A New Pastor.

Rev. Z. L. Fash, lately of Nova Scotia, has accepted the call extended him by the Albert St. Baptist church, Woodstock, and will enter upon his duties tomorrow.

In Winter Quarters.

The steamer Aberdeen, which has been lying at her wharf here ever since she was taken off the Woodsack route early last summer, has gone to Swan Creek, Sanbury County, where she will be put into winter quarters.

Big Property Transfer.

The Moncton Transcript says that W. M. McKay, of St. John, has purchased from Hon. C. W. Robinson, Speaker of the legislature, several lots of timberland at Diligent River, Cumb. Co., N. S., paying \$20,000 therefor.

King's Birthday.

Flags are flying on all public buildings and hotels today in honor of His Gracious Majesty, King Edward VII. The Royal Standard is flying from the new flag staff on the officers' square. The banks and public offices were closed.

Fireworks Tonight.

The firemen are to celebrate the King's birthday this evening by a grand display of fireworks, which they will set off on post office square, commencing at 7.30 o'clock. The band of the R. C. R. I. will render a short program of music at the same time.

Taken to the Hospital.

Jabez, the twelve year old son of Jonathan Sims, of Kingslear, who fell and broke his left thigh while playing football on Wednesday, as already reported in these columns, was brought to the city this morning and admitted to the Victoria Hospital.

A New Bridge.

Coun. W. R. Fawcett, of Temperance Vale, has completed the work of rebuilding the Estey bridge over the Keswick stream. The new bridge has a span of 72 feet and has the appearance of a substantially built structure. It is to be covered over early next spring.

Laborers in Demand.

Water Superintendent Burchill is advertising for laborers to assist in extending the water main on York street as far as the shoe factory. He is offering \$1.50 per day for good men. The work was ordered at the last meeting of the council and is to be completed as soon as possible.

Diphtheria Cases.

There is a case of diphtheria in a house on Charlotte street, occupied by a colored family, and a placard notifying the public has been posted in one of the windows. There are also several cases of the disease in the family of an employee of the Aberdeen mill, named Green, who resides on Government lane.

Death from Croup.

Susan Blanche, the little five year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Duffy, died last night after a brief illness brought on by an attack of membranous croup. The funeral took place at four o'clock this afternoon, interment being made at Forest Hill. Rev. Dr. Roberts conducted the services and John G. Adams had charge of the arrangements.

Death at Nashwaak.

Martin McBean, a well known resident of Nashwaak Village, died at his home at that place last night, after about a week's illness from inflammation of the bowels. He was 31 years of age, and is survived by a widow and family of two children. The funeral will take place on Monday, with John G. Adams in charge of the arrangements.

Trouble Over a Moose.

Elijah Morehouse of Upper Keswick, who killed a moose a short time ago under rather peculiar circumstances, has been proceeded against for violating the game law. The complaint was lodged by Game Warden Henry Bartt, and was tried by Justice C. W. Ftey, who reserved judgment until the 12th. The head of the moose, which had been sent to a taxidermist, was seized, and will be sold at public auction. Morehouse came on to the moose while out partridge shooting, and claims to have killed the animal

in self defence with a knife and fork, which he dropped into the muzzle of his gun.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

City Council Asked to Fit up the City Hospital.

The special meeting of the Board of Health yesterday afternoon was attended by Chairman Everett, Havelock Coy, John M. Wiley and Secretary Beckwith.

The board having ascertained that they had not the power to have needed repairs made to the city hospital, on the Alms House grounds, adopted a resolution recommending that the work be undertaken without delay by the City Council. They recommend among other things that the building be provided with a new roof, that water be put in from the alms house, that a woodshed be erected on the east side of the building, also that a telephone be put in and a cess pool be dug on the grounds.

A copy of the resolution was ordered to be forwarded to the city council.

As a result of the action of the Board of Health Mayor Crockett has called a special meeting of the city council for four o'clock Monday afternoon to consider the recommendations.

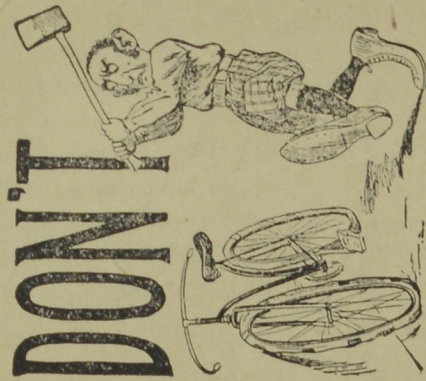
