The Irishmen and Orangemen of New England.

Boston, May 9.—A large public meeting
of New England Irishmen was held here
to-night to denounce the assassination in
Dublin. P. A. Collins presided, and many
prominent Irishmen were on the stage.
John Boyle O'Reilly and others spoke.
Resolutions were unanimously adopted
expressing unmitigated abhorrence of the
dreadful crime, profound sympathy with
those whose hearts have been seared by
the assassins' blow, declaring the convic-
tion that the assassination was delibera-
tely perpetrated by the bitterest enemies
of Ireland, exhorting the people of Ireland
not to rest till the murderers are appre-
hended, pledging \$5,000 as a reward for
the capture of the assassins or any of
them, replying with horror and indigna-
tion to the infamous attempt to connect
the Irish in America with the cowardly
murder, and "while deploring the deed,
we still regard as unworthy of true states-
manship and unjustifiable, any retrograde
step in the march of right and justice.
In common mourning for the men so in-
nocent of wrong-doing, yet so mercilessly
slain, the minds of both nations have been
brought closer than before, and their
united efforts should be to bury in the
still open graves, the animosities of the
past, close the long chapters of bitterness
and hate, cherish a spirit of mutual re-
spect, fair and honorable dealings, peace
and good-will to each other, and thus be
in accord with what is best in the pro-
gress and civilization of the age." A
feature of the evening, which created the
wildest enthusiasm, was the advent of H.
Miller, bearing a letter from the Gran-
Master of the Orange Order of Massachu-
setts. Miller speaking for the Order, not
alone in Massachusetts, but in the whole
United States, said Orangemen are in full
sympathy with the purposes of the meet-
ing, and announced that the Orangemen
were ready and most willing to bury the
hated of discord which reigned for so
many years dividing their ranks in the
common cause for the welfare of Ireland.
A letter from Wendell Phillips was also
read.

THE FORESTS OF EUROPE.—The Journal
of the Societe des Agriculteurs de France
publishes some interesting particulars
with regard to the forests of Europe, and
the rapid consumption of the timber
which they contained. Sweden and Nor-
way, which do a large export trade in pine
are now compelled to buy their oak in
Poland; and in Russia the forests along
the shores of the Baltic, in Finland, and
in the southern provinces, are so rapidly
thinning that the forest acreage of the
empire is now only one in ten. There
are about 34,000,000 acres of forest in
Germany (of which 20,000,000 are in
Prussia), bringing in an income of \$50,
000,000 per annum. The State forests
are taken great care of in all parts of
Germany, in Prussia alone \$500,000 being
spent every year in replanting. The im-
ports in timber exceeds the exports by
over two million tons. Austria and Hun-
gary have upward of 43,000,000 acres of
forest; but in Austria proper the State
does not possess more than 7 per cent.
of the wooded area, and Austria is now
obliged to buy most of her timber in Bos-
nia and Montenegro. Servia and Rouma-
nia have some very fine forests, but
Italy, though her forest area extends
over nearly 14,000,000 acres, does not do
much in the way of a timber trade, as
the roads leading to the forests are so
bad that it is almost impossible to move
the timber when cut. Much the same is
the case of Spain, which has 8,500,000
acres of forest; while Portugal, which
has only a million acres, finds a good
market for her timber.

The New York Herald's correspondent
expresses the opinion that had Melville
begun his search from the south, up-
ward, instead of going first to the north,
he would have found Delong's party, and

pondent gives the letter of Noros and
Ninleman, who were sent out by Delong
for succor, saying that they were unable
to make the natives they first met under-
stand that Delong's party needed help.
Noros told the correspondent that the
captain read Divine service before they
left, and all the men shook hands with
them. Most of them had tears in their
eyes. Collins said: "Noros, when you
get to New York, remember me." They
seemed to have lost hope, but as we left
they gave three cheers.

Distinguished Visitors en route for Manitoba.

The Duke of Manchester, who is the
president of a company that has been
formed in London for the purchase of
lands in Manitoba, Canada, was a passen-
ger in the Gallia. With the Duke were
his son, Lord Manleville, whose wife is
the daughter of Mr. Yznaga, of Louisiana,
and Lord Elphinstone, who is the vice-
president of the company, and in their
company were Mr. R. Tennant, ex-M. P.
for Leeds; Mr. J. H. Brand, Jr., vice-
chairman of the London Telephone Com-
pany, and Mr. J. Ashbury, the celebrated
yachtsman, ex-M. P. for Brighton. All of
this party went to the Brevoort House.
The Duke of Manchester, who is an ex-
perienced traveller, having spent more
than a year recently in Australia, said:
"We have not as yet purchased any land,
but shall do so if situation and terms are
satisfactory. We shall go right through
to Canada. We do not expect to stay
more than a month or six weeks in
America."
"Is it the intention of the company
which you represent to found a colony
here in America?"
"Oh, bless you, no; we have no inten-
tion of the kind. We shall not carry on
farming operations or stock raising. We
simply propose buying a large tract of
land, and then selling it out to small
holders on terms of payment which will
be easy to them. The object of the
present trip is to locate the land which
it will be a advantageous for the company
to purchase."

"Would you purchase in the United
States if good land was offered cheap?"
"I presume so, but our present destina-
tion is the north-western part of Canada."

A BIRD ON THE WING.

Mr. James Ashbury, as he stepped from
the Gallia, yesterday morning, looked the
picture of health and good-nature. He
had grown quite stout since his last visit,
and in answer to inquiries as to his health,
said it had been excellent. "I keep con-
stantly on the wing," he said, "like a bird.

Duke of Manchester, but I have no con-
nection with the party which they repre-
sent. I shall go with them to Manitoba,
but simply for my own pleasure, and I
shall leave them there and must hurry

am going to ascend the Niger for over
2,000 miles. The Duke of Manchester

after a brief visit to Manitoba, but Mr.
Tennant and Mr. Brand are going across
