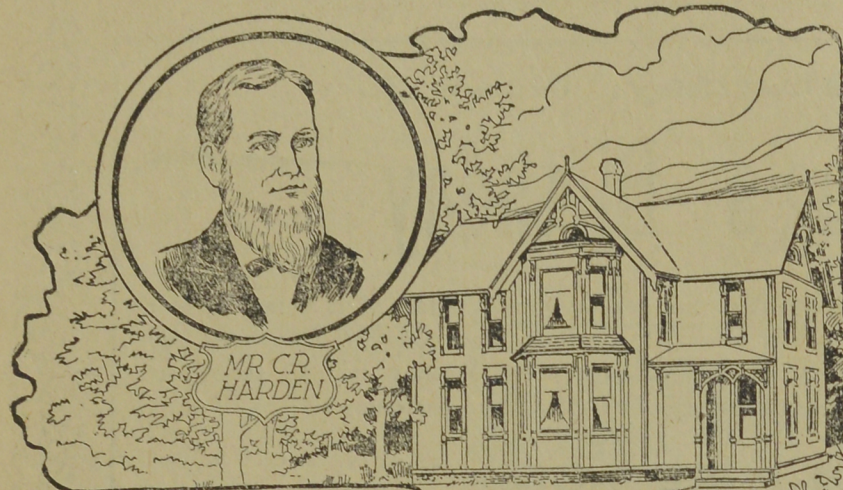

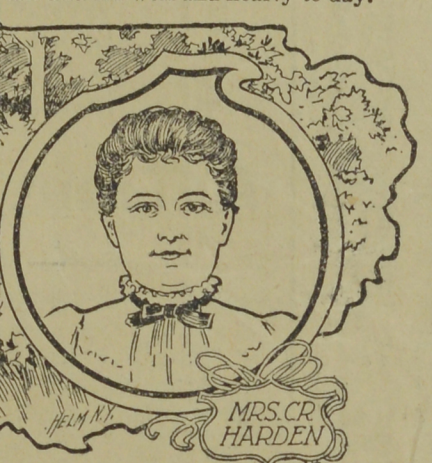

SPOKE FOR CANADA.

Hon. Sydney Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, Addresses New York Business Men.

New York, Nov. 8.—The fifth annual dinner of the Canadian Society of New York, held at the Waldorf-Astoria last evening, was one of the most successful ever given. Hon. Sydney Fisher, in speaking for Canada, said he was glad to note some awakening in the United States on the question of trade with other countries. While in the past the United States to a large extent was a country sufficient for itself, your leaders now have the disposition to investigate foreign markets. Canada comes sixth in the list of countries from which you purchase and it seems as though your statesmen would do well to consider how trade with Canada can be fostered and improved. And he added: Let me venture to say trade follows the channels of least resistance and that customs duties are among the difficulties which trade finds it most difficult to overcome. In your newly directed efforts toward reciprocity, perhaps with Canada, if your statesmen are reasonable you might be able to find an opportunity of successful negotiation. The more we come together, the stronger will be these bonds of sympathy which are natural between peoples of the same race, same languages, same traditions.

These sympathies have been largely and generously expressed on two tragic occasions within a short time. When her late Majesty passed away, the American nation grieved for a great sovereign in the same way, and in the same spirit her own subjects felt their loss. So, the other day, when the head of your own government was stricken down, the people of Canada and the British empire were not only grieved at the enormity of the crime, but felt the acute loss which the citizens of this country suffered.

THOUGHT HUBBY IN PHILADELPHIA

Mrs. Vent Surprised to See Him in New York Music Hall, and Pulled His Blond Companion's Back Hair.

New York, Nov. 9.—The audience at Hartig & Seamon's music hall in 125th St. was treated to a scene last night that was not on the program. Mrs. Martha Vent, middle-aged and fashionably attired, attended the performance, accompanied by her grown son by her first marriage, Percival Newcomb.

The curtain was about to go down on the first act when a young woman came down the middle aisle, escorted by a gentleman in evening dress. The woman was a stranger to Mrs. Vent, but the man was her husband. He did not see his wife, and he and his companion took seats directly in front of her. Mrs. Vent leaned forward and entwined her fingers in the woman's back hair. A scream rent the air, and Mr. Vent nearly dropped from fright.

Mrs. Vent hung on to the blond hair with might and main in spite of the screams of the young woman. The play was stopped. Two policemen, a fireman and all the ushers rushed to the scene. All the parties to the disturbance were taken into the lobby, where the young woman fainted. When she recovered she and Mr. Vent hurried away. Mrs. Vent darted after them. They saw her coming and broke into a run.

Young Newcomb caught his mother and persuaded her to accompany him to the station house with the policemen. Mr. Vent and the young woman got away. At the station house Mrs. Vent was paroled in the custody of her son.

A PROFITABLE BUSINESS.

Mr. Blair Accomplished a Good Thing For St. John in Securing Shipment of Remounts.

The Herald's special from Ottawa Friday, announcing that remounts for South Africa will be shipped from St. John, is verified by a message which Wm. Thomson & Co., St. John, received from Hon. A. G. Blair stating that he had secured the shipment of horses from St. John and asking them to notify the press.

Troop & Son, the agents for the Elder Dempster line, were notified Friday morning that the steamer Mor mouth of that line, which was reported as coming to Portland to take on board 800 Canadian horses for South Africa would come to St. John to load. Among the passengers from Montreal yesterday was Hector McLean, who looks after the fitting up of the Elder Dempster bras for the carriage of horses, etc. Mr. McLean says the cost of fitting up the ship at St. John will be in

neighborhood of \$9,000. He has arranged for all the lumber and other materials required. When the ship reaches St. John Mr. McLean states he will need the services of 60 or 70 men for a week or ten days to put the Monmouth in a position to receive the horses.

The Monmouth is a vessel of 2569 tons. She left Cape Town on the 16th of October and will call at Newport News for coal. It is expected she will be in St. John on the 20th inst. She will land at Sard Point.

The other steamer will come to St. John for her cargo soon after.

BIRTHDAY HONORS.

Only Two Colonials in the List.

London, Nov. 9.—Among the honors bestowed on the occasion of King Edward's birthday, are a baronetcy upon the retiring lord mayor of London, Frank Green, and knighthoods for Chief Justices Little of Newfoundland and Gray of Bermuda; G. A. Crichtett, oculist to the King, and Geo. Hossey, Mayor of Southampton. Sir Francis Plunkett is made a Knight Grand Cross of the Bath, and Clinton Dawkins, formerly financial member of the council of the Governor General of India, and now a member of the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co., is made a Companion of the Bath.

A. L. Jones, president of the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce, who is head of the concern of Elder Dempster & Co., is made a Knight Commander of St. Michael and St. George.

No New Developments.

There is nothing new to report in connection with the alleged outbreak of smallpox at Waterville, in the parish of Southampton. Dr. Owens, the attending physician is not sure that the young men have smallpox and will be unable to give a decided opinion for several days yet. In the meantime the quarantine regulations are being rigidly enforced.

Tragedy of the Deep.

Sydney, C. B., Nov. 9.—The schooner John Cabot, which left Rose Blanche for Sydney about three weeks ago, and which was to land Father O'Regan at Channel on a sacerdotal mission, is reported bottom-up off Burnt Island, Newfoundland. All hands must have perished.

Dr. E. B. Fisher's condition is much improved today and he expects to return to his home at Marysville this evening.
