ROYAL RECEPTION AT ST. JOHN.

There have been a good many difficulties in the way of arranging for the reception of the Duke and Duchess of York at St. John, but gradually the atmosphere is clearing and the tangled things are being straightened out. A large percentage of the citizens of Fredericton propose witnessing the St. John programme, so that a short resume of the plans so far as arranged will be interesting.

The royal party will arrive by the Intercolonial at 2 p. m. on Thursday next, and will be received at the depot by Governor McClellan, Premier Tweedie and members of the government, and a guard of honor from the 62nd regiment, and the royal procession will be immediately formed traversing Mill, Dock, Market Square, King, Sydney, north side of Queen Square, Charlotte, Broad and Sydney streets to the exhibition building. These streets will be lined by the military, composed of the 71st, 73rd, 74th and 82nd regiments of infantry, the St. John artillery and the R. R. C. I., while the 8th Hussars will form a mounted escort to the royal party.

At the Exhibition building the Duke and Duchess will be received by the Mayor of St. John, and in places of honor will be seated the Mayors of other New Brunswick cities, the Lieut. Governor, his advisers, and members of Parliament and the legislature and other distinguished people. Other spectators will be accommodated in the galleries. The civic addresses will be presented and 3,000 school children will sing.

At the conclusion of the ceremonies in the Exhibition building, the Duke will be escorted to the barrack square, where he will present South African medals to the heroes of that campaign, and new colours to the 62nd regiment, the entire military force being in line.

From the barracks square the royal party will be escorted to their temporary homes in the Jones and Macnutt residences. It is expected that the Duke and Duchess will be dined by the Lieut. Governor, Thursday evening, and at 9.30 the same night, they will hold a public reception in the exhibition building. Any person may attend this function provided he or she has obtained a card of admission, which in Fredericton may be had on application to the Lieut. Governor's secretary, and appears in evening dress. The same evening there will be an elaborate display of fire-works. For Friday morning the programme is not yet arranged, but it must necessarily be brief as the royal party leave for Halifax at 10 a. m. that day.

Some splendid arches are being erected across the principal streets, public and private buildings will be beautifully decorated, and altogether arrangements are being made that will be a credit to St. John and the province.

SMALL POLITICS.

Some of the Tory newspapers are howling because a new car built to the order of the Minister of Railways was used by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his trip to the Pacific coast with the royal party. Why shouldn't the premier be well housed during the long journey? There is nothing too good for the people of Canada to give their popular premier, and all the decent people of the country will be delighted to hear that Sir Wilfrid travelled through the west and back again under conditions befitting his exalted position. There are some Tories who would like to see the federal ministers travel in

a box car, or even on the cow catcher, but they are confined to a very small number—some of them, however, have seats in Tory editorial sanctuaries.

The Herald trusts that Sir Wilfrid enjoyed every comfort during his long and tiresome railway journey, and that the new car will be utilized by him whenever he feels like taking a run through the country which extends to him such an unlimited degree of confidence.

ABOUT CHEERING.

A London Times correspondent touring Canada with the royal party, complains in his paper that Canadians do not know how to cheer, but are great at staring. The correspondent is mistaken. He has never been in a Canadian city, town or settlement when the election returns were coming in. He should have been at the Herald corner last Nov. 7th, evening when the bulletins told of the great government victory. Canadians cannot cheer? Let us see, didn't our boys do some cheering at Paardeberg when old Cronje surrendered, and weren't their cheers heard in London and all over the empire.

Perhaps Canadians have been too much awed by the royal progress to find their voices at the right time, but they have felt all the Times' correspondent seems to think they should have shown. Cheering must be led. We have heard one active claqueur at a political meeting keep the house in a hub-bub for a whole evening, and one bell weather can lead a whole host of sheep.

If the Duke and Duchess have not been sufficiently cheered during their trip through Canada there is still a chance for amends at St. John and Halifax, and probably the last sounds they will hear as they leave the Canadian coast will be the loyal plaudits of the crowd assembled at the Nova Scotia capital.

A PREJUDICED WITNESS.

All the Tory newspapers are quoting a paragraph from the Montreal Witness alleging that there is trouble between Mr Blair and Mr Tarte, and another declaring that it would be a good thing if Mr Tarte were got out of the government. The Tory newspapers are careful to explain that the Witness is a Liberal paper, which is not strictly in accord with the truth. Our Montreal contemporary is independent, but very often leans to the Tory side, for instance when it supported Mr McLeod for Parliament in York, a year ago. The Witness was distributed in this country by the thousands as Tory campaign literature. Very much of a Grit paper it must have been then.

The Witness never loses an opportunity to get its knife into Mr Tarte, but its political influence is not extensive nor alarming.

The newspapers announce that Hon. Clarke Wallace died of pernicious anaemia, and the physician explains that the distinguished patient had been ailing for two or three years. He was quite ill in June, 1900. The disease, pernicious anaemia, usually runs a course of two or three years, and is accompanied by great poverty of blood, which varies very much in its course—the ups and downs are very marked. It is almost a hopeless disease; very few recover permanently. Mr Wallace was pretty well in June last. He went to the northwest about August 1, and shortly afterwards diarrhoea set in and he gradually sank from then until the end.

PROCLAMATION.

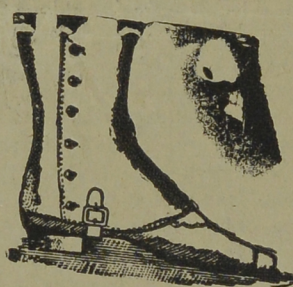

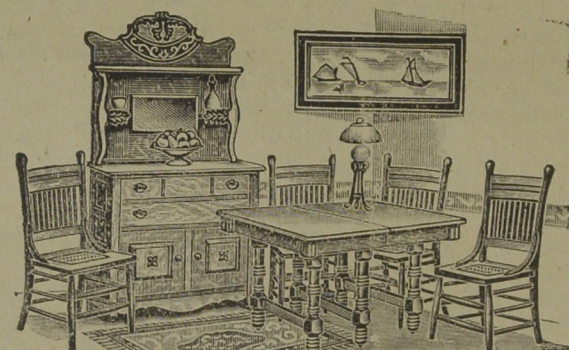
