WOULD NOT PAY FOR HIS PAPER.

Forked Over \$200.00 in Place of \$8.50 Due on Newspaper Subscription.

(Yarmouth Herald.)

Some months ago the proprietor of the Herald felt obliged to sue in the town court a delinquent subscriber by the name of Robert Irwin, of Halifax, for the sum of \$8.50. A writ and

copies were issued against Mr. Irwin, which, owing to an alleged informality, were dropped, with costs against the proprietor of the Herald. Mr. Irwin then brought action against the Herald and proprietor in the Supreme Court at Halifax for damages for false arrest, claiming \$500. This was tried before Judge Graham, who held that no action lay, and that the original copies were perfectly legal. He dismissed Irwin's case with costs against him. These were said to be about \$200. Irwin gave notice of appeal from Judge Graham's decision, to the full bench, which appeal he has abandoned. Notwithstanding all this litigation, the Herald man has not received his pay for the paper.

A Rough Trip.

Henry D. Yerxa, of Cambridge, Mass., Dr. and Mrs. L. A. Cliff, P. A. Yerxa, and F. S. Wilbur of Boston, arrived here by the noon train today to attend the funeral of the late Abraham D. Yerxa. The party left Boston Sunday evening and were nearly forty hours on the road. They were delayed at Portland by a great washout on the Maine Central, but by utilizing electric cars, a steamer and a ferryboat, and other modes of conveyance, managed to reach Bangor this morning in time to catch the train for this city. They travelled forty miles by steamer on the Penobscot river, the boat being obliged to force her way through tremendous ice flows. There were over two hundred passengers on board.

A LAW

In Amendment of a Law to regulate the measurement, (L.S.) inspection, weighing, and sale of certain articles.

BE IT ENACTED by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonality of the City of Fredericton, as follows:—

1. No person shall sell, or offer or expose for sale in any of the Streets or Squares within this City, any firewood of the description usually called cordwood, or which can be measured by the cord, without having the same first measured by a Surveyor of wood appointed by the City Council under a penalty of two dollars for each offence.

2. It shall be the duty of any Surveyor of wood, on measuring any load of cordwood or other wood measured by him, to furnish the party offering the same for sale, with a certificate signed by him, showing the name of the party offering the load for sale, date of measurement, and quantity of wood contained in the load; the Surveyor in making any survey shall take into consideration and deduct any shortage from crooked or rough wood, short lengths, or refuse.

3. The party offering the wood for sale shall pay the Surveyor for his services, on receiving a certificate of the contents as aforesaid, the sum of five cents for each load, the contents of which may be less than one cord; nothing herein contained however to be construed as interfering with the scale of fees as now established for measuring cordwood by the cord.

4. Every person offering wood for sale by the load shall show and exhibit to any person or intending purchaser before completing the sale, the certificate of the Surveyor of wood hereinbefore provided for, showing the actual contents of the load offered, under a penalty of two dollars for each offence.

5. This law shall come into full force and operation on the 16th day of December, A. D. 1901.

6. Section seventeen of the Bye-Law passed on the third day of August, A. D. 1886, entitled "A Law to regulate the measurement, weighing, inspection, and sale of certain articles," and so much of said law as is inconsistent with or repugnant to this law, is hereby repealed.

Passed and enacted this third day of December, A. D. 1901.
