancients was considerable. He said
that at present there was not the necessary
arrangements at the schools for developing
good sound bodies. He marked out proper
as well as advisable modes of producing a
sound mind in a sound body. He mentioned
five principles laid down and enforced in
England. He spoke of the advisability of
introducing physical teaching in our ordi-
nary schools.

WEDNESDAY, July 12.
Session opened with singing. Geo. R.
Parkin, M. A., on behalf of committee ap-
pointed to make a report on the High School
course, said that it was impossible for the
committee to meet, and accordingly he sug-
gested that two things be done. 1st, That
persons would give an expression of how the
course laid down met with their ideas of the
subject; and 2nd, By having the committee
filled and a meeting of the same before the
Institute was concluded.

Dr. Rand accordingly invited discussion
on the subject.

Mr. Bolyea said he considered the matter
a difficult one to discuss, as at the last meet-
ing they had advanced their views.

Inspector Dole said he would like to know
if the Board of Trustees of St. John have done
anything to carry out the course as laid down
in Circular 12.

Mr. March, in reply to Inspector Dole,
said the circumstances of the case have not
warranted their fulfilling the instructions.
They have, however, made an advance, hav-
ing procured a third teacher and, in all prob-
ability, will be able to enforce the course
soon. He thought that the course was well
adapted to the wants, but thought that the
teacher ought to have a little more latitude.

Mr. Parkin said that, with the staff they
had in the Grammar School, they thought it
impossible to carry out the double course
according to the lines laid down in Circular
No. 13.

Mr. Creed said he could agree with Mr.
Parkin in part, but not entirely. He con-
sidered that a class could be satisfactorily
carried through a term with oral instruction
once a week. He has known such to have
shown a proficiency which, at times, have
surprised even himself. In respect to text
books he said he would have a higher respect
for Mr. March's opinion than his own, never-

theless he did not agree with him. There is an
outcry against the number of text books.
People, perhaps, think they are compelled to
go to more unnecessary expense than they
actually are. But he considered that freedom
was not necessary in this respect. He did
not think it was right for the Institute to ask
the Board of Education to increase the num-
ber of books prescribed. He would be will-
ing to join in changing the authors, but he
would need to have a good many arguments
before he would join in increasing the num-
ber.

Dr. Jack said he would like to know if Mr.
Parkin meant that it was necessary for a
teacher to have three hours a week under
their own supervision.

After Mr. Parkin explained, Dr. Jack said
he did not think such an amount of time
necessary.

Inspector Dole considered if mathematics
required three hours a week, classics required
six hours. He considered that classics was
being crowded out of its place.

Mr. Crockett spoke at some length on that
subject.

Mr. Parkin, in reply, gave to the Institute
such proofs of the success of those who have
gone from the High School, that it cannot but
be admitted that while only one fifth of the
scholars of the grammar school take an Eng-
lish course, that not only those but even the
classical men outstripped English scholars
when they met in competition.

Dr. Rand spoke for a short time, after
which the discussion dropped without any
motions.

After recess Mr. Montgomery, Principal of
the Albert School, Carleton, St. John, was
called on to address the Institute on "How to
insure the Success of teaching Penmanship."
He read an excellent paper on the subject.
The Institute then entered into discussion on
the subject, and at 12.30 adjourned with a
view of resuming the discussion in the after-
noon.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The discussion on writing was resumed
immediately after the opening. The subject
was fully discussed for an hour, after which
Dr. Rand introduced Inspector Mullin, who
read a paper having as a subject "Organiza-
tion in Ungraded Schools." He said the
teacher will be brought face to face with his
work when the idea comes before him, as it
does before every person taking charge of a
school—How can I best organize my school.

The first thing to do is to attend to the pre-
liminaries, then the classification. And
afterward he should prepare a time table, to
which he should adhere as close as possible.
In selecting assistants, as is necessary in
many schools, the teacher ought to select
those among the scholars whom he may ob-
serve as best fitted for the work. Drill work
should be that assigned to the assistant. It
would be correct for a teacher to allow a
person to take charge when there is no
instruction to be given. In schools having
under thirty-five scholars, he will find it
advantageous to employ class-room as-
sistants.

In concluding a fine address he said:
"The teacher should never forget that his
aim is not merely to turn out a certain
amount of work within a given time, not to
be able to exhibit a certain number of facts
drilled with mechanical accuracy into the
minds of his pupils as the result of his year's
work. In such a light his work degenerates
into mental drudgery, and his school will
show its effects, in intellectual deadness,
and inability to deal with a subject, unless
presented in a certain time-honored and
well-founded way. He must do far more
than this. He must never be forgetful that
to him is committed the important trust of
preparing the minds of the generation to
come for their performance of the moral, in-
tellectual and social duties, and he must
constantly endeavor to turn out trained in-
telligences prepared for all the active duties
of life, and not merely minds prepared on
examination day to go through a specially
cramped for course of gymnastics. His
whole scheme of school organization
should keep the responsibility steadily in
view, and the more completely will his school
organization and his school fulfill its true
function, that of humanizing, civilizing and
enfranchising mankind." This subject was
dropped with little discussion.

Mr. Morrison, after a few introductory re-
marks, moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Educational Institute
would respectfully submit for the considera-
tion of the Board of Education, that in the
appointment of the Superior allowance a
principle in harmony with that contained in
the bill before the Legislature of last session
be recognized by the Board, and embodied in
any new legislation to be had in this matter.

The motion was seconded and a long dis-
cussion took place, after which the resolu-
tion was adopted and the session adjourned.

Fire Investigation.

An investigation was held yesterday by
the Police Magistrate into the origin of the
fire in the Brayley House barn. Only one
witness was examined, namely William
H. Vanwart who being sworn said: I am a
merchant of the city; have a store on Queen
street; I remember Monday the third day of
July instant; I heard an alarm of fire; I was
standing at my store door; I went down
street towards the Brayley House; they were
bringing horses and carriages out of the
alleyway. I know Sheldon McNally; did
not see him at that time; just before the
alarm was given I was in the Brayley House
yard and as I was coming out Sheldon
McNally ran past me out of the alley; he
made some remarks about seeing some boy,
or words to that effect, which I do not
remember, as he passed me; I went straight
to my store and just as I arrived there the
alarm of fire was given; my store is in the
fifth building above the Brayley House; I

went to the fire; I found the Brayley House
barn on fire; could not say what part of
the barn the fire was in; I was not in the
barn; was in the harness room up stairs in
a shed attached to the barn; it was all on
fire inside of the room attached to the barn;
before the fire was subdued the barn was
all burnt inside and destroyed to a great
extent.

Cross examined by Mr. E. L. Wetmore, Q.
C.—I was in the alleyway coming from the
privy; I was nearer the street than the yard
or the back part of the brick building; I
did not observe the boy until he was just
passing me; I could not say if he came from
the barn or the back part of the building or
where he came from; he passed me and went
on the street; he was running; I walked at
an ordinary rate up to the store; the first
cry I heard was fire, and then I heard it was
the Brayley House barn; I then went down
to the fire; there was a great deal of smoke
coming from the barn; judging from the
dense volume of smoke coming out, the barn
appeared to be all on fire. The roof was a
flat roof and would cause the smoke to spread
over a larger area than the fire; the first
blaze I saw was in the harness room coming
from the barn.
