

WELL KNOWN IN CANADA.

Major General Sir Francis De Winton,

WHO SERVED IN VARIOUS CAPACITIES IN THIS COUNTRY, IS DEAD.

His Widow a Canadian Lady.

London, Dec. 17.—Major General Sir Francis De Winton, well known in Canada, is dead.

He was aid-de-camp to Sir W. F. Williams in Canada from 1860 to 1865 and on his staff in Nova Scotia during the seventies. He was also secretary to the Marquis of Lorne, Governor General of Canada in 1878-83.

He married a Canadian lady, daughter of Christopher Dawson, of Lennoxville, Quebec.

Canadian Contingent.

Ottawa, Dec. 17.—Col. Evans intended leaving yesterday afternoon for Halifax with the western contingent of the mounted rifles, but deferred going until today. He has completed all arrangements for recruiting the two extra squadrons, and handed the list of officers to the governor general today to be forwarded for the approval of the war office. No reply has yet been received sanctioning the list of officers for the 600 in the list made out today. In addition to the regular number another major has been added.

Lt. Col. Cameron, of the Royal Scots, Montreal, has been mentioned for the position but nothing official is obtainable. Col. Cameron served with the Strathconas and was decorated with a D. S. O. Referring to the appointment of Canadian scouts, Col. Evans says this is merely the idea he expressed some time ago when he asked the consent of the war office to use a number of pack saddles. The intention is to have one troop of 40 men equipped in this way so that they can be utilized for scouting. It is probable that the command of the field hospital corps will go to Surgeon Col. Wothington, of Sherbrooke. The officers will be colonel, major, captain and two lieutenants. The field hospital will have accommodation for 100 patients.

Moncton, quota 5, Dec. 23, recruiting officer, D. O. C., district 8; medical officer, Surgeon Major F. S. White, 73th Regiment.

St. John, quota 10, Dec. 24, recruiting officer, Lieut. Col. H. H. McLean, 62nd Regiment; medical officer, Lieut. T. D. Walker, A. M. S.

Charlottetown, quota 5, Dec. 23 recruiting officer, the D. O. C.; medical officer, H. D. Johnson.

Halifax, Dec. 17.—Lieut. Col. Irving, D. O. C., was notified by the militia department yesterday of the decision to increase the corps to 900. There are more than 50 Nova Scotians still offering to enlist and there will be no trouble in completing the Nova Scotia quota. Major Merritt is now in command of the recruits in barracks here. Col. Evans and the western contingent are expected tomorrow. The imperial authorities will take over control of the rifles the moment they embark.

PUT UP OR SHUT UP.

Messrs. Sproul and Fleming Had to Adopt the Last Alternative at McAdam.

McAdam, Dec. 16.—The proposed rally in the interests of Dr. McLeod, which was advertised to take place here on Friday evening of last week, failed to materialize. A man named Sproul, hailing from Kings county, and J. K. Fleming M. P. P. of Woodstock, visited this thriving hamlet on the day in question, prepared to discuss prohibition, purity, and other issues being introduced into the campaign. They repaired to the public hall in the evening, and were met by the caretaker, who politely informed them that Dr. McLeod's friends had neglected to pay for the use of the building during the last campaign, and he did not propose to be again taken in. He gave them to understand that if they saw fit to pay in advance for the use of the place for their own meeting and also square up the old bill, he would open the door otherwise there would be no admission. Mr. Sproul fumbled in his pockets and Mr. Fleming looked wise, and they tried to argue the point with the caretaker, but he positively refused to budge an inch from the position he had taken.

The great political missionaries after a brief consultation, concluded that it would not be good policy to make such a heavy draft on the campaign funds, merely for the privilege of addressing the three or four men and boys who had gathered outside of the building, so they called the meeting off and stole silently away.

There has been a great change in public sentiment here since the last contest of a year ago, and the opinion is freely expressed that Mr. Gibson will carry the poll on the 28th.

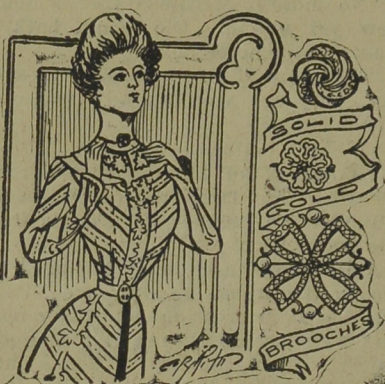

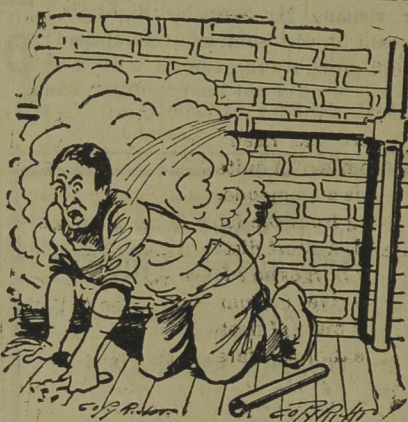
