SAD ACCIDENT.—A very sad accident occur-
ed on the train going North which left
Gibson yesterday afternoon. A boy named
Crawford, about eleven years old, who had
been in town selling berries, was returning
home and at Millville accidentally fell be-
tween the cars. He was so mangled that he
died immediately. A coroner's inquest was
held immediately after and the jury brought
in a verdict: "accidental death by falling
between the cars; no blame being attached to
the train hands."WATER WORKS.—The Holly system of
water works has been tested at Winnipeg
with satisfactory results. Chief McRobie, of
the fire department, says that with pressure
obtainable he can keep the city safe. When
hydrants are put down he will be able to
reach any part of the fire limits, and have
water playing in 2 min. and 30 sec. With a
pressure of 56 lbs. an inch stream was thrown
on the roof of a three-storey building. The
pressure will, however, be 75 lbs. when the
fire bell rings, the engine house being con-
nected with the telegraph alarm system. In
cases of emergency, both engines, with a
combined pressure of 150 lbs., can be brought
into requisition.AN EXCURSION TO GRAND FALLS.—It is
proposed by some parties to get up an ex-
cursion from this city to Grand Falls at an
early day. We hope if the idea is carried
out it will meet with a hearty response on the
part of our people. An excursion to the
Falls in September cannot fail to be enjoy-
able. If it is got up, an attractive
programme will be prepared by the resi-
dents of the Falls, to include an
illumination of the wonderful gorge. We
hope to be able to announce the date soon.
Fredericton people have not been very
prompt in availing themselves of the advan-
tages offered by the N. B. Railway to reach
the upper St. John, and have made a great
mistake therein. There is much worth see-
ing up-river, and much to be learned which
our people ought to know.BAPTIST SEMINARY.—A Baptist Seminary is
about to be opened in St. John, October 1st.
The building formerly occupied by the Re-
form Club, at the corner of Princess and Ger-
main streets with the play ground opposite,
have been secured for the first year's teach-
ing. This building is spacious and well
lighted, having a large assembly hall and
four class rooms for teaching purposes. The
block has been leased for one year only, as
at that time the promoters of the Seminary
have in view the erection of buildings of their
own. Professor McVicar, of the Truro Nor-
mal School, formerly Principal of the Horton
Academy, is the Principal, and Miss Foreman,
of the Wellesley College, Massachusetts, Pre-
ceptress. St. John will probably furnish the
rest of the staff.A meeting of the Board of Directors held in
Mr. John March's office yesterday after-
noon at three o'clock, and the Educational
Society met last evening in the Brussels
Street Baptist Church, both meetings being
called to consider business in connection
with the Seminary.PERSONAL.—Mr. John Richards who was
taken suddenly ill on Thursday, was much
better yesterday.Rev. D. L. Chubbuck, the Evangelist of
Boston, who was engaged in the Evangelical
work in this city, two years ago will conduct
the service in the Brussels street church St.
John, to-morrow.John Edwards, the manager of the Queen
Hotel is still quite low.Rev. J. E. Rued, of the F. C. Baptist denomi-
nation was in town yesterday. He has been
appointed by the N. B. Conference as a
delegate to the N. S. Conference, which com-
mences next week. He leaves this morning,
going via Digby.

