EDITORIAL COMMENT.

Our first touch of winter today.

The war office wants 20,000 more horses for South Africa.

The size of the domestic wood pile is being investigated today.

The poets who formerly wrote of "Dull November," have been put out of business so far this year.

There is no appearance yet of smallpox in the St. John Sun office, but the paper's staff has evidently a bad attack of anti-Tarte.

The many friends of Rev. J. J. Teasdale are pleased to know that he has so far recovered his health as to be able to take his place in the pulpit.

Six hunters in the Maine woods have been killed this season in mistake for deer. How would it do to make an example of some of the homicides.

Governor McClellan's term will expire next month, but there seems to be a general belief that His Honor will be on hand to open the next session of the legislature.

The Sun is still in despair over the alleged Rothesay forgers, but never troubles itself to discover the men who stole the Queens county seat in parliament.

"Be soberminded" was the key note of Rev. Willard Macdonald's able sermon to young men at St. Paul's church Sunday. The discourse was a thoughtful and eloquent one.

We no longer speak of the heir apparent to the throne as The Duke of Cornwall and York. H. R. H. is now the Prince of Wales, and the Duchess is the Princess of Wales.

It is said that the Canadian Government will at once open negotiations with the Australian Government with a view to securing reciprocity in trade between the two countries.

Two N. B. University graduates who had bright prospects at the New Brunswick bar have died within a week. Leigh Harrison and Stanley Kierstead were men of talent and popularity.

The Honorable Harry thought he was going to do the matrimonial business up in a slv way, but a sharp detective at the border unmasked his plans. Anyhow the future Mrs McKeown is a native born New Brunswicker.

Smallpox is extending its ravages in St John and Kings county, and there is no knowing where else it may appear in this province. Fredericton authorities are taking precautions against the introduction of the disease here.

Another official has betrayed his trust. Charles Thompson treasurer of the Order of Maccoches is \$57,000 short and has disappeared. The order is located principally in the United States, but has a number of lodges in Canada.

The tremendous defensive force of the United States, in available men, is revealed in the census report showing that in 1900 those of militia age numbered 16,360,363, of whom more than 13 million were native born and more than 14 millions were white.

The manager of the Elder Dempster steamship line whose vessels ply between St. John and Liverpool in winter, offer a free passage to any foreign port of one or two representatives of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association with a view to increasing Canada's export trade.

The alleged Prince of Beluchistan, who mystified London by his grandeur and in Montreal shared public attention with the whale, has been unmasked by New York reporters. The pre-eroded oriental grandee is a former currie cook at Sherry's famous restaurant, New York, and his name is Ranjit Smile.

Sydney, C. B., exported its first cargo of pig iron last week, sending a cargo of 4,500 tons to England. The next cargo will go to Boston. The Dominion Iron and Coal Company which has made Sydney a live town and increased its population from 2,000 to 12,000, is evidently getting down to the business for which it was organized.

The Sun is rampant again on the question of sending another Canadian contingent to South Africa. Of course it condemns the government for not rushing another regiment off to the war, and yet the Tory organ is well aware that the war office for a whole year has had an offer from the federal government of another Canadian contingent.

In a three-column letter to The London Times, Sir William Vernon Harcourt indicts the Government's policy and conduct in the South African war, especially in the later stages. He declares that the banishment of Boers and the confiscation of their property are both unconstitutional and mischievous, and can be defended neither by the law of war nor by civil law.

"We are not sending any more delegations to Washington—(loud applause)—but we rather expect that within a few years delegates may come from Washington to Ottawa. Having learned the lesson at Washington as to how to receive delegates, we shall know how to greet them with every possible politeness."—Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the Manufacturer's banquet, Montreal.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Canadian manufacturers appear to be on excellent terms. The gentlemen of the association warmly cheered the Premier's speech at Montreal. The Red Parlor meetings at Toronto to give the manufacturers a chance to subscribe to the Conservative campaign funds are no more. Almost everybody seems to be pleased with the Liberal government, even the manufacturers.

On Thursday next the Boards of Trade of a large number of the leading cities of the United States will have representatives in Washington delegated to call upon the President and solicit his interest in the matter of closer trade relations between the United States and Canada. The intention is to have him incorporate in his message to Congress a strong recommendation for such measures as will make possible a fairer trade policy towards Canada.

Sir Hector Macdonald, "Fighting Mac," who led the Highland brigade in South Africa, after General Wauchope was killed at Maggersfontein, has arrived in New Zealand, and a despatch says that his reception by the populace at Dunedin was almost equal in warmth to that of the Duke of Cornwall. The Highland Rifles unhorsed his carriage, attached ropes to it, and drew it through the streets amid enthusiastic cheering from the crowds assembled.

The latest reported interview with Kruger represents the old man as having declared that arbitration is the only satisfactory way of ending the South African war. Asked what he would do if arbitration went against the Boers, he replied that such a thing was impossible, it could not happen, but, assuming for a moment that it might, he added: "We should take up arms if arbitration went against us. We should never submit to the results of the arbitration if the results were unfavorable to us."

Unique Railway Accident.

Moncton, Nov. 11.—The fast freight leaving Moncton for Montreal yesterday morning about 11 o'clock met with a most unique accident. Two miles out, and when running probably 25 miles an hour, a box car in the middle of the train left the rails and was thrown clear of the track down a dump, without doing the slightest damage to the road bed or any part of the train. In fact, had the connection between the car and engine not been broken the jar of the car being thrown from the middle of the train in such a miraculous manner would probably never have been felt. The accident was caused by a broken wheel on the car which, although thrown down a steep embankment, was very little damaged. It was one of the miracles that sometimes happen in railroading that a bad smash-up did not occur.

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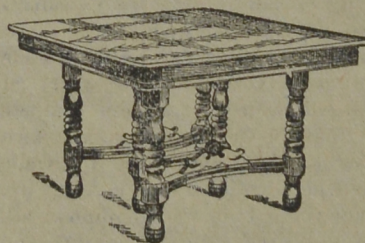
