LOCAL NEWS.

DECLARATION DAY.—To-day is declaration day.

DOMINION DAY.—There will be an excursion to Woodstock on Saturday.

THE NEW PAVEMENT.—The work of laying the curbing for the new Queen street pavement began yesterday, at the corner of Carleton street.

TEMPERANCE LEAGUE.—A meeting of the Fredericton Citizens' Temperance League is to be held this evening at the Club Room at 8.30 o'clock.

PARLIAMENT BUILDING.—Visitors to Fredericton find the Parliament Building and the magnificent view from the tower among the most interesting things in the city.

GRAND FALLS.—Quite a number of tourists are finding their way to Grand Falls. It is about as pleasant a way of spending a holiday as can be desired; and about as inexpensive.

STEAMERS.—The "David Weston," which arrived at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, had about forty passengers on board. The "Florenceville" arrived at 2 p. m. Neither had a very large load of freight.

UNEASY.—The "boys" who frequent the shebeens were very uneasy on Saturday night. They did not know just which way to turn, when the front doors were all closed and the rear ones carefully guarded.

MOONLIGHT EXCURSION.—St. Ann's Rowing Club will give a moonlight excursion on the "David Weston" on Friday evening. The Fredericton Brass Band will furnish music, and a display of fireworks is promised.

ARE THEY RESPONSIBLE?—The Tories claim the credit of the good times, the good crops and the high price of lumber. We would like to know if they are responsible also for the clouds of mosquitoes which make night hideous in this Celestial City.

POLICE COURT.—Yesterday morning, Geo. Colwell, brought up for violation of C. T. Act was fined \$50 or two months jail.

SUPREME COURT.—The Supreme Court met yesterday, at 2.30 p. m. All the Judges, except Judge Duff, who is absent on leave, were present. The case of G. Gordon Bryce, in which the validity of the Scott Act election is involved, was taken up. Mr. Skinner, Q. C., showed cause. Mr. Tuck, Q. C., is associated with him. The temperance side is represented by Messrs. Alward, Travis and A. A. Stockton.

UNIVERSITY ORAL EXAMINATION.—The University Oral Examination was held yesterday in the presence of quite a number of visitors, among whom were the Metropolitan, Dr. Rand, Senator Wark, Dr. Atherton, Dr. Coburn, G. G. Roberts, M. A., and Rev. Mr. Mowatt. The Senior Class was examined in French and Metaphysics, the Junior Class in Mathematics and Latin, and the Freshmen Class in Chemistry. The students passed a satisfactory examination on each subject in which they were called on.

NEW DENMARK.—We learn from New Denmark that the prospects of the crop are very good. The spring was late, but the indications at present are that a full harvest will be gathered. The settlement is progressing finely. Several persons left for the West this spring; but a number of families from Denmark, among them 63 persons, have been added to the colony, which now numbers upwards of five hundred souls. The settlers are making rapid advances in material prosperity and their condition will compare favorably with that of any other colony of similar age in America.

N. B. R. EXTENSION.—Mr. Ruel, C. E., has made a preliminary reconnaissance over the route of the proposed extension of the N. B. Railway. He has examined the country lying along the St. John river as far as Little River, St. Francis, which is about twenty-five miles above Edmundston. He then ascended Little River and crossed to the Blue River, from which a feasible route exists either to Riviere Verte or Riviere du Loup. The extension of the railway up the St. John valley would greatly accommodate the people of Port Kent and St. Francis, as well as those engaged in lumbering on the upper waters of the St. John.

SIGN OF THE TIMES.—Yesterday morning P. Bradley made a fine display of empty casks, kegs, bottles, etc. It would appear that some time during the past his business has not been one of the poorest in town.

OLD BOYS' SOCIETY.—A meeting of the executive of the Old Boys' Society was held last evening at Mr. Parkins, the president's house. It was decided to give a prize of the value of \$30 in books this fall, R. Parkin, M. A., W. Bliss Carman, B. A., and Fred St. J. Bliss being appointed as a committee to select the books. The prize is offered to the person going from the grammar school who matriculates the highest in his class.

MRS. M. E. FREDERICTON POST OFFICE.—The St. John mail was delivered at 1.15 p. m. The afternoon mails left the office a short time after. The clerks did well to get the mails ready so soon; and it must be apparent to any one that under the present train arrangement it is an impossibility to answer letters received by the north mail in time to have them go out by the afternoon train. This is very bad, and some improvement is called for. The business people ought to make themselves heard in this matter at once. The western mail was delivered yesterday before five o'clock.

As the St. John mail closes at 6.30, cannot the Postmaster have the Post Office open at 6.15?

ATTEMPTED BURGLARY.—On Sunday evening about 10.30, as Mr. Storey Hooper, a clerk of the firm of Whittier & Hooper, was going past their place of business on York street, he stepped in the entrance and tried the door, as is his custom when passing the building at night, and by the rattle he immediately found that something was wrong. He crossed the street and got some man from Gaunce's livery stable to watch the building until he obtained a policeman, but after searching some time he was forced to give up. He returned, and after waiting for some time, some persons happened along whom he sent off in various directions to find the police, but these were as unsuccessful as himself, so Mr. Hooper was compelled to watch the establishment until morning. On inspection it was found that the would-be-thieves had not made an entrance. An attempt was made to cut the lower part of the sash, but this did not serve the purpose, so the glass was broken by the end of a knife or some such instrument, and about a third of the pane taken out and neatly piled up. The attempt was a bold one at such an early hour. Mr. Gilman, who lives opposite, heard glass fall, but as it was raining heavily at the time, thought nothing of the matter. Mr. Hooper thinks that if he had chanced along a little later he would have caught the thief in the building. It is very strange that of all the efforts made to find the police, none were successful. Where were they?

Methodist Conference.

The Methodist Conference, which opens in this city to-morrow, consists of the clergymen of that church within the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The membership of the Conference is one hundred and twenty. The presence of the Rev. Dr. Douglas and Dr. Young will add very much to the interest of the present meeting. The position which the Methodist church occupies to-day renders its Conferences matters of very great public importance. Taking, as it claims, the front rank in Protestant churches in the number of its adherents, the influence of its clergymen in moulding public sentiment, stands second to none. In the gathering of clergymen now present in the city, there will be found a high degree of culture and education, such as will favorably compare with that of any other body of divines in the world. Methodism has made vast strides in this direction of late years, and happily for its future, and for the future of humanity, there has been no falling-off in the enthusiastic self-sacrificing spirit of its ministers. Instances are too common where refinement and education have driven out that zealous and aggressive spirit which alone commands and merits success. The history of Methodism, however, shows that earnestness and education may go hand in hand and that a clergy trained in schools and colleges, loses none of the vigor which marked the founders of this church.

We have already published the programme for the week, but we will repeat every morning a statement of the services to be held during the day.

The Rev. Mr. Teed will preach this evening, at 8 o'clock.
