

PROF. ROBERTSON'S TRIP.

Buying Oats in the Northwest for the War Office.

Winnipeg, Oct. 30.—Prof. Robertson, Dominion Government Commissioner of Agriculture, passed through the city yesterday on his way to Calgary, where he will arrange for the purchase of Alberta oats on account of the British War Office to be used in South Africa. "It was represented to the Department of Agriculture," said Prof. Robertson, speaking to a reporter, "that a very large crop of oats had been raised in the Northwest Territories. It was shown that British Columbia would be unlikely to take them all, and as Manitoba had grown a heavy crop of this cereal a great benefit would be granted to the producer if the demand could be enlarged. The Department of Agriculture have secured authority from the British War Office to send a quantity of oats to South Africa, provided they can be delivered under a certain price. My object in making a trip to Calgary is to meet the grain men, and I expect to purchase about half a million bushels of oats, probably more. The price which will be paid will give the grain dealers and farmers a fair profit, and as it is possible to ship to South Africa at a much reduced rate owing to the special freighters which the government has chartered for the carriage of feed, the War Office will receive the oats through us at a lower price than could be got in any other way. We are sending about 15,000 tons of hay to South Africa a month, taking it from Ontario growers, and will have paid out for the British War Office for hay and oats purchased in Canada the sum of about \$750,000. This you understand does not include what has been paid for horses, as they have not been shipped through the Canadian government."

Trade With South Africa.

Mr. James Cumming, Canadian Trade Commissioner in South Africa, has written to the Department of Trade and Commerce, stating that "when the plague is over in Cape Town, and the effects of the war quieted down, there will be large demands for dressed lumber and general housebuilding supplies, furniture, cooking stoves, etc." The goods, he states, required for this market are of a medium quality. The people, or rather the natives, who do all the work live on corn meal and bread, and only require a little cotton for clothing, and neither boots nor hats. The goods imported are all consumed by the Europeans, as the natives only work until they can buy a few cattle. "Canadians," says Mr. Cumming, "would be heartily welcome in Durban when the mines in Johannesburg start up."
