

DIED OF SMALLPOX.

Victim's Name was Spragg
and he Lived Near
Norton, King's
County.

OTHER SUSPECTS IN THE SAME COUNTY.

Only One New Case Developed
Today in St John.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

St John, Nov. 9.—Patrick Hamilton, aged five, is the only new case of smallpox developed here today.

He is from the quarantined house and other members of the same family are in the epidemic hospital.

The man Spragg, near Norton, died last night and was buried this morning.

There are some suspects in other places in Kings.

(Telegraph Saturday.)

No new smallpox cases were reported to the board of health yesterday. One suspect of the previous day, Lewellyn Parker, 19 years old, was pronounced a case and removed to the epidemic hospital where two members of the same family were already confined.

One of the inmates at the epidemic hospital is announced to be in a serious condition. The patient is a little girl named Sherwood, whose mother lives on River street, Indian town. The child was a sufferer from hip disease when she was stricken with smallpox.

The general hospital superintendent says there are no more suspects in Ward C. and he is hopeful that no more cases will develop.

The Sun was informed Friday night that of the two sons of Samuel Spragg who are ill at Hatfield's Point, one was so seriously ill that his death was hourly expected, while the other case was mild. No further word has been received from the Kings Co. board of health regarding the conditions there, or at Chapel Grove.

HOPELESS WRECK.

Maine Schooner Cut to the Water's
Edge.

Gloucester, November 9.—The coasting schooner Eastern Light, from Harrington, Me., was towed in here this morning a total wreck. Her bow is almost literally cut off above the waterline from the knighthead forward. All the headgear is gone; the mainmast and all the booms but the foremast also went by the board. She was swept from fore to aft and the crew nearly all perished, but the cargo of lumber on deck was saved.

But for the fact that she was lumber-laden she probably would have sunk in a few minutes after she struck. The long lumber in the hold acted as a raft and kept her afloat.

The Eastern Light was bound from Machias with a cargo of lumber to Weymouth, Mass. She left port Monday and had fair weather all the way. Last night at 8.30, while off the isles of Shoals, she was struck by the large towboat Paoli. After striking the vessel the captain of the towboat stood by and rendered what assistance he could.

When it was found that the schooner was so badly damaged she was taken in tow and arrived in port early this morning.

HORSES AND MULES CREMATED.

St Louis, Nov. 9.—Fire last night completely destroyed the stables and barns of the Excelsior hauling and transfer company.

Together with the buildings, sheds and about \$12,000 worth of feed in the loft, 300 head of horses and mules lost their lives.

Co. Ed Butler, president of the company, said that \$150,000 would be a low estimate of the loss.

COST OF ROYAL VISIT.

Amount to be Paid by Dominion Government May Reach \$300,000.

Ottawa, November 9.—The public department are busily engaged in scrutinizing

the accounts incurred in connection with the visit to Canada of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York. Parliament last session only voted \$120,000, but it was said that this sum would not cover the expense which would likely be incurred, and time has justified this view.

The military displays alone, it is said, have cost over \$100,000. The item of transportation over the different railways will be a large one, and then in addition there are the expenses incurred in connection with the decoration of the public buildings in Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto, St. John, Halifax, Vancouver, Winnipeg and many other places. When all the accounts are paid there will be very little left out of \$300,000. A Governor-General's warrant has been issued to meet the expenses.

PLACER GOLD IN HIS HAIR.

Leadville, Colo., Nov. 9.—James McCormack, who has recently located a placer, is the son of a California pioneer, and himself an argonaut with a wonderful story. While on his way east a few weeks ago Mr. McCormack went into a Leadville barber shop, and the barber, he says, found flour gold in his hair.

He had been in the habit of washing in a small but turbulent mountain stream, and the oil of his hair acted as a natural amalgam.

McCormack postponed his eastern trip and returned to the stream of golden sands to investigate. He located a placer and says it is worth from \$150,000 to \$500,000.

WILL JOIN INDIAN ARMY.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—Dr. Phillip Weatherbe, a son of the Hon. Mr. Justice Weatherbe, of Halifax, N. S., and a brother of Major Paul Weatherbe of the Militia Department, just arrived from England, has completed his course in medicine in Edinburgh University, and intends taking a commission in the Indian Army Medical Corps. He gained valuable experience during the nine months which he served in South Africa last year, with the Scottish Hospital Corps, from Edinburgh.

LAND AGENT AT EDMONTON.

Mr. A. G. Harrison Appointed to Lucrative Position by the Dominion Government.

A Fredericton boy in the North-west, Arthur G. Harrison, B.A., of the University of New Brunswick, and a graduate of the Engineering School, has received official notice from Ottawa of his appointment as Agent of Dominion Lands at Edmonton, Alberta, at a salary of twelve hundred dollars, duties to begin Jan. 1st. Preparatory to this responsible post, he was made Homestead Inspector for Northern Alberta and in that capacity is about completing a tour over that wide and fertile district.

Mr. Harrison is the youngest son of Chancellor Harrison of the University, and his many friends in this city will be pleased to learn of his preferment.

MURDER IN VICTORIA.

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 9.—Tom Neles, a Greek fisherman, was murdered on Herald street here yesterday by Frank Nicolas, aged 47, an Italian fisherman. The men had been drinking, and when visiting some resorts below the dead line they quarrelled over their catches of fish and, after fighting a few minutes, Nicolas stabbed Neles in the abdomen and left breast, the latter wound causing death within 20 minutes. The murdered man was carried from where he was found on the street to the police station. Nicolas fled to the fishing village and made off in his sloop. The police pursued in a steam launch but the fugitive has so far avoided capture.

All the talk about Canada sending another contingent to South Africa is mere speculation. The war office has the government's offer of a year ago to raise and equip another regiment if necessary, and may or may not avail itself of the opportunity.

SUPREME COURT.

Appeal Allowed in a York County Case.

Temperance and General Assurance Company (defendant) appellant, and Wm. C. Ingraham (plaintiff) respondent—E. R. Chapman supports appeal from the York county court, O. S. Crockett contra. Appeal allowed with costs and judgment for the defendant to be entered in the court below with costs. The defendant in this case resided in Millville, York county, and the action was for false imprisonment. It was tried before Judge Wilson at the June term of the county court, and verdict returned for the plaintiff for \$94.50.

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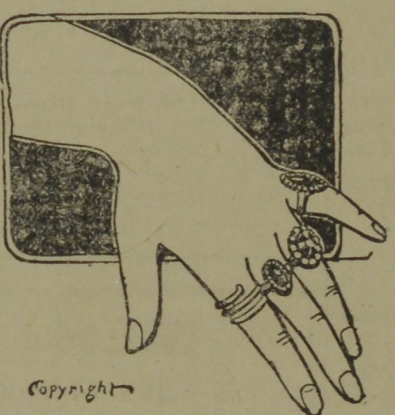
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