P. Lynott, M. P., is in the city.

Mr. James M. McLennan, who was book-
keeper for four years in F. B. Edgecombe's dry
goods store in this city, leaves this morning
for Sackville, where he will take his old
situation as book-keeper for George E. Ford,
the most extensive merchant there. Mr.
McLennan has gained the good will of all
our citizens and takes with him the best
wishes of hosts of friends.RAILWAY WORKS.—Woodstock is moving
in the matter of the Railway Works as the
following will show:A requisition to the Mayor, numerous
signed by leading business men of the town,
asking that steps may be taken to get an ex-
pression of public opinion in reference to the
securing of the railway works here, was
presented to His Worship on Saturday last.The Sentinel takes this view of the matter:
"We reiterate that the placing of these works
here involve very important financial and
physical advantages to the town and also to
the country. Take the expenditures in con-
nection with the building operations and the
mechanic and unskilled labor employed; then
say, at a low calculation, that the operating
of the works will give employment to and
bring here from outside 75 mechanics with
their families; adding 75 ratepayers, and 150
or 300 individuals to our population to be
fed and clothed and housed, and we have a
tangible data upon which to base the conclu-
sion, that the advantages to accrue should
not be sacrificed by any want of appreciation
or want of promptness in action on the part
of our authorities and citizens."York County Teachers Institute
The third session was opened at 8 p. m., in
the Assembly Hall of the Normal School, the
President, Mr. E. Mullin, School Inspector,
in the chair. After reading of minutes and
roll call, the President, in a few appropriate
remarks, introduced the speaker for the even-
ing, Mr. Jeremiah Meagher, teacher of the
Regent street school, Fredericton, who read
an interesting paper on "Teaching, its Lights
and Shades." The masterly manner in which
Mr. Meagher treated his subject gave evidence
of the thoughtful consideration he had given
it. The various phases of a teacher's experi-
ence in connection with his calling were
portrayed, so accurately and clearly, that
whatever had been the experience of the
teachers present, whether of "light" or of
"shade," while "climbing the ladder of life,"
it must have been brought then before their
minds more vividly than ever. There was
truth in the statement, that, "though thelabors of teachers are not appreciated as
they ought, yet there is something to cheer
them on their way," still the darkest spot in
the teacher's prospects had not been re-
moved. No provision was made against de-
clining health and old age. A sense of this
must assuredly dull the teacher's energies.
It was felt that something ought to and will
be done to wipe out this stain from the escu-
cheon of the Province. He knew of many
teachers who had died in the alma house;
many more must follow, and what about the
fate of scores we never hear of. Mr. Meagher's
address, which lasted about an hour, was
followed by discussion, in which the Presi-
dent and Mr. Parkin took part. The latter
gentleman's remarks were most important.
He felt sure that something will be done
towards securing, in plain language, that
which will compensate for loss of a dignified
position in society, on account of pecuniary
wants; as well as for loss of health arising,
from the arduous nature of the teacher's
work. Some system by which teachers, when
incapacitated by old age or infirmity, might
retire from his labors with an adequate pen-
sion, must and will be inaugurated.After some further remarks by the President,
the Institute adjourned to 9.30 a. m., Friday.
Fifty members had enrolled themselves.

FRIDAY MORNING.

The fourth session of the Institute met yes-
terday morning at 9.30 o'clock. The first
that occupied the Institute was a paper by
A. Kelly, on "Oral Lessons in Country
Schools." The paper was of moderate length,
and after the perusal was discussed at some
length by the Institute.The fifth and last session opened at 2.30
Miss Jannie Gregory of the High school read
a paper on Grammatical Analysis. The
paper was a good one showing the ability of
the writer to deal with the subject in re-
ference to any point. Several questions were
asked at the conclusion, and a short discus-
sion followed.It was decided to hold the next annual
meeting of the Institute in Fredericton on
the second Thursday in October.Votes of thanks were passed to the Board
of Education for the use of the room, to In-
spector Mullin for his services as chairman,
and to the persons who prepared papers to
be read before the Institute

Coroner's Inquest.

The inquest on Daniel Donahoe was resumed
at 7 p. m. last evening.John Reid was sworn. He said he knew
Donahoe and George Belyea; he was alone on
the high water wharf; I asked him to haul a
load of hay; he said he had to go up-town;
he came back in twenty minutes; I did not
see Donahoe with him, and did not see Donahoe
that day; it was after six o'clock.[It will be noticed that there is a direct con-
tradiction between this witness and Belyea.
The latter swore that Reid helped him lift
Donahoe off the wagon.]Doctor Torrens sworn, said: I went to the
Police Station with Policeman Phillips and
found a man on a couch propped up in the
corner; I examined his pulse and heart but
found no appearance of life, and I made an
effort to restore life but was soon convinced
that life was extinct; I told the policeman
that there was no doubt that the man was
dead; I did not know then that he was
supposed to have been drunk.Sergeant Vandine sworn, said: I met the
police on Wednesday evening, and they told
me that they had just arrested Daniel
Donahoe, and they never saw a man so drunk,
I told them to take good care of him; about
three o'clock Thursday morning I was told
by Phillips, who came to my door, that
Donahoe was dead; Dr. Torrens and I got a
jury; I went for Dr. Conthard afterwards;
after examination of the body, the Coroner
gave permission to have the body removed.To Juror Hatt: I did not see any cut on his
face; his mother and sister have often asked
me not to bring Dan home when drinking,
but to lock him up.To Juror Edgecombe: Deceased received
the best of treatment from the police; they
gave him extra treatment that night on
account of his condition.John L. Marsh corroborated Vandine's
statements.After over an hour's retirement the Jury
brought in the following verdict:That Daniel Donahoe came to his death in
one of the cells of the city police lockup
between the hours of 12.30 o'clock and 2.30
o'clock, a.m., on the seventh day of Septem-
ber, instant, from the excessive use of alco-
holic liquor. This inquest approves of the
thoughtfulness of the Police Magistrate for
having directed the policemen at all times to
exercise proper watchfulness over prisoners
incarcerated while in a state of intoxication
and we commend the conduct of policemen
Phillips and Wright in their attention to the
prisoner while in the cell and their prompt
