

IN BLAZE OF GLORY.

Triumphant Close to Duke and Duchess' Long Journey.

ROYAL COUPLE ENTHUSIASTICALLY RECEIVED AT LONDON.

Canadian Representative Read Address of Welcome from Colonies.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

London, Nov. 2.—The royal tour ended today in a blaze of glory. Victoria station where the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall arrived, was buried in bunting.

The procession from the station was one and a half miles long. The royal pair were loudly cheered all along the route.

The army and the London holiday crowds united in the welcome, but to the colonies was accorded the distinction of emphasizing the Imperial nature of the function. Their official representatives headed by Mr J G Colmer, C M G, as Lord Strathcona's deputy for Canada, was at the Victoria station and presented addresses of congratulation and welcome and received a reply. They were introduced by Mr. Chamberlain to the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall. The colonies in this way placed the final seal upon the Imperial mission, and the King will not defer many days the investiture of his son with the title of Prince of Wales.

MAINE MAN MURDERED.

No Less Than Seventeen Cuts on His Body—Three Suspects Arrested.

Bangor, Me., Nov. 2.—Thomas Gibbons, of Bangor, foreman for a lumbering concern; Fred A Holt, of Augusta, and Mrs. Gero, are under arrest for the alleged murder of Thomas Gero, at Chesuncook.

J.E. Hartshorn of St. Johnsbury, Vt., a hunter, brought the story. He said that on Tuesday forenoon the people at the Chestnutcook Hotel, going across the lake near the Gero house, saw the body of Thomas Gero stretched on the ground, partially covered by a cloth, but terribly mangled. There were no less than seventeen cuts on the corpse, and from its appearance it was evident that a fierce fight had occurred before he had given up his life. The wounds appeared to have been made with a knife, or a razor, save one in the side, which seemed to have been made with an axe.

Mr Barnes, a justice of the peace, who lives near by, was notified, and the strange man who gave his name as Fred Holt, and Thomas Gibbons, who was stopping at the Gero house, were arrested, together with Mrs Gero.

After hearing all the evidence in the case the coroner's jury returned a verdict stating that the deceased, Thomas Gero, Sr., came to his death by a thrust from a knife held in the hands of Mrs. Esther Gero.

SMALLPOX IN QUEBEC.

Physicians Declare There Are Over Forty Cases in the City.

Quebec, Nov. 2.—Smallpox is still spreading, notwithstanding the statement of the health authorities to the contrary. Yesterday ten new cases were reported, making a total of thirty-four cases now on the civic health department books. There are nine of those patients isolated in the Civic Quarantine Hospital and twenty-one houses placarded.

The city physicians insist that there are more than thirty-four cases existing in the city. They say that the number is over forty and blame the authorities for not acting more vigorously in an endeavor to stamp out the disease.

WILL WATCH THE FRENCH.

CANADIAN OFFICER.

Among Those Killed by the Boers in South Africa.

LATE COL. BENSON A NATIVE OF ST. CATHERINES ONT.

Had Seen a Great Deal of Service and was a Brave Man.

Montreal, Nov. 2.—Col. Benson, who is reported killed in South Africa, is a Canadian.

He was a son of Hon. J. R. Benson of St. Catharines, Ontario, and has a brother living in that city.

He saw his first service during the Fenian Raid in 1866 and joined the Imperial service in 1869.

He received his military training at Sandhurst, England, saw a great deal of service in India, and commanded a brigade in Egypt in 1892-94 and in 1895.

He was appointed inspector of the garrison at Dublin, and went to South Africa when the Boer war broke out.

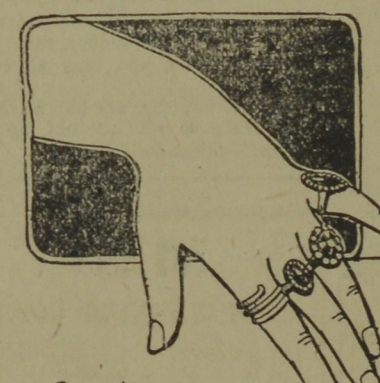
